When the Fireworks began, the King and Prince of Holffein were pleafed to place themfelves in an Hand hard by to fee it. The Body of the Firework confifted in a Caffle, with all its Towers and Flags, which was fo placed as to move upon the Wa-ers, and cher forts of Artificial Fires; Amongft which were fe-great Balls, which, after having in the Air difcharged fome Gra-tadoes, fell into the Water, and, after a little time, rofe up again and filled the Air with great Quantities of Rockets, Stars, Cr. to the great Emerainment of the Beholders: As the Fireworks began, the Trumpets and Kettle-Drums on Board the Ships did their part, moff of the Englift Merchants being 'alfo on Board, added to the Ceremony by their Acclamations.
