

the district to be called the "Barmouth District," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858; and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated shall, for the purposes of such Act, be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act accordingly.

The boundaries aforesaid commence at low water-mark in the estuary of Mawddach, opposite to a bridge or culvert where the Aberamffra Brook crosses under the turnpike-road leading from Barmouth to Dolgelly, and marked A on the plan appended to the Inspector's report; thence proceeding, westerly, along the shore of the said estuary at low water-mark, and northerly along the sea-shore of Cardigan Bay, at low water-mark to B, opposite the Toisoch Crossing of the Cambrian Railway; thence, easterly, by such crossing to C, on the turnpike-road leading from Barmouth to Harlech; thence, easterly, along the south side of an occupation road (and excluding it) that forms the north side of fields numbered 433, 437, 429, 451, and 452, to D; thence, easterly, along the south side of the parish road called Bwlech-y-clan (and excluding it) to its junction at E with the public footway leading to Cellfawr; thence, southerly, along the west side of the said road which forms the east side of fields numbered 877, 554, 558, 560, 719, 725, and 730, to F, at its junction with the public road leading from Barmouth to Cylfaen; thence south-westerly, along the south side of the said road (and including it) to G, at the point where the said road is crossed by the Aberamffra Brook; thence, southerly, along the Aberamffra Brook to the starting point at A, thus completing the boundaries of the Barmouth District.

2. That Griffith Williams, of Dolgelly, in the county of Merioneth, Gentleman, be Summoning Officer, and take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary, under the said Local Government Act, to decide as to the adoption of the said Act within the boundaries of the said district as fixed and settled by this present Order.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY THE PARISH OF LLANFAIRFECHAN, CARNARVONSHIRE.

WHEREAS a resolution for the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, was passed on the 1st day of November, 1871, by the owners and ratepayers of the parish of Llanfairfechan, in the county of Carnarvon, and notice of such adoption has been given, in writing, to the Local Government Board, by the person required to give the same:

And whereas the said parish is a place with a population of less than 3,000 according to the last census, and proof has been given to the satisfaction of the said Local Government Board, that by reason of special circumstances it is expedient that the said parish should be allowed to adopt the said Act:

Now, therefore, we, the said Local Government Board, do hereby approve of such adoption by the

parish of Llanfairfechan aforesaid, and give notice, that the said Act will, at the expiration of two months from the date of the passing of the aforesaid resolution, have the force of law within the said parish of Llanfairfechan.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that the following Regulations framed in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 4th June, 1870, respecting the situations of Second Class Assistant of Excise in the Department of Inland Revenue, and of Outdoor Officer in the Customs Department, have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury:—

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to be altered on future occasions.

1. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- (a.) That they are natural-born subjects of Her Majesty.
- (b.) That they are of good health and character.
- (c.) That they are on the day of examination within the prescribed limits of age, viz., between 19 and 22 years for an appointment in the Inland Revenue, and between 19 and 25 years for an appointment in the Customs.
- * * * Members of the Naval and Military Services (whether commissioned or non-commissioned) are, for the purposes of competition for appointments in the Civil Service, considered to have, on leaving their former service, the same age as when they entered it.
- (d.) That, if Candidates for the Excise, they are unmarried and without family.

2. Candidates who have served as pupil teachers or schoolmasters in schools under inspection by the Committee of Council on Education, England, or by the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, will be reported specially to those Departments; and such of them as have been trained in normal schools, at the public expense, will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of those Departments, and the concurrence of the Treasury therein, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

3. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

	Marks
1. Handwriting	200
2. Orthography	200
3. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions)	300
4. English Composition	200

4. Candidates failing in any of the above-named subjects will not be eligible.

5. A fee of 15s. will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.
