Naples, Aug. 12. The Pope's Galleys continue Itill at Puzzuolo. It is confirmed by all the Advices from the Levane, That the Venetians have befieged Negre-

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pont. The Galleys of this Kingdom, with those comntanded by the Dike of Furfi, which are now employ-ed to Guard these Coatte against the Confairs of Barbaby, have Orders to return into Port: There has hippened an Earthquake at Porro in Calabria, but it did no great Damage.

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no great Damage. Venice, Arg. 28. We have no fielder, advices from the Army of this State than those that gave an Account of their being landed on the Illand of Negrepont, and of their march-ing to attack the chief Forres of it, after having taken a Calle, in which was a very good Garifon. They write from Spalarso of the 74th luftant, That the Regiment of the Count de Strium was artived there; and that the Proveditore Gene-ral Cornaro, having drawn all his Forces together, had: cauled them to Embark with a good Train of Artillery on the Vel-fels that were to carry them to Steriona, where they would Land, and then march to beliege Clim, a place of great Im-portance for its Scituation and the great extent of Country-it commands. We hear from Bolma, That the Baska of that Country had, upon advice of the march of the Imperial For-Country had, upon advice of the march of the Imperial For-ces commanded by Prince Louis of Baden, allembled what Troops he could to oppose them. Two new Galleys and a Galleaffe are building in the Arfenat here.

Vinice, Sept. 3. On Sunday last arrived here a Veffel fromour Fleet, with advice that the Venetians, belides the Caffied mentioned in our laft, had taken the Fort which covered the Bridge of Negrepoir, and that the Serafquier halting, there-upon to inscour the place, there had enfliced a very outlinate and bloody Fight, which concluded with the defeat and flight of the Enemy, though with the loss on our fide of near 2000) Men, of which number it's faid are feueral eminent Officers and other Perfons of Quality; of which you may expect by our next Letters a more particular Relation.

Dantzick, Sept. 1. The Letters from Warfam of the 18th of the last Month tell us that the Queen parted from thence two days before; to meet the King at Lemberg; and that the whole Court would return to War-aw in a Month or fix Weeks. That Sultan Nuradia was marching with a confiderable Body of Tartars to conduct a new Convoy of Provisions to Caminieć; upon which the Crown-General had reinforced the Polish Froops that were poffed in the Neighborhood of that place, and intended to go himfelf with a ftrong Detachement to meet and fight the Enemy if they continued their March. The Count de Dhona, Envoy Ex-

traordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, to renew the ancient Treaties with the Poles, patied through this place fome days ago in his return to Berlin. Vienna, Sept. 3. The Letters from the Camp be fore Belgnade, of the 26th path, give an account. The Count de Ligneville, Colonel of Foot and Adjutant-General, received a Shot in the Trenches the 23d paft, of which he died prefently after. The Express that came from the Elector of Bavaria to acquaint the Emperor, That a Chiaux was arrived in the Camp to defire a Paisport for the Turkith Ambaffadors, is fent back, with directions to fuffer them to pais on with their Train; We do not hear that it's yet refolv'd to what place they shall be brought, but the most likely is Presburg or this City. The Letters from Upper Hungary confirm the taking of Caranfebes and the firing Caffle of Salancar, by the Troops under the Command of General, Veterani: The Garifons of these Fortresses were, according to their Capitulation, to retire with their Wives and Children to Orfona, near the Danube, and accordingly a Convoy was fent with them; but the Impetialitis leaving them within a Mile of the Town, where they thought them out of all danger, the Rafcians inhabiting that Country, who had fome days before poffefied themselves of that place, (putting the whole Garifon to the Sword) unknown to these Turks or their Convoy, fell upon them, and cut them all off; which General Weterani being informed of, he was greatly incenfed against those people for committing fo great a Cruelty, and 'twas not doubted but he would thew them his Refentment of it. The last News we have from the Army commanded by Prince Louis of Baden, is, That having put a Garison into Gradiska, (which place the Inhabitants abandored upon their Approach; fetting at the fame time fire to it) and fent home the Croats, they marched the 25th paft towards Brod ; from whence they would continue their March to joyn the Army before Belgrade : But what was faid of the Defeat of the Bassa of Bosnia, near Gradiska, is not confirmed. The Emperor has it's faid resolved to raise fome new Regiments, which will be put into the con-guered Places. It is believed that the Duke of Lorrain is by this time arrived in the Camp before Belgrade.

Hamburg, Sept. 10. The detach'd Troops of Lunenburg are it's faid ordered to march to Nieuburg, near the Wefer, where they are to expect those of Saxony and Heffe Caffel. The King of Denmark has, we are told, ordered his Forces quartered in Hofftein to Encamp on the Croperheyde, between Gottorp and Rensburg. The Mareschal de Schomberg parted from Berlin the 27th pait, and paffed the 29th through Magdebourg in his journey to Wefel.

Colorie, Sere. 10. The French Minister here has it's faid offered this City a Neutrality, upon condition they do not take in any more Troops ; but hitherto they have not accepted of it. In the mean time we hear that fome French Forces are marching this way; and it's reported their Van-Guard is already artived at Lechemickes about Lix German Miles from hence; and that another Body takes its March by Andernacke, where a Magazine & provided for them.

Bruffels, Sept. 14. Our Governor General parted from hence yelterday, accompanied with the Marquis de Bedmar and the Count d'Ur/el, to vifit the Garidons in Flanders. That of Neupore will be reinforced with another Regiment of Foot, and 3 Troops of Horfe. The French Troops are moving towards the Medife and the Roine. The Letters from the Camp before Bel-

grade tell us, That their Cannon had made a confide-Table Breach in the Wall of the Calille.

Parns Sept. 18. The Court will return on Monday next from Marli. In the mean time there is a difcourfe of the King's going towards Lorrain; and it's faid the. Musketeers have Orders to be in a readinefs to march within 8 days. The 15th inftant died at Chaliot the Duke de Vivonne, Pair and Mareschal of France, General of the Galleys, and Governor of Champagne and Brie. The King has given the Government of Champagne and Brie to the Marefchal Duke of Luxemburg.
