THE following Addressees have been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Grand Inquest, at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace, held for the County Palatine of *Durham*, this Eleventh Day of *July*, 1688.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

WHE Your Majesty's Loyal and Obedient Subjects, upon the first Opportunity of Representing the Body of this County, hold our selves obliged, next to our publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God, to Congratulate Your Majesty and Your Royal Consort the Queen, in the most Joyful News of the Birth of a Young Prince, now Prince of Wales. May his Royal Highness long live; and Your Majesties be blessed with a numerous Issue; and Your Throne established in all succeeding Ages; which is the hearty and unanimous Desire of Your Majesty's most Dutiful Subjects, &c.

We the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, and Justices of the Peace, of this County, now present at the said Quarter-Sessions of the Peace, do concur with the Grand Inquest in this Address.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble and Hearty Congratulation of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County of *Worcester*, holden at the General Sessions of the Peace, the 10th of *July*, Anno; Dom. 1688.

PERmit us, DREAD SIR! amongst the loud peals of Joy, that ring in every Corner of the Kingdom, to join our Huzzas with the rest of Your Majesty's Subjects, for a Blessing bestowed on us, so long, so earnestly, desired; Happy we that live to see a Prince of Wales from Your Loyns! And happy our Posterity that live to be Govern'd by a Prince of such a Father! May Your Majesty live long to see those great Endowments Heaven has enriched him with; and he live to out-do whatever History speaks great of his Ancestors Actions, and if possible even those of James the Second; whilst we contribute by a steadfast Loyalty, to further all Your just Designs, and not forwardly oppose You in any thing, since Heaven seems to grant what You ask; and that Your Desires may never receive denial, shall be the constant Prayer and Wishes of, &c.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council men of Your Majesty's Town and Parish of *Maidstone*, in the County of *Kent*.

Dread Sovereign,

AMongst the many Favours under Your Majesty's Pious, Prudent, and serene Government over us, nothing more comformeth our hopes of lasting happiness than the subjecting the Execution of simple Laws, under which many of Your Loyal Subjects have most grievously suffered, having also for our future encouragement your Majesty's Gracious Declaration reiterated, That your Princely Resolutions are that during Your Majesties Reign over us (which God grant may be long) no one of Your Majesty's Subjects shall be punished or disturbed for matters of their Religion, nor their Properties Invented; and that Your Majesty will call a Parliament, where you have promised your Royal Assent to confirm it by a Law unalterable.

For thise undeserved Favours, Great Sir, (after our humble and hearty Acknowledgment with Thankfulness to the Governor of Heaven and Earth, who hath brought you to your Throne, and persuaded you so to Rule as to allow Liberty of Conscience) We unfeignedly in all Submission, as becometh good Subjects by Inclination as well as Duty, present our most humble Thanks,

resolving, to use our best Endeavours to make an acceptable return of a continued Loyalty, Thankfulness, and Compliance to Your most Gracious Majesty in all your most Pious and Christian declared Purposes; in particular, in Electing of Members of Parliament for this Corporation, whenever Your Majesty shall think fit to call a Parliament. And always shall be Petitioners to the great King of Kings, That he will bless Your Majesty with a long and happy Reign over us, and with a succeeding Issue to sit on the Throne of their Ancestors whilst the World endureth. In Testimony whereof we have affixed our Common Seal, the 25th day of *May*, in the fourth Year of Your Majesty's Reign.

Gibraltar, June 26. We hear that two Sail Men of War, who had been a good while abroad, were lately both call away, the one upon the Barr of *Mamora*, being chased by Captain *Toster* in the *Sapire*: And the other near *Lavache*.

Genova, July 13. This Republick having received a Letter from the King of Great Britain, by which His Majesty was pleased to acquaint them with the Birth of the Prince of Wales, they immediately ordered, that there should be here, on this Occasion, the same publick Rejoicings that were formerly made for the Birth of the Dauphin of France, or the Infante of Spain (the present King;) and at the same time appointed the Marquis *Della Revere*, a Person eminent for the several Embassies, and other publick Functions, he has been employed in, to go and make the Complement of Congratulation to His Majesty, on the part of the Republick: And the said Marquis, who has resided at the Court of France, in the Quality of their Envoy Extraordinary, having already had his Audiences of Leave there, will accordingly pass over to England with all the Diligence he can, to acquit himself of this Commission.

Venice, July 3. We have Advice, that the Convoy which transported the Auxiliary Troops of Brunswick to the Levant; had, on the 7th of *May*, joined the Army of this State. The Ships, on which are embarked the Troops of *Wurtemberg*, sailed from hence this day. The Master of a Vessel that's arrived here from the *Morea* reports, That the Greeks from *Sagunick* as far as *Vellona* have revolted, and taken up Arms against the Turks. The Marquis *de Parole* is arrived here from *Turin*, with several other Persons of Quality, who intend to go to the Campaigne in *Hungary*.

Florence, July 4. Great Preparations are making here for the Marriage of the Prince of *Tuscany* with the Princess of *Bavaria*. The Gallies of our Great Duke, with the 2 Ships that carry the Land-Soldiers, sailed the last Week to the *Levant*, to join the Venetian Fleet.

Warsaw, June 25. Yesterday being the Feast of *St. John*, the King, who bears that Name, received the Compliments of all the principal Persons of the Court, who, according to custom, made Presents to his Majesty of divers Curiosities. The Crown-Generall is gone to the general Rendezvous (whither the Troops march very slowly;) but the King will not part from hence till the beginning of the next month. Several Persons that are come from the *Ukrain* inform us, That the *Moscovites* and *Cossacks* were putting themselves into a posture to march towards the Frontiers. They write from *Leopold*, of the 17th Instant, that the Tartars were drawing in together in several places, with a design, as 'twas believed, to conduct some new Convoy to *Caminiec*.

Madrid, July 15. The most happy News, we received from England, of the Queen's being safely delivered of a Prince, has been received here with great Joy and Satisfaction, expressed by Illuminations, &c. My Lord *Lansdowne*, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court, has, for three days together, celebrated the Prince's Birth in a most Splendid manner, with Fountains of Wine, Fireworks, Entertainments,

tragedies, and Comedies. Yesterday was the day appointed for a Bull Feast, and every thing was ready in order to it; but it is put off upon the sad News that's come from Naples. We hear nothing more of the Siege of Olan.

Hambur, July 16. The King of Denmark returned the 9th Instant to Copenhagen. The last Letters from Poland told us, That the Turks and Tartars were drawing together in a very considerable Body near *Cavazac*, under the Command of Sultan *Nuradin*. The Baron *de Goetz*, the Imperial Minister at the Conference of *Astena*, has received Orders to go to *Munster*, to support the Interest of the Bishop of *Breslaw* at the approaching Election.

Marseilles, July 19. The Master of a Vessel arrived at *Toulon* from the French Fleet before *Argiers*; reports, That when he came away they were playing their Bombs into the Town, which had done great execution: That the Algerines being enraged thereat, had shot off the French Coal at the mouth of a Cannon, with several poor Captives; and threatened the same Treatment to the rest, if their Bombs ceased not. And that the French, to shew their just Repentment of so great a Barbarity, had shot to death three Algerine Rais or Captains, they carried with them from hence, and had put their Bodies on a hurdle of Planks made for that purpose, that they might be driven ashore. The Master adds, that the Town was almost destroyed with the Bombs; and that they were making Preparations to attack the Fort on the Mole. There are now fitting out Ten Men of War at *Toulon*.

Paris, July 28. There are arrived at *Brest* several Ships of the Fleet, that parted from thence for *Siam* about a year and an half ago; and the rest, who staid behind, are daily expected. They bring the News of the King of *Siam*, having given the French leave to establish two Factories within his Territories, with the free Exercise of their Religion. The last News we had of our Fleet was, that the violent Wind had obliged them to quit their Station before *Argiers*, to which they would return with the first fair Weather. It is reported that there have happened new Disorders at *Constantinople*, and that they were so great, that the Grand Signior was obliged to retire over to *Asia*, which we must expect a Confirmation of: But this is certain, that things are in a great Confusion throughout the whole Ottoman Empire.

Glasgow, June 29. No sooner did the happy News of the Queen's safe Deliverance of the Prince arrive here, on the 14th Instant, but our Archbishop caused all our Bells to be rung; and, having called the Lord Provost, and the rest of the Magistrates, to his Castle, (whither also he invited the Officers of His Majesty's Forces here,) gave Orders for expressing their Joy and Thankfulness for this great Blessing: Whereupon the Forces were drawn out; and Bonfires, with Illuminations, were made before all the remarkable Houses in this City, which appeared the following Night as if it had been an intire Lamp: The Royal Healths having been often repeated in the Lord Archbishop's Castle, and at the Town-House by his Grace, the Lord Provost, the Magistrates, and all the Officers of His Majesty's Forces here, with great Joy and Solemnity, in the midst of many Volleys. The University, the Citizens, and other Inhabitants at the same time expressing their Joy in an extraordinary manner. Upon Sunday thereafter being the 17th, his Grace the Lord Archbishop Preacht an Excellent, Pious and Loyal Sermon in our Cathedral upon this Blessed Occasion, where he also said the *Te Deum*. On the 28th we had devout and Loyal Sermons in all our Churches, and rendered Praises to God for Blessing our August Monarch with a SON, and us with a PRINCE. It would be too tedious here to insert a particular Account of the Universal Joy and Satisfaction that were expressed that day by the Lord Archbishop, the Lord Provost, the Magistrates, the Officers and Standing Forces,

the University, the Citizens and other Inhabitants, besides a great many Strangers who happened to be here at that time: But in short, there was never in this City such an Universal Joy, nor so Solemn and Magnificent Expressions of it.

Lincoln, July 11. The Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince was celebrated here by the Magistrates at the Cathedral, in their Scarlet Gowns, and with ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and great Acclamations of the People, and other Expressions of publick Joy, agreeable to so great an Occasion; the Counts running Wine a great many Hours.

Whitehall, July 22. This day the Sieur *Saroty*, Resident of *Venice*, had Audience of the King, and afterwards of the Queen, to Congratulate Their Majesties on the part of that Republick; upon the Birth of the Prince of Wales; being conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.

At the last Sessions of the Old Baily, one *Valentine Cogswell* was found Guilty of High Treason, for Counterfeiting and Clipping the Current Coyn of this Realm: One part of the Evidence against him were Three pair of Coyning Stamps, which were found in his Lodgings. Whereas the Grand Juries of London and Middlesex, have of late made several Presentments against Clippers and False Coyners, which have had good Effect in discovering such Offenders: These are to desire all Persons, in other Cities and Counties, to have a strict Eye upon all Unknow and Suspicious Persons, that shall utter any Clipp'd Money; and to have such Persons before the next Justice of the Peace, to be examined, how they came by the same.
