PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing

Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your faithful and dutiful subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the ancient and loyal borough of Southampton, desire to approach your Majesty for the purpose of giving renewed expression to our feeling of warm attachment to your Majesty's throne, person, and government.

We beg leave to offer our hearty congratulations to your Majesty, on the approaching marriage of your beloved daughter Her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa Caroline Alberta, with the Marquis of Lorne, a young nobleman not less distinguished among his countrymen by talents and virtue, than by his high and illustrious descent.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869," it is (among other things) enacted that where the Legislature of any British possession provides for the examination of, and grant of certificates of competency to, persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as

to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council,—

1. To declare that the said certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts :
2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to certificates of competency granted under those Acts shall apply to the certificates referred to in the said Order :
3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said certificates, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations :

And that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act ; and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made under this section :

And whereas the Legislature of the British Possession of Victoria has provided for the examination of and grant of certificates of competency for the Foreign Trade to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British sea-going steam ships, which certificates are hereinafter denominated Colonial Certificates of Competency, and the Board of Trade have reported to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the said examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom, under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the Certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased—

- (1.) To declare that the said Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Government of the said possession of Victoria, shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.
- (2.) To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the 139th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the 10th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any master, mate, or engineer of a copy of any Certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, so much of the third paragraph of the 23rd section of the said last mentioned Act as requires at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a Certificate, such Certificate if cancelled or suspended to be forwarded to the Board of Trade; and the whole of the provisions of the fourth paragraph of the same section shall apply to such Colonial Certificates of Competency.

- (3.) To impose and make the conditions and regulations following numbered 1 to 10 respectively with respect to the said Colonial certificates of competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, and to impose for the breach of such conditions and regulations the penalties therein mentioned.

Form of Certificate.

1. Every such Colonial certificate of competency shall be on parchment, and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding certificate of competency for the foreign trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

Name of Possession to be inserted.

2. Every such Colonial certificate of competency shall have the name of the said possession of Victoria inserted prominently on its face and back.

Certificates to be numbered Consecutively.

3. Such Colonial certificates of competency shall be numbered in consecutive order.

Lists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar-General of Seamen.

4. The Government of the said possession shall furnish the Registrar-General of Seamen in London from time to time with accurate lists of all such Colonial certificates of competency as may be granted by them as aforesaid, or as may, for any cause whatsoever, be cancelled, suspended, renewed or re-issued.

Three years domicile or Service necessary.

5. Such Colonial certificates of competency shall be granted only to persons who have been domiciled in the said possession, or who have served in ships registered therein, for a period of, or for periods amounting to at least three years immediately preceding their application for such Colonial certificates.

Certificates of competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates not to be granted when former are Cancelled.

6. Such Colonial certificates of competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts, or of any Act for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless the period of suspension has expired, or unless intimation has been received from the Board of Trade, or the Government by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted to the effect that no objection to the grant of such Colonial certificate is known to exist, or unless a new certificate has been granted to him by such Board or Government, and in the last-named event no such Colonial certificate of competency shall be for a higher grade than the certificate so last granted as aforesaid. Colonial certificates of competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.

7. Any such Colonial certificate of competency which appears, from information subsequently acquired or otherwise, to have been improperly granted, whether in the above or in any other respect, may be cancelled by the Government of the said possession, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investigation under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade or the Government of the said possession, or as they or either of them may direct; and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to merchant shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Cancellation, &c., of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its owner.

8. Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any Board, Court, or tribunal, under the provisions of the said Acts, shall extend equally to all the Colonial certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made, as well as to all certificates granted to him under any of the Acts relating to merchant shipping, and whether such certificates be specified in such decision or not.

Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demanded.

9. Any Officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar-General of Seamen, or any of his Officers, or a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office, or a Consular Officer or duly appointed Shipping Officer in a British possession, may demand the delivery to him of any such Colonial certificate of competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such certificate for a reasonable period, for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension or possession, and any person who without reasonable cause neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to merchant shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by Colony by which originally granted.

10. Any such Colonial certificate of competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, whether by a tribunal in Victoria or elsewhere, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the Government of Victoria.

This Order shall take effect in the said possession of Victoria from and after the date hereof, and shall be deemed to apply to and take effect with respect to all such Colonial certificates of competency as shall have been granted as aforesaid since the fourth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in the words and figure following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Blackford, in the parish of Kirklington, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Kirklington, and of the parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective cures.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Kirklington, and of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John, situate at Blackford as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Harvey, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, and with the consents of Mary Frederica Kirklington Saul, of Kirklington Hall, in the said county of Cumberland, widow of Edward Godman Kirkpatrick, of the United University Club, Suffolk-street, Pall Mall, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, and of Richard Saul Ferguson, of Number 4, New-square, Lincoln's-inn, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Kirklington (in testimony whereof, they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle, the patrons of the vicarage or perpetual curacy of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff (in testimony whereof they, the said Dean and Chapter, have hereunto set their common or corporate seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Kirklington, and of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for

the said church of Saint John, situate at Blackford as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Blackford,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by Charles Bernard Hodgson, of Harker Grange, in the said county of Cumberland, Esquire, the Reverend George Bell, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Kirkclinton, the Reverend William Deacon Isaac, of Sloane-street, Chelsea, in the said county of Middlesex, James Farish, of Upper Hamilton-terrace, Saint John's Wood, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, and William Henry Hodgson, of Whitehall-place, Westminster, Esquire, in whom it is provided that such right of presentation and appointment as last aforesaid should be vested as trustees, under and according to the provisions of certain articles of agreement, bearing date on or about the nineteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and made, or expressed to be made, in pursuance of the said Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, which said articles of agreement are deposited in the Registry of the said diocese of Carlisle.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Blackford, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Kirkclinton, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the township of Westlinton. And also all that contiguous portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is bounded on the south partly by the parish of Stanwix and partly by the new parish of Saint John, Houghton, both in the said county and diocese, on the east by the last-named new parish, on the north-east by the above described township of Westlinton, in the parish of Kirkclinton aforesaid, on the north-west partly by the parish of Arthuret and partly by the parish of Kirk-Andrews-upon-Esk, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff aforesaid at a point in the centre of the bridge called or known as 'The Metal Bridge,' which carries the turnpike-road leading from Glasgow to Carlisle over the River Esk; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of rather more than three miles along the middle of the said turnpike-road to the boundary, near where the cottages called or known as 'Gillbeck' formerly stood, which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Rockcliff from the parish of Stanwix aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said

representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate in the township of Cononley, within the limits of the parish of Kildwick, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate in the township of Cononley, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all that part of the said parish of Kildwick which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate in the township of Cononley as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Cononley-with-Bradley.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that bans of matrimony should

be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"All that part of the parish of Kildwick, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north by the district parish of Christ Church, Skipton, on the north-west by the parish of Carleton, otherwise called Carlton, on the south-west by the new parish of Christ Church, Lothersdale, on the south by the new parish of Saint Thomas, Sutton, all such parishes and new parishes being in the county and diocese aforesaid; and on the remaining sides, that is to say, on the south-east and on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Sutton, from the parish of Kildwick aforesaid, at the point where Glusburn Moor-lane is joined by Royd House-lane; and extending thence north-westward, for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last named lane to the point on the western side of the line of the Leeds and Bradford Railway Extension, commonly called the Leeds and Skipton Railway, where the same lane is intersected by the boundary dividing the township of Glusburn, in the parish of Kildwick aforesaid from the township of Cononley, in the same parish, and extending thence north-eastward along the said township boundary to its junction in the middle of the river Aire, with the boundary dividing the said township of Cononley from the township of Farnhill, in the parish of Kildwick aforesaid, and extending thence generally northward for the distance of a mile or thereabouts along the last-mentioned township boundary, thereby following for the most part the course of the said river Aire, to the junction of the same township boundary with the boundary dividing the township of Bradleys Both, in the said parish of Kildwick, from the township of Farnhill aforesaid, and extending thence generally eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby leaving the river Aire aforesaid, and passing over Black Hill), to the junction of the last-mentioned boundary with the boundary dividing the said township of Bradleys Both from the township of Kildwick, in the parish of Kildwick aforesaid, and continuing in the same direction along the last-mentioned boundary to the point on Kildwick Moor, where the last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary

dividing the said township of Bradleys Both, from the township and chapelry of Silsdon, in the parish of Kildwick aforesaid, and extending thence generally northward along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction on Skipton Moor, with the boundary which divides the said parish of Kildwick from the district parish of Christ Church, Skipton aforesaid.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels, or on some other conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such represen-

tation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish ;

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the modifications hereinafter specified :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighth day of February last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows ; viz. :—

BRISTOL.—After the thirty-first of May next in St. Simon's Church and Churchyard.

GOOSNARGH, NEAR PRESTON, LANCASHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, except in then existing family vaults and graves, to be used only for the burial of members of the families of those already buried therein.

COVENTRY.—Forthwith wholly in St. Peter's Churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, to be used for the burial of widowers, widows, parents, children, brothers, or sisters of those previously buried in the churchyard ; and in the earthen graves, except for the burial of widowers, or widows of those already buried therein.

WARDEN, NORTHUMBERLAND. — Forthwith wholly in the chapel, and in the chapel-yard of St. Cuthbert, at Haydon Bridge.

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the persons having the care of the vaults beneath the church of Holy Trinity, Hull, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the vaults and graves under the said church from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the persons having the care of the said vaults and graves, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :—

That the remains exposed in vaults and graves beneath the chancel, vestries, tower, and transepts of Holy Trinity Church, Hull, be embedded in soil mixed with one-sixth part of charcoal, and that the whole surface be covered with concrete.
