His Lordship strived here yesterday morning, and after affitting at the Te Deum in the Kings Chappel, having immediately called the Council, and sent notice to the Lord Provost and the rest of the Magistrates of this City, to have in readiness all things needful for expressing their universal Joy upon this happy occasion. The Lords of the Councilappointed that a folerm and publick Thapksgiving be kept and observed in all the Chlurches of this Kingdom on the respective days afterspecified, with Those in the Diocess of Edinburgh and the Allerth and on Thursday the 2 this of June instant, and in all the other Paroch-Churches of the Kingdom on the Thursday thereafter being the 28th of the same month; And likewise appointed that the Earl of Belarras (one of their own number) shall be with all possible expedition to wait on His Majesty with the humbie and hearty Expressions of their due Congranulations and extraordinary Joy upon this so figural an Occasion.
