Whitehall, Sept. 26.

**H**IS Majesty has been pleased, since the Publishing of his late Declaration Dated the 21st Instant, to Authorize and Empower the Lords-Lieutenants of the several Counties to grant Deputations to such Gentlemen as have been lately removed from being Depury-Lieutenants; and His Majesty has also given Directions to the Right Honourable the Lord Chancellor of England to put into the Commission of the Peace such Gentlemen as have been laid aside, and shall be recommended by the said Lords-Lieutenants.

*Madrid, Sept. 9.* The Count *de Rebenac*, Ambassador Extraordinary from France, arrived here the last Week; and the sixth Instant had a private Audience of the King and the Queen; He has since given notice of his arrival to all the Foreign Ministers residing here. We hear from *Cadix* that several Men of War are fitting out there, which are to go and meet the *New-Spain* Fleet that's expected home. The Marquis *d'Aytona* has taken possession of the Honors belonging to the Quality of Grandee of Spain.

*Rome, Sept. 11.* The Congregation for the Examining the Election of *Cologne* met again the ninth instant. The Cardinal *d'Aguirre* is perfectly recovered. We have advice by the way of *Ancona*, That the Venetians made themselves Masters of *Negrepont* on the 18th of the last Month, of which we must expect a Confirmation.

*Genova, Sept. 14.* The 11th instant parted from hence three Gallies belonging to this State, to Cruise off of *Cosfica*.

*Warsaw, Sept. 11.* The Letters from *Lemberg* inform us, That the King was arrived at *Zolkiew*, and that after two or three days stay there, he would go to the Army, which was composed of 25000 Men. That Sultan *Nuradin*, with a very considerable Body of Tartars, lay Encamped not far from them, having with him a Convoy of Provisions, which he would endeavour to put into *Caminiec*, the Garrison whereof began to be in some necessity; but the Poles being posted between the Enemy and that place, it was hoped he would not be able to execute his Design. We have Advice that the States of *Vajachia* are very inclinable to put themselves under the Emperor's Protection, as those of *Transylvania* have done. We have not of late had any certain Advices concerning the Forces of the Moscovites.

*Vienna, Sept. 19.* The Elector of *Bavaria* returned hither last night from *Belgrade*; and the Duke of *Lorraine* will be likewise here in two or three days, the principal Actions of the Campaign being over, and the Imperial Forces divided into several Bodies to reduce the places the Turks are still possessed of in

*Hungary*, which in the present Confusion of their Affairs will doubtless make very little resistance. The Rascians are got into a Body, to the number of about 8000, between *Semendria* and *Nissa*, being besides their old Feuds, lately exasperated by the burning of their Houses, and the destroying of their Fields, by *Yeghen* Bassa; which he did to hinder the Imperialists from following him in his disorderly Retreat from *Belgrade*: They have sent to the Germans, to desire some Troops to direct and discipline them; and then they do not question but to possess themselves in a very short time of *Sophia*, and to unite to the Emperor's Interests the Bulgarians and Greeks; and these great Promises will not seem strange, considering the present State of the Ottoman Empire. The Prince of *Savoy*, the Prince of *Commercy*, the Count *de Apremont*, and the Count *d'Aversberg*, will be brought hither to be cured of their Wounds. It's said, That in the Siege of *Belgrade* there were of the Christians about 4000 killed and wounded. The Bassa of that place is ordered to be carried to *Newstar*. The Emperor has disposed of the two Regiments lately commanded by the Counts of *Scherffemberg* and *Furstenberg*, the first to Count *Guido de Staremberg*, and the other to the Count *de Cauritz*. This day their Imperial Majesties, the King of *Hungary*, the Queen Dowager of *Poland*, and their Electoral Highnesses of *Bavaria*, with the whole Court, assisted at a great Procession, and at *Te Deum*, which was sung in the great Church of *St. Stephen*, for the taking of *Belgrade*; after which the Cannon were thrice discharged round the Town. And on the One and twentieth instant the like Solemnity will be performed here for the great Victory obtained by the Imperial Forces in *Bosnia*; Of which we have these farther particulars: That the Bridge the Imperialists had laid over the *Save* at *Brod*, being finished, Prince *Louis* caused his Baggage to pass it on the third instant, and all things to be prepared the next day, as if he intended to follow himself with the Army, which he did with a design to draw the Bassa of *Bosnia*, who was Encamped at *Terwent*, about five Miles from *Brod*, out of his Intrenchments; But finding the Bassa did not stir, and knowing it would be the certain loss of all he had gained to leave that Body of Men behind him, and being misinformed (as we said in our last) as to their number, he marched the 4th instant in the Evening, and passing through strait and difficult ways arrived the next morning by break of day near the Enemies Camp, but their advanced Guard giving the Alarm, the Bassa immediately put his Troops into Order of Battel, the Horse in two Wings, and the Foot in the middle: The Prince too divided his into two Wings; the Command of the Right he gave to Count *Piccolomini*, and the left to Count *Caselli*, both Generals of Battalia, and in this order expected the Enemy, who fell very furiously upon our left Wing, and gave 3 fierce Charges; but not being able to bear any longer the Shock of our Troops, they fled; and were quickly followed by the other Wing, leaving

ving about 7000 Foot to shift for themselves; These made a brave Defence for about an hour, but our Horse breaking in upon them, they were all slain except 2000, who had Quarter given them. The Imperialists had this advantage, that they were on the side of a Hill when the Enemy attackt them. We lost but 150 Men in this great action, the chief of which was Captain *Maratulle*, with two Lieutenants, and the Prince of *Hanover* was slightly wounded in the Hand, and the Count de *Crosfeldt* in the Neck; And the Turks have lost all *Bosnia* by the Defeat of these Forces. The Elector of *Bavaria* will return in few days to *Munich*.

*Vienna, Sept. 19.* We have advice, That Prince *Louis of Baden* had, after the Defeat of the Turkish Forces commanded by the Bassa of *Bosnia*, taken *Bagnalucia*, a place of considerable Strength, and that he intended; so soon as the Reinforcement he expected from the Imperial Army had joynd him, to attack *Serain*, the Capital City of that Province.

*Cologne, Sept. 27.* We are expecting here 2000 Men more of the Troops of the Circle, for the reinforcement of this Garrison, which is at present commanded by the Baron d'*Aubach*. It's said, That the general Rendezvous of the Confederate Forces is appointed between this place and *Dunbourg*. We hear from *Bonn*, That they are making a Bridge there over the *Rhine*. The Electoral Prince *Palatine* is returned from *Hydelburg* to *Dufelders*, with his Brother the Great Master of the *Teutonic Order*.

*Cleves, Sept. 29.* The Comillary-General *Gromskow* is arrived at *Nimeguen* with the *Brandenburg* Troops that are enred into the Service of *Holland*. They write from *Berlin*, That more Troops are marching this way.

*Haue, Octob. 2.* The States of *Holland*, who were adjourned for 2 or 3 days, assembled again on Wednesday last; They have still before them the matter about the Prohibition of French Commodities. The Prince of *Orange* returned hither the 30th past from *Orieren*, having on the 28th seen the Troops encamped near *Nimeguen*. The Prince of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Frisland* and *Groningen*, is gone back to *Lemerdon*. We hear from *Vienna*, That the Elector of *Bavaria* arrived there the 18th of the last month from *Hungary*, and that he would in 2 or 3 days return to *Germany*, to command, as 'twas said, an Army on the *Rhine*.

*Bresse, Octob. 1.* We have advice, That the French Troops have invested *Philipsburg*; That the Dauphin will be here that place on the 5th of the next month with an Army of 22000 Foot, and 12000 Horse, commanded under him by the Marschal de *Duras*; and that the French will be opened the 7th: And that the Marquis de *Bosjiers* will at the same time, with another Body, attack *Keiserlauter* in the Palatinate. On this side the French Forces are drawing together between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, and a Campaign is marked out for them at *la Bouffiere*; They will be commandd by the Marschal d'*Humers*. There are Letters from *Vienna* which say, That *Temeswaer* was surrendered to the Imperialists.

*Paris, Octob. 2.* The Dauphin parted from *Versailles* the 25th past, and lay that night at *Meaux*, the 26th at *Monmiral*, the 27th at *Frechampsoise*, the 28th at *Astheres*, and the 29th at *Semouille*, from whence he continued his Journey, by the way of *Toul*, towards *Wessingbourg*. The last Week the *Sieur Pimentis* delivered to the King a Letter from the Emperor, acquainting him with the taking of *Belgrade*: The Count de *la Tour de Taxis*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, has likewise had Audience of the King on the same occasion. It's said that some French Troops are entred into *Avignon*. We are told, That *Philipsburg* is in a condition to make a very good Defence, there being in the place a Garrison

of 4000 Men commanded by a Count of *Staremburg*, a brave Soldier.

*Deale, Sept. 25.* Yesterday sailed out of the Downs a Fleet of about 70 Sail of Merchant-ships outward bound.

*Whitehall, Sept. 26.* The 23d instant the Count de *Reventlaw*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark*, had his Audience of Leave of the Queen Dowager, and the 25th of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Wales*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel*, Master of the Ceremonies.
