Venice, June 8. We have advice by a Veffel come from Corf.u, That the eight Galleys of Malta are gone to joyn the Fleet of this State. Four Men of War, commanded by Signior Pifani, will fet fail to morrow for the Levant, on which are embarked the two Senators that are to attend the Doge, and the three Inquifitors of the Morea. The Duke of Manena is expected here this Week, with a numerous Train, is his way to Hungary, where he intends to pass the Campagne in the Imperial Army.

Vienna, June 13. The Duke of Lorrain, who was fo well recovered that he intended to depart for Hunz gary in two or three days, is tallen ill again of his Pever; however it's hoped that before the end of this month he will be in a condition to go to the Army; which in the mean time will be commanded by Gene-ral Caprara. Prince Louis of Baden will part from hence to morrow, and General Dunew ilde in a day or two after for Effeck, the place of general Rendezvous. There has been yet nothing attempted against Illocke or Lippa; for our last Letters from Sclavonia give an account, That General Caprara was returned to Effecke, having been only to visit fome of the Frontier places; but that he was preparing every thing for the March of the Army fo foon as the Train of Artillery was arrived, with the Provisions necessary for the Campagnes and that he had detached the Count de Hoffkirken with 1500 Horfe, to joyn, as 'twas believed, a body of Croats that was marching towards Gradiska, to attack that Fortres. And from Tranfilvania they write, That General Caraffa parted not from Hermanstadt till the first of this month, having left 9000 Men in that Country, and an Imperial Garifon in Cronstade; and that it was not known whether he would in his way attack Lippa, or march directly to Effecke. This week arrived here a Gentleman from the Court of Bavaria, being fent with a Compliment to the Duke of Lorrain on the occasion of his Illness. We are told, That the Duke of Mantua intends to pass this Campagne in Hungary, attended by his Tipops of Horfe-Guards, and about one Hundred Gentlemen beliles, whom he will maintain at his own Charge. Yesterday the Emperor invested the Counts de Cilmuz. Kinsky, and Jorger, with the Order of the Golden F eece, which was performed in the Great Hall of the Palace with the utual Ceremonies: The Prince of Swarragene burg was to have received the same Honour, but was hindred by his Indipolition. The Count de Carafia has at last accepted of the place of Commiliary General of the Imperial Army, The sth. Inflant, being the Emperor's Birth-day, when he sutred into the soth year

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of his agei, was celebrated at this Court with a great deal of Splendour. The advices we have from Turkey, coming by fuch uncertain hands, as for the molt part they do, it is not to be wondred ; That what is affirmed one Week is often contradicted the following. We had not Hong ago an account, That the late Sultan and his eldeft Son were ftrangled, upon the Difcovery of a Confpiracy that was forming against the prefent Grand Signior, which the fresher Reports of feveral persons come from Sophia and Be grade give us now great reason to disbelieve, or at least to doubt the Truth of it. But as to Yeghen Baffa, the Serafquier of *Hangary*; they affure us, That he having had privately notice of the Order that was fent to firangle him, does now fland upon his Guard, being encamped, with a confiderable Body of Men, near Sophia; and that it's believed, if he cannot make his peace at the Port, he will declare for the late Grand Signior or his Son.

Dantzick, June 14. The advices from Poland inform us, That the Forces of that Kingdom are marching to the general Rendezvous, in Ruffia ; That the Popes Nuncio had made great Provision of all necessaries for their Sublistance : and that he had above 3000 Men in the actual Pay of his Holinefs. There is a report that the Princes and States of Moldavia and Valaclia are enclined to follow the example of those of Tranfoloania, and to put thensfelves under the Emperour's Protection.

Cologne, June 20. The great Chapter of this City have fixed the 19th of the next Month for their proceeding to the Election of a new Archbishop! At Munster and Hildesson the Election will be on the 25th? but we are told that the Chapter of Liege have put off theirs till the end of August. The Cardinal of Furstemberg, and the two Deputies of the Chapter, to whom the Administration of the Temporalities is committed during the vacancy of the See, will part from hence to morrow for Keyfermaert and Rhinberg, to receive the Oath of Fidelity from the Governour and Garifon of those places."

Hague; June 25. The States of Holland are again affembled, and it's believed they will at this meeting take a final refolution upon the Proposals that have been made about cleanfing the Rhine and the Iffel. The Prince and Princets of Frifeland are returned to Lewaerden. 'The Dutch Squadron continues at Schonevelt.

Paris, June 26. The King is very well again, and has been feveral times abroad this week to take the Air." We have advice, That on the fecond inftant the Chevafier de Tourville, Lieutenant-General of the Kings Naval Forces, with two Ships more, commanded by the Count d'Eftrees, and the Count de Chafteau Renaud, met off of Alicant the Vice-Admiral Papachino, returning from Naples with two Spanish Men of War, the one carrying, 60, and the other 54 Pieces of Cannon's and that the Chevalier de Tourville having fent to him to falute the Kings Flåg, upon his refufal, attackt him, and after a Fight of 3 hours obliged him to fallute with 9 pieces of Cannon. The Marquets de Preirilly de Humières, likewife Lieutenant General of the Kings Fleet, died fome days ago.
