REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at these Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a translation of a Decree issued by the President of the Republic of Nicaragua, dated 17th December, 1869, which determines the conditions to be observed by Nicaraguan Consuls abroad, when visé-ing invoices of merchandize.

The following are the Articles of this Decree:—

ART. 1. In order to fulfil the conditions required for the visé-ing of invoices by Consuls of the Republic abroad, merchants who may have to make exports, shall present to the said Consuls two copies of the invoice of the goods to be shipped, expressing the quantity, the goods, the quality, the number, weight, or measure, and the value; of these two copies, the Consul, after having visé-ed both, shall deliver one to the merchant, and shall send the other stamped and under seal to the Chief of the Custom-house of the Port through which they may be passed.

ART. 2. The importation of goods or merchandize without the original invoice, visé-ed by the Nicaraguan Consul at the port from which they are shipped, or without its containing the precise specification of the goods, their quantity, quality, number, weight, or measure, and value, will cause them to be confiscated as contraband.

ART. 3. With regard to goods coming from the States of Central America, the importers shall be subject to the rules laid down in the preceding Articles; but if the goods are such as are usually brought in without an invoice, on account of the

nature of the speculation, the Fiscal Agent or Chief of the Custom-house shall invoice such goods, fixing their values in accord with a merchant, should there be one, and notify the fact to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

ART. 4. The Fiscal Agent, employed in the valuation, shall, when invoicing the goods, make use of the ship's manifest in which, in addition to an exact description of the merchandize, and the numbers, must be stated the value also; in fault of this document reference shall be made to the bills of lading which importers of goods always have with them.

ART. 5. The Chiefs or Clerks of the Ports in reducing foreign money for the recovery of duty upon invoices shall convert it into the Spanish hard-dollar.

ART. 6. The Decree of 27th November last is hereby abrogated.

(No. 30.)—EASTERN ARCHIPELAGO—JAVA SEA.

Revolving Light on the North Watcher.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 72, dated 21st September, 1869, respecting the exhibition of a light on the North Watcher, the Netherlands Government has given the following additional particulars:—

The light is a *revolving* white light, attaining its greatest brilliancy *every minute*, elevated 159 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 20 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the second order.

The tower is built of iron and painted white.

BANKA STRAIT.

Light Vessel in the Lucipara Channel.

Also, with reference to the same notice, respecting a proposed light vessel in the Lucipara Channel, the Netherlands Government has given notice, that the light vessel has been placed in the position formerly marked by a buoy in the narrowest part of the channel.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 28 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

The vessel is painted yellow, with the words *Lucipara Passage* on the sides, and has one mast with a black ball on the top. From the light vessel, Green point bears N.W. $\frac{2}{3}$ N. 4 $\frac{4}{10}$ miles, Lucipara point, S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., and Lucipara Island summit, S.E. $\frac{2}{3}$ E. 9 miles.

AUSTRALIA—PORT PHILLIP.

Light on Schnapper Point.

The Colonial Government of Victoria has given notice, that from the 1st day of January, 1870, a light would be exhibited on Schnapper Point, Port Phillip Bay.

The light is a white light, elevated 50 feet above the high water level, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The present dioptric light at the end of the jetty would, at the same time, be replaced by a *red* light shown from an ordinary lantern, which in clear weather, should be seen from a distance of about 3 miles.

Light Vessel, entrance to Galveston Bay.

THE United States Government has given notice, that a light vessel has been placed inside the bar at the entrance to Galveston Bay, to guide vessels over the bar in the deepest water.

The vessel exhibits a *fixed* white light, elevated 47 feet above the sea and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The vessel is moored in $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, is schooner rigged, painted yellow, with the word *Galveston* on her sides and the number (28) on her stern, and carries, as a day mark at the masthead, one black cage of iron work.

In thick or foggy weather a bell and horn will be sounded alternately.

NEW BRUNSWICK—BAY OF FUNDY.

Fog Whistle on Point Lepreau.

The Colonial Government of Canada has given notice, that a steam fog whistle has been erected near the lighthouse on Point Lepreau, Bay of Fundy.

During thick and foggy weather and snowstorms, the whistle will be sounded in each minute as follows—a blast of *five seconds* duration, an interval of *five seconds*, then a second blast of the same duration, and then an interval of *forty-five seconds*.

The distance at which the whistle may be expected to be heard is :—

In calm or moderate weather	... 15 miles.
In stormy weather	... 5 to 8 "
