TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOM AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no

presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

EARL GRANVILLE, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received the two following Despatches from His Excellency Lord Lyons, G.C.B., Her Majesty's Ambassador at Versailles:—

MY LORD, *Versailles, April 18, 1871.*

I HAVE the honour to inclose herewith to your Lordship, extracted from the "Journal Officiel" of this day, the promulgation of the Law respecting Contracts made by the French Government Departments on the occasion of the war.

L'ASSEMBLÉE nationale a adopté, le président du conseil, chef du pouvoir exécutif de la République française, promulgue la loi dont la teneur suit :

Art. 1er. Une commission composée de soixante membres de l'Assemblée nationale, nommée par les bureaux, à raison de quatre membres par bureau, est chargée d'examiner tous les marchés passés par les administrations publiques à l'occasion de la guerre, payables en tout ou en partie sur les fonds de l'État, et de contrôler la régularité des conditions auxquelles ils ont été consentis, ainsi que celle de leur exécution.

Art. 2. Une copie des marchés conclus avec des personnes autres que les agents autorisés à cet effet par les lois, décrets, ordonnances et règlements sera, à la diligence de la partie intéressée, et ce, sous peine de déchéance, adressée

dans un délai de deux mois, à partir de la promulgation de la présente loi, au ministre compétent qui la transmettra à la Commission avec ses observations.

Art. 3. Tous les documents et renseignements de nature à éclairer la Commission seront aussitôt mis à sa disposition par les ministres compétents.

Tous pouvoirs sont conférés à la Commission, soit pour mander et faire comparaître devant elle ou interroger les personnes en état de donner des renseignements, soit pour se faire délivrer et communiquer toutes les pièces de nature à éclairer sa religion.

Art. 4. Un rapport sera adressé par la Commission à l'Assemblée nationale.

THE National Assembly has adopted, the President of the Council, Chief of the Executive of the French Republic, promulgates, the following law:—

Art. 1. A Commission, composed of sixty members of the National Assembly, named by the Bureaux in the proportion of four members to a Bureau, is charged to examine all the contracts made by the public offices on account of the war, payable in whole or in part out of the State funds, and to examine whether they were entered into upon proper conditions and were properly executed.

Art. 2. A copy of the contracts concluded with persons other than agents authorized for the purpose by the laws, decrees, ordinances, and regulations, shall, at the suit of the party interested, and under pain of forfeiture, be addressed, within two months from the promulgation of the present law, to the competent minister, who will transmit it to the Commission with his observations.

Art. 3. All documents and information of a nature to enlighten the Commission shall be placed at its disposal by the competent ministers.

Full powers are given to the Commission both to summon and compel the attendance of, or to interrogate, persons in a position to give information, and to compel the production and communication to it of all documents of a nature to enlighten its conscience.

Art. 4. A report shall be addressed by the Commission to the National Assembly.

MY LORD, *Versailles, April 29, 1871.*

I HAVE the honour to enclose herewith to your Lordship, extracted from the "Journal Officiel" of this day, a communication on the law establishing a Commission to enquire into the contracts made on the occasion of the war, and

declaring that Contractors not presenting their claims within two months will forfeit them.

The law was transmitted to your Lordship in my Despatch of the 18th instant.

I enclose also a notice to Contractors, taken from the same number of the "Journal Officiel."

Sur la proposition du Gouvernement, l'Assemblée Nationale a nommé une Commission de soixante membres chargée d'examiner les nombreux marchés passés à l'occasion de la guerre.

La création de cette Commission répond au sentiment du pays ; elle doit rechercher les abus, les dénoncer, les flétrir ; elle doit aussi protéger contre d'injustes préventions les citoyens honnêtes qui n'ont pas hésité, dans ces temps troublés, à apporter au Gouvernement de la Défense Nationale le concours de leur intelligence et de leur activité. Cette double mission est digne de l'Assemblée Souveraine. C'est à elle qu'il appartient de sauvegarder la fortune publique, et seule elle a l'autorité nécessaire pour prononcer sur d'aussi délicates questions.

Elle a appelé à l'honneur de la presider M. le Duc d'Audiffret-Pasquier, et s'est divisée en cinq Sous Commissions :

La 1re, Armement, présidée par M. l'Amiral de Montaignac ;

La 2e, Habillement, Campement, etc., présidée par M. Germonière ;

La 3e, Subsistances, présidée par M. le Marquis d'Andelarre ;

La 4e, Remontes, Transports, etc., présidée par M. de Corcelle ;

La 5e, Génie, Baraquements, Travaux, présidée par M. Ancel.

Il est désirable que cette grande Commission d'enquête soit aidée dans l'accomplissement de sa tâche par le pays tout entier, et qu'à l'exemple de ce qui se passe en Angleterre, chacun s'empresse d'adresser, soit à son Président, soit à ses Vice-Présidents les documents qui seraient de nature à l'éclairer. De cette liquidation dépend l'établissement définitif du budget. L'article 2 de la Loi a fixé un délai de deux mois au delà duquel les créances qui n'auraient pas été produites seraient frappées de déchéance.

Il est du devoir de la presse d'avertir les intéressés et de faire au patriotisme de chacun un appel qui, nous en sommes convaincus, sera entendu.

#### AVIS.

Aux termes de la loi adoptée le 6 Avril, 1871, toutes les personnes qui ont contracté, à l'occasion de la guerre, des marchés avec des agents autres que ceux autorisés à cet effet par les lois, décrets et règlements, sont tenues, *sous peine de déchéance*, d'adresser dans le délai de deux mois, à partir de la promulgation de ladite loi, une copie ou une justification des marchés par elles contractés.

Ces documents doivent être adressés à Versailles, au Ministre des Finances, qui les fera remettre au Président de la Commission de l'Assemblée Nationale, chargée d'examiner les marchés. (Voir plus haut la communication de la Commission de l'Assemblée Nationale ayant le même objet.)

(Translation).

On the proposition of the Government, the National Assembly has appointed a Commission

of 60 members charged to examine the numerous contracts entered into on account of the War.

The establishment of this Commission is in accordance with the feeling of the country. It is to search out abuses, to denounce and condemn them. It is also to protect against unjust prejudices the honest citizens who did not shrink in these troublous times from giving the co-operation of their intelligence and activity to the Government of the National Defence. This double mission is worthy of the Sovereign Assembly whose province it is to watch over the public money, and which alone has the authority necessary to decide upon such delicate questions.

The Duke d'Audiffret-Pasquier has been nominated President ; and five Sub-commissions have been appointed.

The 1st, Armament, presided over by Admiral de Montaignac.

The 2nd, Clothing, Camp Equipment, &c, presided over by M. Germonière.

The 3rd, Provisions, presided over by the Marquis d'Andelarre.

The 4th, Remounts, Transports, &c., presided over by M. de Corcelle.

The 5th, Engineering, Barracks, Works, presided over by M. Ancel.

It is desirable that this grand Commission of Inquiry should be assisted in carrying on its task by the entire country, and that, according to the example of what takes place in England, every one should hasten to address, either to the Presidents or the Vice-Presidents, such documents as may be of a nature to enlighten the Commission.

On this settlement depends the final adjustment of the Budget. The 2nd Article of the Law has fixed a term of two months, beyond which the claims not then presented shall be forfeited.

It is the duty of the Press to warn the persons interested, and to make an appeal, which we are sure will be responded to, to the patriotism of all.

#### NOTICE.

According to the terms of the Law adopted on the 6th of April, 1871, all persons who have concluded, on account of the war, contracts with agents other than those authorized by the Laws, Decrees, and Regulations, are bound, *under pain of forfeiture*, to address, *within two months* after the promulgation of the said law, copies or proofs of the contracts entered into by them.

These documents should be addressed to Versailles, to the Minister of Finance, who will hand them to the President of the Commission of the National Assembly charged with the examination of contracts. (See above the communication of the Commission of the National Assembly for the same purpose).
