THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869.

2. Article 11 of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869, shall not apply to foot-and-mouth disease.

3. Where an Inspector finds foot-and-mouth disease to exist in his district, he shall, on the Saturday following, and on the Saturday of every week until the disease has disappeared from his district, make a return to the Local Authority and to the Privy Council, on forms, from time to time specially provided by the Privy Council for that purpose, and shall in such returns furnish all the particulars required by those forms.

WHEREAS the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council have, by a licence, bearing even date herewith, sanctioned the holding of an Exhibition and Sale of Cattle at the Agricultural Hall, in the parish of Islington, in the county of Middlesex, on the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth days of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Notwithstanding anything in The Metropolitan Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869, or in any other Order of the Privy Council, cattle which have been exhibited at the Exhibition may be moved alive out of the Metropolis, with the licence of the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, which licence such Commissioner is hereby empowered to grant, and, if he thinks fit, to revoke.

2. Such licence shall only be granted upon the production of a Certificate of Health, signed by one of the Veterinary Surgeons of the Exhibition, certifying that such cattle do not exhibit any indication of infectious or contagious disease; and

also of a Certificate, subjoined to the Certificate of Health, and signed by the person appointed as Pass-master for the Exhibition, certifying that the cattle desired to be so moved have been exhibited at the Exhibition: Such Licence and Certificates to be in the following forms:—

The cattle shall be conveyed, without stopping, from the Exhibition out of the Metropolis in properly constructed cattle-vans, or, if they are moved out of the Metropolis by railway, then they shall be conveyed in such cattle-vans, without stopping, to the railway-station, and there be transferred from such vans directly to the railway-truck.

4. If any such cattle, while in the Metropolis, come, accidentally or otherwise, in contact with any cattle other than cattle which have been exhibited at the Exhibition, they shall not be moved out of the Metropolis, but shall be slaughtered within its limits.

5. All cattle which are exhibited at the Exhibition, and are not moved out of the Metropolis under this Order, shall be slaughtered on or before the twenty-second day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

NEW ZEALAND WAR MEDAL.

Admiralty, S.W., November 5, 1870.

NOTICE is hereby given to the Officers and Men of the Royal Navy and Marines whose claims to the Medal for services in New Zealand during the wars in 1845, 1846, and 1847, and between the years 1860 and 1866, have been admitted, but whose medals have not yet been delivered to them, that they can now receive the same on application.

Notice is also given to those who may be entitled to the medal for services while belonging to any of the under-mentioned ships, and who have not yet applied for the same, that they should without delay send in their claims for investigation.

Applications may be made, either personally, at the Medal Branch, Admiralty, Somerset House, or by letter, addressed to the Accountant-General of the Navy and Comptroller of Navy Pay, Admiralty, S.W., with the words "Medal Branch" on the left-hand corner of the envelope.

Every claimant should state the rank or rating held by him during the war, and the name of the ship or ships on board which he served; also, in the case of every petty officer, seaman, marine, or boy, it is indispensable that his application should be accompanied by his certificate of service, except he should be serving on board any of Her Majesty's ships or at any of the Marine Head Quarters, in which case the application must be made through his commanding officer.

The medal is awarded to those only who were surviving on the 3rd June, 1869 (the date of the notice published in the London Gazette granting the medal), and who formed part of a Naval Brigade, and were actually engaged under fire on shore during the war, while borne on the books of the under-mentioned ships:—

(Confirmation of Agreements with Commissioners of Woods and Forests and Board of Trade; Transfer of Foreshores and Property in Humber, Ouse, and Trent to Conservancy Commissioners; Power to raise Loan; Amendment of Public and Local Acts; and other purposes.)
