WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentieth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the bishoprick of Exeter, and of certain property belonging to the treasurership of the cathedral church of Exeter.

"Whereas under the provisions of two Orders of your Majesty in Council, the one bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and duly published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of August then following, and the other bearing date the sixteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and duly published in the London Gazette on the eighteenth day of December then following, certain lands and hereditaments in such Orders particularly described and formerly belonging to the said bishoprick of Exeter, became vested in us.

"And whereas by the decease of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, and Treasurer of the cathedral church of Exeter, which occurred on or about the eighteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, the said bishoprick and the said treasurership became vacant, and by such vacancies all the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments then belonging severally to the said bishoprick and to the said treasurership (except rights of patronage and the episcopal house of residence situate at

Exeter) became absolutely vested in us, for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments aforesaid consist, to a considerable extent, of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produce, during the subsistence of such grants and leases only, small annual revenues, and on that account, and in some instances on account of the character or situation of the property, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be assigned as an endowment for the said bishoprick, or to be held or applied for the other purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by the last-mentioned Act power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or for the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas it is expedient that such of the aforesaid lands, hereditaments, and emoluments lately belonging to the Bishoprick of Exeter (either with or without other property vested in us, as the case may require), as in the judgment of our Estates Committee, and subject to the approbation of the bishop for the time being, shall be deemed convenient to be held as an endowment for the said See, and as will secure a net annual income of five thousand pounds, being the income named for the Bishop of Exeter, and his successors, by the Order made by your Majesty in Council on the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, which Order was duly published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of September following, should be assigned as the endowment of the said See, and that for that purpose, as well as with a view to the more advantageous appropriation of the remainder of the said lands, hereditaments, and emoluments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, and in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the

consent of the respective holders (if any) to be testified by their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands, hereditaments, and emoluments heretofore belonging to the said Bishoprick and to the said Treasurership, and so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds thereof from time to time, as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be assigned as the endowment for the said See, or to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock, or other public securities in England.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

then prebendary, all the lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments theretofore belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her

Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of a certain benefice, that is to say, the rectory of Crawley with the chapelry of Hunton annexed, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, for the patronage of five other benefices, that is to say, the benefice (being a rectory) of Knights' Enham, in the said county of Southampton, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Holy Rood, Southampton, in the town and county of the town of Southampton, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Newport, in the Isle of Wight, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Milford, in the said county of Southampton, and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Hordle, in the same county of Southampton, all of which said five lastly-mentioned benefices are situate in the said diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, is seized in right of his see to him and his successors, in fee simple of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Crawley with the chapelry of Hunton annexed, and the churches thereof.

"And whereas the Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford, are seized to them and their successors in fee simple of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to each of the said five benefices of Knights' Enham, Holy Rood, Southampton, Newport, Milford, and Hordle, and the respective churches thereof.

"And whereas the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and the Venerable William Jackson, Doctor of Divinity, Provost of Queen's College aforesaid, in the University of Oxford, on behalf of himself as such Provost, and of the scholars of the same College, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said six benefices, and of the churches thereof respectively, may be rearranged by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony of which consent he the said bishop has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford (in testimony of which consent they the said Provost and Scholars have affixed their common or corporate seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the date of the publica-

tion in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said first-named benefice, and the churches thereof respectively, that is to say, of and to the rectory of Crawley with the chapelry of Hunton annexed, shall be assigned and transferred from the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in whom as aforesaid it is now vested), and from his successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford aforesaid, and their successors, for ever; and that, in exchange for the same, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to each of the said five secondly-named benefices, that is to say, of and

to the benefices of Knights' Enham, Holy Rood, Southampton, Newport, Milford, and Hordle, and the respective churches thereof, shall, in like manner, upon and from the day aforesaid, be assigned and transferred from the said Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford (in whom, as aforesaid, it is now vested), and from their successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty,

chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, situate at Dalston, in the parish of West Hackney, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of West Hackney, of the parish of Hackney, of the chapelry district of Dalston, and of the new parish of Saint Matthias, Stoke New-

ington, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes, chapelry district, and new parish respectively.

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of West Hackney, of the said parish of Hackney, of the said chapelry district of Dalston, and of the said new parish of Saint Matthias, Stoke Newington, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mark, situate at Dalston as aforesaid.

SCHOOL OF NAVAL ARCHITECTURE, &c.

No candidate will be admitted who does not obtain at least two-thirds of the full number of marks in the two first-named subjects, and three-fifths of the full number, either for practical shipbuilding or marine engineering.

The last four subjects, although counting in the competition, will not be considered obligatory.

The candidates who may be selected will be treated, while attached to the school, in all respects as the Admiralty pupils; they will receive wages the same as dockyard apprentices, commencing at 1s. 6d. per day for six days per week for first year, and increasing yearly 3d. per day till it reaches 2s. per day; and in addition a subsistence allowance of 3s. per day for seven days per week while away from their homes, either at the school or in the dockyards.

Seven months of each year—viz., from October till May—will be devoted to study at the school, and the remaining five months to actual work and the acquirement of practical knowledge in the dockyards.

It is to be understood that the Admiralty make no engagement to employ these pupils after the completion of their course of study; and they must rely on their own worth, as educated naval architects, for obtaining employment in their subsequent career.

The number of such pupils to be selected this year is one shipwright and one engineer.
