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The following Address has been presented to the King, which His Majesty received graciously.

The humble and Obedient Remonstrance of His Majesty's Subjects of the Peace for the County of Surrey, at their General Quarter Sessions held at Bridge Water the Tenth Day of July in the Fourth Year of His Majesty's Right Honourable Majesty King James the Second.

Most Gracious Sovereigns

Although we have with all sincerity made our respective Acknowledgments to Almighty God for the Great Blessing he hath vouchsafed this Nation, by making your Majesty the Parent of a most Hopeful and Illustrious Prince, and have given as great and ample Demonstrations of our Joy for the same in our several Stations, as we were capable, yet nevertheless we do not think our selves acquitted of our Duty without our humble Congratulations with your Majesty and your Royal Consort upon this Happy Occasion, and offering your Majesty, that when ever the Order shall please your Majesty's King's Reign shall remain that Crown you now so justly wear, we will bear all Faith and true Allegiance to this Illustrious Prince; but that the Commencement thereof may be late, are, and shall always be, the Prayers of

Your Majesty's most Faithful and most Obedient Subjects.

Constantinople, May 30. The apprehensions and fears increase here daily upon the News of the Imperialists designing to Besiege Belgrade; there being nothing (in case they should become Masters of that place) to hinder their marching thither, but the scarcity of Provisions in so desert, and ruined a Country. The Confusions are also very great in almost all other places of the Grand Signior's Dominions. We hear from Grand Cairo, That the People there were ready to revolt upon the notice they had that the Grand Visier intended to change their Bassa, who had but newly been sent thither, which they pretend is contrary to their ancient Privileges, for that the Bassa (because of the great Tax that is laid upon the Country at his coming to that Government) ought not to be changed before he has finished his Term of three years; Whereupon they sent Deputies hither, who were dismissed the last week with a confirmation of their present Bassa. There has been likewise great Disorders at Candia, where the Soldiers murmured for want of their Pay, and having killed their Bassa, seized on his Estate to pay themselves. In Acha the Country is infested with Robbers, and those in great Numbers, so that there is no Travelling for the Caravans, which gives a stop to all Commerce by Land. One Teghen, who is the Chief of them (and under whom Teghen Bey served as a Captain, before he came into the late Grand Signior's Service) has with a Body of 4000 men in a manner block'd up Angora, and made them pay a great Sum of Money; They have sent hither for Succors; and 3 Bassa's are dispatch'd with Orders to raise what Forces they can in Natolia to suppress these Robbers. As for Teghen Bassa (of whom so often mention has been made in our former relations) we are told, That he having refused to serve in the War of Hungary under Hassan Bassa, who was made Seraskier there in his room, and not liking the Bassa of Temeswar, the Grand Signior was take off his displeasent, made him Bassa of Bosnia, and Seraskier or General of all the Ottoman Forces in those parts, but he said he has refused to obey the Orders sent him to go to Bosnia,

and after he continues with his Party between Sophia and Belgrade, declaring that he will not yield his Seraskiership to Hungary to Hassan Bassa; and it is generally believed, private Orders have been thereupon sent to have him brought to Vienna, Bassa the late Visier was put into a Galley the 5th Instant, and sent with a Capitan Bassa to Caraka, a Castle near Salonica, which is in effect a Banishment, having only a small Barkschip on the Confines of Bosnia for his maintenance. Kuperli Oglia made Bassa of Candia, and Ali Bassa (who was a Creature of Kara Mustafa Visier, and was in the late Tumults spoke of as one fit to be made Visier) is made Bassa of Candia, by which the Visier has at present freed himself of two dangerous Competitors. Here is arriv'd an Envoy from the Emperor of Morocco with Letters of Compliment to the Grand Signior upon his coming to the Throne, and with offers, That as the Christians are united against the Musselmans, so he was ready to give the Grand Signior his assistance in Defence of the Musselman Faith. The 16th Instant the Emperor, or Master of the Horse, entertained the Grand Signior as is usual at Caraka (where his Horses are at Grass) with which the Grand Signior was so well pleas'd that he went again the 12th. The 14th sail'd from hence in 11 Gallies to Guard the Black Sea, they having Advice of the Cossacks preparing to make some Incurfions.

Vienna, July 23. The Letters from the Imperial Army, Commanded by General Caprara, give this account, That they broke up from Essecke the 28th of the last month; That they encamp'd the 29th at a place called Boroczi, and arriv'd the 30th at Valkov, where they cast up an Intrenchment for the security of the Baggage, which it was resolv'd should be left there, while the Troops advanced to attack Illocke. That on the 4th Instant 6000 Hussars, under the Command of the Count de Budiani, joined the Army; And that they daily expected the coming up of the Auxiliary Forces of Bavaria and the Circles, and of those Commanded by General Caraffa, upon whose arrival a strong Detachment would be sent to reinforce Prince Louis of Baden, who was gone to attack Gradiska. That the Count de Hofstircken had been sent out with 800 Cuirassiers and 600 Croats towards Posses, to learn news of the Enemy; And that on the 7th or 8th the Army would march towards Illocke. The Bishop of Nicopolis, and another Person, who is a Military Officer, are arriv'd here in the Quality of Deputies from the Prince &c. States of Valachia, but not having had their Audience, the business they are sent upon is not yet known. The Duke of Lorraine recovers daily, but we are told his Physicians have advis'd him not to think of going into the Field this Summer; fearing the Fatigues of the Campaign may indanger the return of his Distemper. The Duke of Mantua is arriv'd here with a Train of 300 Persons; And the Elector of Bavaria is expected on Monday next. Teghen Bassa continued, according to our last Advices, encamp'd between Sophia and Belgrade.

P.S. Just now arrives an Express with the News, That the Turks being inform'd of the march of the Imperial Army, had on the 8th and 9th Instant abandon'd Illocke and Peter Waradin, retiring with what they could carry with them to Belgrade.

Cologne, July 23. The Cardinal of Fursenberg has not yet taken possession as Archbishop of Cologne, being resolv'd, seeing the Election is disput'd, to expect the

the Pope's Decision therein, as he ~~was~~ on Tuesday last to the ~~Magistrates~~ of this City. The same Day the Great Chapter dispatch'd an Embrey to Rome to give his Holiness a particular account of all that hath pass'd relating to the said Election. The Envoy of Bavaria is gone from hence to Liege. We hear that the Baron de Brabeck is chosen Bishop of Heldeſlocht. He was Dean of that Church.

Hague, July 25. The Heer Campricks the Imperial Minister, and the Sieur Noſſ, Reſident of the late Elector of Cologne, have both given in Memorials to the States General, the first acquainting them with the Election of Prince Clement of Bavaria, and the other of the Cardinal of Furſtberg; But we understand that the matter is by both ſides ſubmitted to his Holiness's Determination. They write from Amſter that the Biſhop of Brabant arriv'd there the 21th Inſtant, and that the Chapter would on the 29th proceed to the Election of a new Biſhop.

Paris, July 31. The King went the 29th Inſtant to Marſ, and from thence to the Camp at Achery, and returned in the Evening to Verſailles. The Baron de Brabeck was choſen the 18th Inſtant Biſhop of Heldeſheim. We have adviſe from our Fleet before Argiers; That from the 1st to the 16th Inſtant they had ſhot 10000 Bombs into the Town, which had deſtroyed above two thirds of it; That five Ships belonging to that Government, which were in Port, had been ſunk, and one burnt, and that on our ſide there had been but one man killed, and a Shalop ſunk, but the men were all ſaved. We know not yet the particulars of the loſs ſuſtain'd by the Infidels, but doubt not but it muſt be very great.

London, July 23. The 21th Inſtant arriv'd the Ship *Succeſs*, which departed from Bombay in the *East Indies* the 11th of January laſt, and brings the following Account of the Companies Affairs, viz. That there were 12 Prizes in Bombay Road at her Departure, that 3 of the Ships brought thither as Prizes, had been diſcharg'd by the General; One becauſe the Commander produced a Paſſ from Mr. Harris the Companies Chief, ſtill Reſident at Surra; another, becauſe they prov'd, The Intereſſed in her Loading to be *Genues*, living in *Diu*, in ſubjection to the King of *Portugal*; and a third, that prov'd the Ship and Cargo to belong to the *Dutch*. Captain *Wildy* in the *Modena*, with his *Buffora* Prizes, was not arriv'd, but daily expected at *Bombay*. The *Mogol's* old Governour at *Surra* was turned out, and a new Governour ſent thither in his ſtead; who ſhew'd great kindneſs to the *Engliſh*, remaining there, and was entred into a Treaty of Peace with the *Engliſh* General, Reſident at *Bombay*, which it was ſuppos'd would take full effect in a very ſhort time. In *Bengall*, the *Engliſh* Agent, Mr. *Job Charnock*, had made Peace with the *Nabob* of *Decca's* Commiſſioners, which only wanted the *Nabob's* Ratification; but on that ſide of *India* there had been great Sickneſſes and Mortality, as alſo on the Coaſt of *Choromandell*, enſuing their great Famine; inſomuch, as that at *Metchelepam*, of many *Dutch* Servants, but three were left alive; and of the *French*, but one Perſon; the *Engliſh* eſcap'd ſomewhat better, by removing into the Country. The Letters likewiſe add, that the Settlements the *Engliſh* had fortified on the Weſt Coaſt of *Sumatra*, were in a very good Condition; and that at *Tenafferre*, and *Mery*, belonging to the King of *Syam*, the *Engliſh* Fugitives and Relics of the late interloping Factions, (that fled to *Phaulcon's* aſſiſtance, and were employ'd by him in the King of *Syam's* Service) being 57 Perſons, were all cut off by an Inſurrection of 600 of the Natives with their Governour *Burnaby*, a treacherous Deſerter from the Companies ſervice, ſuppos'd to have been corrupted by *Phaulcon*, when *Burnaby* was Chief for the Company at *Syam*, none eſcap'd with Liſt but Mr *White* Governour of *Mery* for the King of *Syam*, and he by ſwimming off to a ſmall Ship of the Companies, riding near *Mery*, that ſav'd and relieved him, notwithstanding his former Miſcarriages, by giving him a ſmall prize

Ship, in which he ſailed for, and arriv'd at, the Cape, and (it is thought) will come from thence to Europe in one of the *Dutch* Eaſt-India Ships, the ſmall Ship not being ſuitable for an Europe Voyage.

Whitehall, July 23. On Saturday laſt, at *Kingſton Hall* in *Dorſet-ſhire*, in the 70th Year of his Age, dy'd His Grace *James* Duke of *Ormond*, &c. Lord Steward of His Majesties Houſehold, one of the Lords of His Majesties Moſt Honourable Privy-Council, and Knight of the moſt Noble Order of the *Garter*. He ſerv'd the Crown as Lord-Lieutenant of *Ireland* ſeveral times, as well under *King Charles* I. of bleſſed Memory, as ſince the Reſtoration of His late Majesty, whom he faithfully follow'd during his Exile, ever behaving himſelf in all times with great Fidelity and Honour.

Whitehall, July 25. Their Majesties went yesterday to *Windſor* to paſs the reſt of the Summer there. Their Royal Highneſſes Prince *George* and the Princeſſe *Anne*, of *Denmark* are gone to *Tunbridge*.

The Sieur de *Zuleſtern* has had his Audiencies of Leave of Their Majesties, of the Queen Dowager, and of his Royal Highneſſe the Prince of *Wales*, being Conducted by *Sir Charles* Corſnel Maſter of the Ceremonies.
