

The Parish of Saint Martin Outwich, in the City and Diocese of London.

Commutation of Tithe.

IN pursuance of the 17th section of the "London (City) Tithes Act, 1864," notice is hereby given, that on the 6th day of December, 1870, the Reverend John Bathurst Deane, M.A., Clerk, Rector of the parish of Saint Martin Outwich, in the city of London, wrote and sent to the Churchwardens of the same parish a letter, as follows: "Sirs,—With the concurrence of the patrons of Saint Martin Outwich, I hereby authorize and request you to propose to the Vestry the commutation of the rectorial tithes on the terms and under the provisions of the Act entitled 'The City of London Tithes Act, 1864,' the annual amount at which I am willing to commute my tithes is £2,250.—I am, &c., J. B. Deane." And further, that the parishioners of the said parish, assembled in Vestry on the 6th day of January, 1871, of which Vestry and of the special object thereof notice had been given in the accustomed manner, resolved as follows:—"That this Vestry do agree with the proposal of the Incumbent of this parish for the commutation of the tithes arising or growing due in this parish under the Act 37 Henry VIII, cap. 12, into an annual fixed tithe or sum of £2,250, to be paid by this parish, and raised by tithe rates assessed therein under the provisions of 'The London City Tithes Act, 1864.'" And notice is further given, that on the 16th day of February, 1871, the Master and Wardens of the Merchant Taylors of the Fraternity of Saint John Baptist, in the city of London, patrons of the said benefice, did approve of the before-mentioned commutation of the said tithes by writing under their corporate seal. And further, that on the 21st day of February, 1871, the Right Honourable and Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London also did approve of the before-mentioned commutation by writing under his hand and Episcopal Seal.—Dated this 22nd day of February, 1871.
