(No. 113.)—GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE—  
MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

*Fixed Light on Great Bird Rock.*

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, that a light is now exhibited, during the season of navigation, from a lighthouse recently erected on the Great Bird Rock, the north-easternmost of the Magdalen Islands.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 140 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 21 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the second order.

The tower, 50 feet high, is a wooden frame building, painted white, and is situated on the eastern end of the rock. Position, lat. 47° 50' 40" N., long. 61° 8' 20" West.

The keeper's dwelling, also painted white, is 66 yards from the lighthouse.

## CHALEUR BAY.

*Fixed Light on Paspebiac Point.*

Also, during the same period of the year, a light is exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Paspebiac Point, north side of Chaleur Bay.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 55 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 13 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

The tower, 40 feet high, is a square wooden frame building, painted white, and situated near the extremity of the point. Position, lat.  $48^{\circ} 0' 50''$  N., long.  $65^{\circ} 14' 20''$  W.

*Fixed Light on Caraqueette Island.*

Also, that during the season of navigation, a light is exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the west end of Caraqueette Island, south side of Chaleur Bay.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 52 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors

The tower, 48 feet high, is a square wooden frame building, attached to the keeper's dwelling, both painted white. Position, lat.  $47^{\circ} 49' 40''$  N., long.  $64^{\circ} 53' W.$

## GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE—MIRAMICHI RIVER.

*Fixed Light on Portage Island.*

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 46 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 12 miles.

*Fixed Lights on Oak Point.*

Also, that lights are exhibited from two light-houses, bearing East and West from each other, on Oak Point.

The lights are *fixed* white lights, the easternmost elevated 40 feet, and the westernmost 60 feet

above high water; in clear weather they should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The tower is 36 feet high and painted white. Position, lat.  $47^{\circ} 8' N.$ , long.  $65^{\circ} 15' W.$

*Fixed Lights at Bartiboque.*

Also, that lights are exhibited from two light-houses, bearing N.E. and S.W. from each other, on Bartiboque, Lower Newcastle.

The lights are *fixed* white lights, one elevated 140 feet, the other 120 feet, above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The towers are 36 feet high and painted white. Position, lat.  $47^{\circ} 5' N.$ , long.  $65^{\circ} 23' W.$

*Fixed Lights on Preston's Beach.*

Also, that lights are exhibited from two light-houses on Preston's Beach, Ship Channel entrance of the river.

The lights are *fixed* white lights, one elevated 66 feet, the other 55 feet, above high water, and, in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The towers are respectively 30 and 28 feet high and painted white. Position, lat.  $47^{\circ} 4' 50'' N.$ , long.  $64^{\circ} 55' W.$

The illuminating apparatus of all the above lights is catoptric or by reflectors, and they will only be exhibited during the season of navigation.

Mersey and Irwell Protection.

(Extension of Remedies under the Mersey, &c., Protection Act, 1862; Amendment of Act.)

A PPLICATION is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session thereof, for leave to bring in a Bill for the following, or some of the following among other purposes.

1. To amend and extend the powers and provisions of an Act passed in the year 1862, "to protect the waters of the Mersey and the Irwell, and of certain of their tributaries from certain obstructions," (25 and 26 Vic. cap. 222), and especially to provide more effectual remedies for any

violation of the provisions of the said Act, and amongst other things to enable the Court of Chancery, and any other Court having equitable jurisdiction, in certain circumstances to grant injunctions, so as to restrain any person or persons who or whose workmen, agents, or servants have been previously convicted under the said Act, and his or their agents, servants, and workmen from violating its provisions.

2. Printed copies of the proposed Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, on or before the 21st day of December next.

**Yarmouth and Ventnor Railway.**

(Incorporation of Company; Power to construct Railway, Tramway, Pier, and other Works; Compulsory Purchase of Lands; Tolls; Working and other Agreements; Traffic Facilities and Arrangement with Isle of Wight Railway Company; Amendment of Acts relating to that Company; and other Purposes).

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session, for leave to bring in a Bill for the following or some of the following purposes; that is to say:—

To incorporate a Company (hereinafter referred to as "The Company"), and to enable such Company to make and maintain the railway, tramway, and pier hereinafter mentioned, or some or one of them, or some part or parts thereof respectively, with all needful works, stations, approaches, and conveniences connected therewith respectively; that is to say:—

1. A railway commencing in the parish of Yarmouth, in the Isle of Wight, in the county of Southampton, on land adjoining the foreshore of the Solent, and on the northern side of the turnpike road leading from Yarmouth to Shalfleet, and about 254 yards or thereabouts from the turnpike gate, measured in a westerly direction along that road, and terminating in the parish of Ventnor, in the Isle of Wight, in the county of Southampton, by a junction with the Isle of Wight Railway, at a point 73 yards, or thereabouts, measured in a north-easterly direction from the termination of that railway.

2. A tramway commencing in the parish of Yarmouth, in the Isle of Wight, in the said county of Southampton, at or near the northern extremity of the quay adjoining the Castle at Yarmouth, and passing thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said quay, and into and along so much of the centre of Bridge-road, Yarmouth, as is situate between the end of the said quay, and the approach road to Yarmouth Bridge, and terminating in the parish of Thorley, in a field in the ownership of Lord Heytesbury, and occupation of Lady Burrard, at a point 300 yards or thereabouts northwest of the gas works at Yarmouth.

3. A Pier, Jetty, or Landing Stage, with all other necessary conveniences in connection therewith respectively, wholly in the parish of Yarmouth aforesaid, and the bed of the sea, and commencing at the commencement of the hereinbefore described proposed Railway, and extending in a northerly direction across the foreshore, and terminating in the Solent at a point 300 yards or thereabouts from its commencement.

The said proposed railway, tramway, pier, and works hereinbefore described, will pass or be made from, in, through, or into the several parishes, townships, and places following, or some of them, that is to say:—Yarmouth, Thorley, Freshwater, Shalfleet, Brook, St. Nicholas, Mottestone, Brixton, Shorwell, Chale, Kingston, Godshill, Whitwell, Niton, St. Lawrence, Newchurch, Ventnor, and Bonchurch.

To empower the Company to cross, divert, alter, or stop up, whether temporarily or permanently, roads, railways, drains, sewers, pipes, rivers, streams, or watercourses, so far as may be necessary in constructing or maintaining the said intended Railway, tramway, pier, and works: to deviate from the lines of the said intended Railway, tramway, pier, and works, both vertically and horizontally, to purchase lands, houses, and other property compulsorily and by agreement, for the

purposes of the said intended Railway, tramway, pier, and works, and to levy tolls, rates, and charges in respect thereof, and to exercise other rights and privileges,

To enable the Company on the one hand, and the Isle of Wight Railway Company on the other hand, from time to time to enter into agreements with respect to the working, use, management, construction, and maintenance of the said intended railway, tramway, pier, and works, or either of them, or any part or parts thereof respectively, and the supply of rolling stock and machinery, and of officers and servants for the conduct of the traffic of the respective undertakings of the Companies or either of them, the payments to be made and the conditions to be performed with respect to such working, use, management, construction, and maintenance, the interchange, accommodation, and conveyance of traffic coming from or destined for the respective undertakings of the contracting Companies, and the division and apportionment of the revenue arising from such traffic, or for the payment of any fixed or contingent rent, and to authorize the appointment of joint committees for carrying into effect any such agreement, and to confirm any agreement which, previous to the passing of the Bill, may be made touching any matters as aforesaid.

To require the Isle of Wight Railway Company, or persons owning or working that railway, to receive, book through, take over, forward, accommodate, and deliver on and from the same, and at the stations, warehouses, and booking offices thereof, all traffic of whatever description coming from or destined for the undertaking of the Company, upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon, or failing such agreement, as shall be settled by arbitration or as may be defined by the Bill, and, if need be, to alter the tolls and charges which the said Company may receive and take upon their undertaking, and to confer exemptions from such tolls and charges.

To enable the Company, on the one hand, and Her Majesty's Principal Secretary for War for the time being, on the other hand, to enter into contracts and agreements with respect to the laying down, maintaining, renewing, repairing, working, and using the proposed railway and works along land or roads belonging to and vested in the War Department.

The Bill will vary and extinguish all existing rights and privileges which will interfere with its objects, and will alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of the 23 and 24 Vic., cap. 162; 26 and 27 Vic., cap. 232; 28 and 29 Vic., caps. 157 and 224; 31 and 32 Vic., cap. 181, and all other Acts relating to the Isle of Wight Railway Company.

Duplicate plans and sections describing the lines, situations, and levels of the proposed works, and the lands, houses, and other property in or through which they will be made, or which may be taken under the powers of the Bill, together with a book of reference to such plans, containing the names of the owners and lessees, or reputed owners and lessees, and of the occupiers of such lands, houses, and other property, and also a published map with the line of intended railway delineated thereon, so as to show its general course and direction, and a copy of this notice, will, on or before the 30th day of November instant, be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Southampton, at his office at Winchester, and on or before the same day a copy of so much of the said plans, sections, and book of reference as relates to each parish, in or through which the intended railway and

works will be made, or in which any lands, houses, or other property are intended to be taken, and a copy of this notice will be deposited with the parish clerk of each such parish, at his residence, and in the case of any extra-parochial places, with the clerk of some parish immediately adjoining thereto at his place of abode.

Further Capital Powers; Conversion and Consolidation of existing Shares and Annual Rent-charge and Debentures or Debenture Stock into Rent-charge or other Stock; Substitution of Road and Additional Lands at and near Penzance; Superannuation and Guarantee Funds and other provisions relating to the above-named Companies and their undertakings; Amendment of Acts.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session for an Act for all or some of the following purposes (that is to say):—

To enable the Great Western Railway Company, the Bristol and Exeter Railway Company, and the South Devon Railway Company (hereinafter called the Associated Companies), any or either of them, to raise further moneys for the purposes of the Cornwall Railway Company, and of the West Cornwall Railway Company, and their respective undertakings, including the redemption of the bonds granted by the Associated Companies under or by virtue of the West Cornwall Railway Act, 1865.

To empower or require the holders of debentures or of debenture stock, and of preference and other shares in the capital of the West Cornwall Railway Company, to accept, in lieu thereof, debenture stock, or rent-charge or other stock, of the Associated Companies, or of the West Cornwall Railway Company.

To empower the Associated Companies, in their own names, or in the names of the Cornwall and West Cornwall Railway Companies respectively, to create and issue for the purposes of the intended Act shares or stocks, or shares and stocks, either

of several classes or of one and the same class, and either with or without a preference or guaranteed dividend, or other rights or privileges attached thereto, as may be deemed expedient, or as may be prescribed by the intended Act, and to regulate and determine the rights and priorities of the holders of such shares or stocks (if more than one) as among themselves, and (whether one or more) with reference to the holders of other shares or stocks in the capitals of the Cornwall and West Cornwall Railway Companies, and of the Associated Companies, and of each and all of them.

To empower the Associated Companies to guarantee the payment of the interest or dividend upon the shares or stocks, or shares and stocks to be created and issued under the powers of the intended Act.

To make provision for giving more complete effect to the existing arrangements authorised by Parliament between the Associated Companies and the Cornwall and West Cornwall Railway Companies respectively, and to confer upon the said Companies such additional powers as may be necessary or expedient for that purpose.

To authorise or confirm and give effect to arrangements and agreements between the Associated Companies and the Cornwall Railway Company, or either of them, on the one hand, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or other Department of Her Majesty's Government, on the other hand, with reference to the execution of works in connection with the Government Dockyards at Devonport and Keyham, and to the raising and repayment of the moneys expended and to be expended by the Associated Companies and the Cornwall Railway Company, or either of them, upon such works, and with reference to the guarantee and payment of interest or dividends upon the money so expended or to be expended by the said Companies, or any or either of them, and to enable the Cornwall Railway Company to raise further money for the purposes of such works, by the creation and issue of preference and ordinary shares, and borrowing, or by all or any of those means.

To empower the Associated Companies to make and maintain a new road in lieu of the existing road leading past the western end of the Railway Passenger Station at Penzance from Market Jew-street to the Albert Pier, such new road commencing by a junction with Market Jew-street at a point 160 feet or thereabouts westward of the west corner of the said existing road at its junction with Market Jew-street, and leading thence for about 160 feet in a southerly direction, at right angles to Market Jew-street, to and terminating on the Quay at the north-eastern corner of Penzance Harbour, and to empower the said Associated Companies to stop up and discontinue as a public thoroughfare, and to acquire and appropriate to the purposes of the West Cornwall Railway and of the Associated Companies, the portion of the said existing road lying between Market Jew-street aforesaid and the north end of the Albert Pier, and to make provision for the repair and maintenance of the proposed new road, by the persons by whom and by the means by which the portion of the existing road proposed to be stopped up and discontinued is at present repaired and maintained.

To empower the Associated Companies to acquire, by compulsion or agreement, and to hold lands and houses for the purposes of the intended new road, and also for other purposes connected with the undertaking of the West Cornwall Railway Company, certain lands and houses in the parishes or places of Penzance, Madron, and Gulval, in the county of Cornwall, adjoining the

West Cornwall Railway, and lying partly on the southern side, and partly on the northern side of that railway, and including certain extra-parochial lands forming part of the foreshore adjoining the said lands in the county of Cornwall.

To authorize the crossing, stopping up, altering, and diverting, whether temporarily or permanently, of all roads, highways, tramways, canals, rivers, and streams within or adjoining any of the lands and houses proposed to be purchased, acquired, or appropriated under the powers of the intended Act, and which it may be necessary to cross, stop up, alter, or divert, and to vary and extinguish all existing rights and privileges connected with any of the said lands and houses, and any rights and privileges which would in any manner impede or interfere with the purposes of the intended Act, or any of them, and to confer other rights and privileges.

To provide for the establishment of a superannuation fund for the benefit of the officers and servants employed by the Associated Companies, or the Cornwall Railway Company, in connection with the Cornwall and West Cornwall Railways respectively, and of a guarantee fund for the security of the good behaviour of those officers and servants, and to provide for participation in the benefits of such funds respectively by officers and servants of the South Devon Railway Company, and to authorize the providing of such funds partly by means of contributions of annual or other sums by such officers and servants, and partly by means of contributions by the Companies employing such officers and servants respectively, or by some other means to be prescribed or authorized by the intended Act, and to sanction and empower the making from time to time of all necessary rules and regulations as to the contributions to, and the benefits to be derived from, and the management and disposition of, such funds respectively, and otherwise in relation thereto, and to make further provision with reference to the exercise of the powers for the establishment of superannuation and guarantee funds contained in "The South Devon Railway Act, 1865."
