WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to "amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the following modifications, viz. :—

BRADFORD, YORKSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the Wesleyan Chapel, Bradford Moor, in the county of York, and in the burial-ground of the said chapel within twenty feet of the chapel; and in the rest of the burial-ground, except in graves which are free from water, —no coffin to be placed within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet beneath the soil, except it be buried in a vault and be entombed in an airtight manner.

ST. MARY'S, WARWICK.—Forthwith wholly in the churchyard of St. Paul's, Warwick, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented; and except in now existing family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-third day of May next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-third day of May.
