NOTIFICATION.- No. 4.

Agent at Washington for British Claims, has been instructed, in reply to an enquiry made by him, that he is not to present to the Commissioners any documents which may have been transmitted to him from the Foreign Office or Her Majesty's Legation in the United States on behalf of any claimant, until such claimant shall have filed in the office of the Commission the formal statement of his claim required by Rule I. of the Commissioners, as published on the 16th instant in the Supplement to the London Gazette of the 13th instant, and republished in the Gazette of October 20, and which for the convenience of claimants is here republished:—

Rule I. In addition to the representation of his claim, and the proofs in support thereof, which shall have been presented to his Government, the claimant shall file in the office of the Commission a statement of his claim, in the form of a Memorial, accompanied by twenty printed copies thereof.

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In cases where the amount claimed is less than one thousand dollars, the Memorials will be printed at the expense of the Commission.

One copy of each Memorial will, by the Secretary, be furnished to each Commissioner, and five copies to the Agent of each Government.
