THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Consul of the United States of Colombia at Liverpool, a copy of a Decree of his Government, dated the 3rd April last, relating to the inspection for statistical and other purposes, of goods imported and exported at the free ports of Colombia.

The following is a translation of the Articles of the Decree:—

Art. 1. The journals and invoices specified in the 2nd section of chapter 2 of the Code of Customs shall be required in all the free ports.

Art. 2. The default in presenting the said documents or their deficiency or inaccuracy shall be punished in accordance with the respective provisions of the Code.

Art. 3. The examination of cargoes in the free ports shall be performed by the chiefs of the preventive service in those ports, and as the packages are unloaded, and it shall be limited to noting the marks, numbers, and form of each package, and the total number of them.

Art. 4. When the ship goes from port to port, to disembark only a part of its cargo in the free port, the proceedings shall be as directed in Art. 27 of the Code.

Art. 5. The Consular Agents shall distribute the copies of the journals and invoices of the merchandize directed to the free ports, and shall act in every thing respecting them as is done with those of goods intended for the qualified ports.

Art 6. Both the Consular Agents of the Republic abroad, and the Boards of Customs, and of National Financé in the free ports, must keep registers for the compilation of the statistics from the journals, invoices, and other documents which are to be presented in accordance with this Decree.

Art 7. For the trade from the free ports to the qualified ones, the provisions of section 2, chapter 2 of the Code shall be observed, and besides, in Panama and Colon those shall be borne in mind which are established by the Decree of June 15, 1868, published in number 1256 of the "Diario Oficial."

Art. 8. For exportation the manifests shall be presented, the examination be made, and the proceedings take place, which are treated of in Articles 84, 85, and 86 of the Code. The examination shall be in the same manner as that prescribed for importation in Art. 3 of the present Decree.

Art 9. This Decree shall be observed in regard to all vessels which leave foreign ports from and after the 1st of August next.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A DISTRICT TO BE STYLED THE DISTRICT OF CAMBORNE, IN THE COUNTY OF CORNWALL, FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

WHEREAS a petition has been duly presented to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from inhabitants and rate-payers of the town and district of Camborne, in the county of Cornwall, praying me to settle and fix the boundaries of a district to be styled the "Camborne District," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858.

And whereas the said petition was duly signed, as required by the said Act, and set forth, likewise, the proposed boundaries of the district sought to be formed under its provisions; and inquiry has now been duly made by John Thornhill Harrison, Esquire, the Inspector appointed by me for such purpose, and he has reported to me thereon.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, having taken the said Petition and Report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order as follows:—

1. That from and after the date of this present Order, the boundaries hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in, and accompanying, the said Inspector's Report to me, bearing date the 21st day of July, 1871, form and constitute the boundaries of the district to be called the "Camborne District," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858; and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated shall, for the purposes of such Act, be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act accordingly.

The boundary line commences on the map accompanying the Report of the Inspector at a stone post, marked L.G.A. 1, to be set up in

the south-west corner of a field, No. 1694 on the tithe apportionment map of the parish of Camborne, and on the plan accompanying the said Inspector's Report, and proceeding in a westerly direction to a stone post marked L.G.A. 2, to be set up in the most westerly corner of a field, No. 1716 in the said tithe map and plan, such boundary being the hedge or fence dividing the respective properties of Gustavus Lambart Basset, Esquire, on the east side, and Mrs. Tryphena Pendarves, or other persons interested for the time being in the said property, on the west side thereof, and from the said last-mentioned stone in a northerly direction, crossing the West Cornwall Railway to another stone post marked L.G.A. 3, to be set up in the northern corner of a field being part of the glebe lands of the said parish, and numbered 1236 in the said tithe map and plan; such last-mentioned boundary being the hedge or fence dividing the property of the said G. L. Basset from the said glebe lands, and from such last-mentioned stone in a south-westerly direction by the southern hedge of the road leading from Camborne to Pendarves, to the point where the said hedge joins the parapet wall of the Railway Bridge; and from such last-mentioned point crossing the road to a stone post marked L.G.A. 4, to be set up in the south-west corner of a field numbered 1279, and from thence to another stone post marked L.G.A. 5, to be set up in the north-western corner of the last-mentioned field; and from thence in an easterly direction by the boundary hedge between the property of the said G. L. Basset and the glebe lands of the parish of Camborne to a stone post marked L.G.A. 6, to be set up in the southern corner of a field numbered 1325 in the said tithe map and plan; and from thence in a straight line from the last-mentioned post in a north-westerly direction to another stone post marked L.G.A. 7, to be set up in the north-west corner of a field also part of the said glebe lands, numbered 1316 in the said tithe map and plan, and from the said last-mentioned stone by a lane called the Crane-lane, crossing the Redruth and Hayle turnpike-roads to the point where the said Crane-lane, meets a road called the Redruth and Hayle Old-road; and from thence, by the northern hedge of the said Redruth and Hayle Old-road to a stone marked L.G.A. 8, to be set up in the north-west corner of a field numbered 1974 in the said tithe map and plan; and from the last-mentioned stone to another stone marked L.G.A. 9, to be set up in the south-east corner of a plot of land numbered 1885 in the said tithe map and plan and now used as a garden, such last-mentioned boundary which crosses the branch of the West Cornwall Railway to North Roskear Mine also being the boundary between the respective properties of the said G. L. Basset and Mrs. T. Pendarves, or other the parties interested for the time being therein; and from such last-mentioned stone post to the western corner of the wall of the Roskear Churchyard; and from thence in a south-westerly direction by the said turnpike-road (including the whole of such road) to a point where the said road joins the said North Roskear Mine Branch of the West Cornwall Railway; and thence in a southerly direction by the said Branch Railway itself to the point where it joins the main line of the West Cornwall Railway, and from such last-mentioned point, still in a southerly direction by the boundary between the plot of ground numbered 1780 B in the said tithe map and plan and the Old Stray Park Mine boroughs and crossing a road called Stray Park-lane to a stone post marked L.G.A. 10, to be set up in the north-east corner of a field numbered 1738

in the said tithe map and plan; and from thence, by the eastern boundary of such last-mentioned field and of two other fields numbered 1737 and 2284 respectively, to a stone post marked L.G.A. 11, to be set up at the south-eastern extremity of a plot of ground now occupied by a block of houses called Prospect-place, and from such last-mentioned stone post by the back or south-eastern boundary of such houses and premises called Prospect-place, to a road leading from Camborne to Beacon, called Beacon-hill, and crossing such road, thence by the south-eastern boundary of the said field numbered 1894 in the said tithe map and plan, to the said first-mentioned stone post marked L.G.A. 1, as aforesaid.

2. That Gustavus Lambart Basset, Esq., J.P., of Tehidy-park, be Summoning Officer, and take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary, under the hereinbefore recited Local Government Act, for convening a meeting of the ratepayers of the said district of Camborne, to decide as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, within the boundaries of such district as fixed and settled by this present Order; and in case of the failure or inability of the said Gustavus Lambart Basset to discharge such duty of Summoning Officer, that Charles William Reynolds, Esq., J.P., of Trevenson, act in his stead.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 45.)—AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST.

Establishment of a Life Boat on Elizabeth Reef.

THE Colonial Government of New South Wales has given notice, that a life-boat, to aid shipwreck crews, has been moored in the lagoon of Elizabeth Reef.

This dangerous coral reef, which has proved fatal to many vessels, lies at a distance of 350 miles from the Coast of Australia; it is oval shaped, nearly 5 miles long in an east and west direction, and 2½ miles broad. The edges of the reef, with with the exception of a few rocks, are covered at high water.

The entrance to the lagoon, on the north-east side, is in lat. 29° 55' S., long. 159° 6' E.

The following information has been published for the guidance of seamen.

This boat is placed for the purpose of succouring those wrecked on the reef; it is provided with necessary articles for making a voyage to the Australian continent, including provisions, medical stores, chart and compass, &c. Six casks of fresh water (each containing 15 gallons) are fitted as ballast as well as for use. It is requested that the following instructions be observed, viz. :—

That shipwrecked mariners will write a detailed account of the names of the survivors and those lost, also the place they intend to make for; this document is to be deposited in the nun-buoy and left floating at the moorings.

Navigators visiting the boat are requested to leave a report of their visit, with such intelligence as they may wish to communicate. If bound direct to an adjacent port, they are requested to forward any reports that may be found in the nun-buoy.

Banks in Carimata Strait.

THE Netherlands Government has given notice of the following recently discovered banks in Carimata Strait:—

Willem Bank, discovered by H.N.M.S. *Willem*, at the southern entrance of the Strait. It is about half-a-mile in extent north and south, and about a cable broad, and has 3 fathoms water on it, with 6 to 8 fathoms close-to.

Position, lat. 3° 52' 40" S., long. 109° 42' 40" E.

Condor Bank.—The ship *Condor* struck on this shoal, but did stop to examine it; the ship, however, made water immediately after she struck. It lies N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Nangka Island. Position, lat. 2° 22' 20" S., long. 108° 37' 15" E.

BENGAL BAY—ARACAN.

Alteration in Savage Island Light.

The India Office has given notice, that the following alteration has been made in the light on Savage Island, entrance to Akyab Harbour, Aracan.

The fixed white light is changed to a *fixed and flashing* white light, showing a flash *every minute*; its elevation is 95 feet above the level of the sea.

The illuminating apparatus is now dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.
