**T**HE following Address hath been presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

The humble and Dutiful Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Common Council, and Burgesses of Your Majesty's ancient and Loyal Corporation of *Berwick upon Tyne*.  
Most Dread Sovereign,

**W**E your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, who most remote in Place, yet so early and zealous in Proximity of Affection as any other, being struck with a profound sense of the due Acknowledgment we as well as any other of your Majesty's Subjects owe to the great God of Heaven, and that most

Sacred Majesty as his Vicegerent over us, for your late & never too often to be commemorated most Gracious Declaration of free and General Indulgence, and the many Benefits and Blessings we daily receive thereby, do in most humble manner prostrate our selves at Your Majesty's Feet, with all possible expressions of Gratitude; a Declaration which hath brought along with it as if were a New Charter to this our ancient Body, by which it hath incorporated the very Hearts and Affections of every Member of it, and united them all as the Heart of one Man, which is the best and surest way of Regulation; a Declaration by which the most dark sulen Clouds of Jealousies and Fears, in all unchristian Men, as to the free enjoyment of their Religion and Property, are dispelled from our Horizon, and in which Your unparalleled Grace and Bounty, like that universal Charity of the Sun, shines equally upon all, the unjust as well as the just; and by which, as in the miraculous Preservation of Government in the Ark, even Creatures of most contrary Principles live together in the quiet and peaceable Enjoyment of themselves under the Divine Influence of Your Protection.

Wherefore, most Dread Sovereign, to give You the Earnest of a greater Harvest, we hereby most heartily and sincerely declare, That we will on all occasions defend Your Majesty's most Sacred Person and Government with the utmost of our Lives and Fortunes against all Opposers whatsoever: And that whenever it shall please Your Majesty in Your Princely Wisdom to call a Parliament, we do hereby Testifie and unanimously agree to chose for our Burgesses such as have Your Majesty's Gracious Recommendation, and shall concur with Your Majesty's known Pleasure in Annulling and Abolishing the Penal Laws and Test, that so Your said Gracious Declaration may likewise be the true Sense of all Your Subjects in an Act of Parliament.

And lastly, Great Sir, Let us amongst the first of Your Subjects, upon the long wish'd for blessed Occasion of the thrice happy Delivery of Your great and Royal Consort, Congratulate Your most Sacred Majesties, not only wishing long Life, Health and Prosperity to the Prince, a Blessing to these Nations, but shall also ever offer up our Prayers, That Almighty God will graciously bestow a Male Posterity from the same Royal Line to sway the Scepters of these Kingdoms to the end of the World.

In Testimony whereof we have hereunto affixed the Seal of the said Borough, this 16th day of June, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesty's Reign, Anno Dom. 1688.

**Venice, May 11.** We have advice by a Vessel that arrived here on Wednesday last from the *Levant*, of the departure of the Doge *Morsini*, with the Gallies of this State, from *Porto Porro*; and that it was conjectured he was gone towards *Salonique*, whither Signior *Venier* had taken his course some days before, with the Ships under his Command. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* tell us, That the *Proveditore General Cornaro* had sent the *Marquis de Borri* with some Troops towards *Scardona*, to observe the motions of the Turks, who he had advice were drawing together on that side; and that at the same time the *Proveditore* was making preparations to attack *Clin*, by the taking whereof the Venetians will become Masters of a Country of a large extent, and very fruitful. The Master of a Vessel that arrived here two days ago reports, That he met the last Convoy that went from hence for the *Levant* off of *Corfou*; and that 6000 Turks having lately shewed themselves in the Neighbourhood of *Lepanto*, Signior *Navaier*, *Proveditore General* of the Islands, was gone thither with 4 Gallies, to reinforce that Garrison.

**Florence, June 15.** The Courier that was sent from hence about 10 or 12 days ago to the Court at *Munich*, is returned with an Answer to the great Duke's Dispatches, relating to the Marriage of the Prince his Son with the Princess of *Bavaria*, which is now lookt upon to be as good as concluded. The Duke of *Mantua* has prepared a great Equipage, and is advanced as far as *Venice*, with a Design to go to the Campagne in *Hungary*.

**Hungary.** The Duke of Parma has raised some Troops for the Service of the Venetians. At Naples there has been a most terrible Earthquake, which has laid a great part of that City in Ruins: The Town of Benevento is quite destroyed, with the Death of near 7000 persons; and the City of Avelino, and other places, have likewise suffered very much. The damage they say amounts to above 50 Millions.

**Vienna, June 20.** The Duke of Lorrain's Illness continuing, there is now little appearance of his being in a condition to go into the Field this Summer; And therefore all the General Officers that staid here to accompany his Highness to the Army, are gone to their Commands, and Orders have been sent to General Caprara to begin the Campaign. There has been a discourse since the Dukes Sickness, that the Elector of Bavaria would command the Emperors Forces, though it seems there was no ground for it; For we understand by the Count de Caunitz, who is returned from Munich, that his Electoral Highness continues in his Resolution not to go to Hungary this year. We have an account that Lieutenant General Serini came to Buda the 19th instant, that the 14th and 15th he mustered the Bavarian Regiments of Horse and Foot, which arrived there some days before; And intended to March with them on the 17th towards Essecke. The Count de Thaur parted from hence yesterday to command the Troops that are appointed for the Blockade of Camisa. They write from Upper Hungary, that the Imperialists had defeated a party of Turks that was Plundering in the Neighborhood of Debreen. Prince Charles Philip of Brunswick is made Colonel of the Regiment of Dragoons, lately commanded by Colonel Detwin, who has quitted the same on account of his great Age.

**Hamburg, June 27.** We are informed by several Persons that are come from Holftein, That the King of Denmark arrived on Thursday last at Itzehoe; And that his Majesty intended to go from thence to Gluckstadt. The Letters from Berlin advise, That the Elector of Brandenburg had on the 24th instant received the Homage of the States of that Country, which was performed with the usual Solemnity.

**Hamburg, June 29.** The King of Denmark dined yesterday at Bramslede; And arrived in the Evening at Gluckstadt. There are six or seven Danish Men of War at Sea.

**Hague, July 2.** The Heer Van Dieft has given in a Memorial concerning the Affairs of the Brandenburg West-India Company. The Prince of Friezland is returned to Leeuwarden. The States of Holland will separate this Week.

**Baley-Hall in Lancashire, June 18.** This day Mr. Stamford, Resident of the Elector Palatin, being at this place, invited several of the Principal Gentry of this Country, to make a publick Rejoycing for the happy Birth of the Prince, to whom he gave a most Noble Entertainment; the Day closing with a great Bonfire, (the House, the Chapel-walls, and the great Trees round the house being most beautifully Illuminated, and a vast concourse of People being drawn together) with Musick, Dancing, and repeated Huzza's and Acclamations of Joy, to the great Satisfaction of all the Country.

**Westminster, June 26.** William le Hunt, John Rotherham, Vincent Denn, Salathiel Lovel, of Grays-Inn Esquires, Sir Henry Chancy of the Middle Temple, Kt. William Moses of Grays-Inn, Henry Trinder and Francis Fuller of the Inner Temple, and William Thompson, of the Middle Temple Esquires, being called by the King's Writ to take upon them the State and Degree of Serjeants at Law, they accordingly appeared at the Chancery Bar the 18th instant; and after their Appearances were recorded, and they had taken the usual Oath of Serjeants, Mr. le Hunt, being the Senior, did in the name of the rest pray my Lord Chancellor to present, with a Ring, their Duty and humble Thanks

to His Majesty, for the Honour he had been pleased to confer upon them: and this day the new Serjeants having met, and performed in *Lincolns-In Hall* (the Lord Chief Justice of England having been of the Society) the Ceremony of Counting, and had their Quoifs put on by the Judges, they walked from thence, being clothed in party coloured Robes, accompanied by a great many Gentlemen of the long Robe, out of the several Societies, in the usual manner, to *Westminster-Hall*, and all the Judges being seated in the *Common-Pleas*, they were led up severally by two Serjeants to the Bar, where they again Counted, and gave Rings, with this Motto, *Rex, Princeps, & Christiana Libertas*. They afterwards entertained the Lord Chancellor, the Judges, Serjeants at Law, and many other Persons of Quality at a splendid Dinner at *Lincolns-Inn*.

**Whitchehal, June 24.** The Sieur Gestorf, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had this day Audience of his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, being conducted by Sir Charles Cotterel, Master of the Ceremonies.
