Whitehall, Sept. 26:



I.S. Majefty has been pleafed; fince, the Publishing of his late Declaration Earted the 21ft Inftant, to Authorize, and Empower, the Lords-Lieutenants of the leveral Counties

to grant Deputations to firch Gentlemen as have been lately removed from being Deputy-Lieutenants; and His Majefty has also given Directions to the Right Horourable the Lord Chancellor of England to put into the Commission of the Peace, fuch Gentlemen as have been laid afide, and shall be recommended by the faid Lords-Lieutenants.

Matrid, Sept. 9. The Count de Rebenac; Amballador Excordinary from France, arrived here the laft Week; and the fixth Inftant had a private Audience of the King and the Queen; He has fince given notice of his arrival to all the Foreign Ministers refiding here. We hear from Cadiz that leveral Men of War are fitting out there, which are to go and meet the New-Spain Fleet that's expected home. The Marquis. d'Aytona has taken poffeition of the Honors belonging to the Quality of Grandee of Spain.

Rome, Sept. 11. The Congregation for the Examining the Election of Cologne met again the ninth inftant. The Cardinal *d'Aguirre* is perfectly recovered. We have advice by the way of Ancona, That the Venetians made themielves Mafters of Neurepont on the 18th of the last Month, of which we must expect a Confirmation.

Genoua, Sept. 14. The 11th inftant parted from hence three Galleys belonging to this State, to Cruife off of Corfica.

Wajfan, Sept. 11. The Letters from Lemberg inform us, That the King was arrived at Zolkiew, and that after two or three days ftay there, he would go to the Army, which was composed of 25000 Men. That Sultan Nuradin, with a very confiderable Body of Tartars, lay Encamped not far from them, having with him a Convoy of Provisions, which he would endeavour to put into Caminiee; the Garilon whereof began to be in fome necessity; but the Poles being poffed between the Enemy and that place, it was hoped he would not be able to execute his Defign. We have Advice that the States of Valachia are very inclinable to put themfelves inder the Emperor's Protection, as those of Transfiloania have done. We have not of late had any certain Advices concerning the Forces of the Moscovites.

Vienna; Sept: 19.) The Elector of Bavaria returned hither laft fight from Belgrade; and the Duke of Lorrain will be likewife here in two or three days, the principal Actions of the Campagne being over, and the Imperial Forces divided into leveral Bodies to reduce, the places the Turks are fill poffetfied of in Hungary, which in the prefent Confusion of their Af-fairs will doubtless make very little refitance. The Rafcians are got into a Body, to the number of about 8000; between Semendria and Niffa, being, befiles their old Feuds, lately exafperated by the burning , of their Houles, and the deftroying of their Fields, by Teghen Balla; which he did to hinder the Imperiality from following him in his diforderly Retreat from Bela. grade: They have fent to the Germans, to defire fome Froops to direct and discipline them; and then they do not queftion but to pollefs themfelves in a very flort time of Sophia, and to unite to the Emperor's Interefts the Bulgarians and Greeks; and these great Promises will not seem strange considering the present State of the Ottoman Empire. The Prince of Savoy, the Prince de Commercy, the Count de Afpremont, and the Count d'Aversbeig, will be brought hither to be cured of their Wounds. It's faid, That in the Siege of Belgrade there were of the Chriftians about 4000 killed and wounded. The Baffa of that place is ordered to be carried to Neue The Emperor has difposed of the two Regiments liat. lately commanded by the Counts of Scherffemberg and Furftemberg, the first to Count Guido de Staremberg, and the other to the Count de Caunitz. This day their Imperial Majefties, the King of Hungary, the Queen Dowager of Poland, and their Electoral Highneffes of Bavaria, with the whole Court, affifted at a great Broceffion, and at Te Deum, which was fung in the great Church of St. Stephen, for the taking of Belgrade; after which the Cannon were thrice difcharged round the Town. And on the One and twentieth inftant the like Solemnity will be performed here for the great Victory obtained by the Imperial Forces in Bojnia; Of which we have thefe farther particulars: That the Bridge the Imperialifts had laid over the Save at Brod, being finished, Prince Louis caused his Baggage to pass it on the third instant, and all things to be prepared the next day, as if he intended to follow himsfelf with the Army, which he did with a defign to:draw the Baffa of Bofnia, who was Encamped at Terment, about five Miles from Brad; out of his Intrenchments ; But finding the Baffa did not flir, and knowing it would be the certain loss of all he had gained to leave that Body of Men behind him, and being mignformed (as we faid in our lait) as to their number, he marched the 4th inftant in the Evening, and paffing through finait and difficult ways are rived the next morning by break of day near the E-nemics Camp, but their advanced Guard giving the Allarm, the Baffa immediately put his Troops into Order of Battel, the Hoife in two Wings, and the Foot in the middle : The Prince too divided his into two Wings; the Command of the Right he gave to Count Piccolomini, and the left to Count Cafiellis. both Generals of Batallia, and in this order expected the Enemy, who fell very furionfly upon our left Wing, and gave 3 fierce Charges; but not being able to bear any longer the Shock of our Troops, they fled, and were quickly followed by the other Wing, leasn 102

made a brave Defence for about an hour, but our Horie breaking in upon them, they were all flain except 2000, who had Quarter given them. The Imperialifts had this advantage, that they were on the fide of a Hill, when the Enemy attackt them. We lost but 150 Mon in this great action, the chief of which was Captain Maraville, with two Lieutenants, and the Prince of Hanoner was ilightly wounded in the Hand, and the Count de Crossfeldt in the Neck ; And the Turks. have loft all Bofnia by the Defeat of these Forces. The Elector of Bavaria will return in few days to Municke,

Vienna, Sept. 19. We have advice, That Prince Louis of Baden had, after the Defeat of the Turkilh Forces commanded by the Balla of Bolmia, taken Bagnaluca, a place of confiderable Strength, and that he intended; to foon as the Reinforcement he expected from the Imperial Army had joyned him, to attack Sergio, the Capital City of that Province.

Cologne, Sept. 27. We are expecting here 2000 Men more of the Troops of the Circle, for the reinforcement of this Garifon, which is at prefent com-manded by the Baron d'Aubach. It's faid, That the general-Rendezvous of the Confederate Forces is appointed between this place and Dubbourg. We hear from Bonns, That they are making a Bridge there over the Rhme. The Electoral Prince Palatine is returned from Hydelburg to Dufelderf, with his Brother

the Great Mafter of the Teutonick Order. Cleves, Sept. 29. The Cominillary-General Gromskow is arrived at N. meguen with the Brandenburg Troops that are entred into the Service of Holland. They write from Ber-lin, That more Troops are marching this way.

The States of Holland, who were Ha ue; Octob. 2. adjourned for 2 or 3 days, affembled again on Wed-defday laft; They have still before them the matter about the Prohibition of French Commodities. The Prince of Orange returned hither the 30th pails from Dierer, having on the 28th feen the froops encamped near Nunequent. The Prince of Naffatt, Stadtholder of File and and Groningen, is gone back to Leemaerdin. We hear from Vieuna, That the Elector of Bavaria anived there the 18th of the last month from Hingary, and that he would in 2 or 3 days return to Germany, to command, as, 'twas laid, an Arn y on the *Rb nc*.

We have advice, That the French Briffes, Ociob. 1. Troops have invested Philipsburg; I hat the Dauphin will be be o e that place on the 5th of the next month. with an Army of 22000 Foot, and 12000 Horte, commanded under him by the Marefchal de Duras; and that the Irenches will be opened the 7th : And that the Minquis de Bonjiers will at the fame stime, with another Body, attack Keyferlahter in the Palatinate. On this fide the French Forces are drawing together between the Sembre and the Menfe, and a Carr p. is marked out for them at la Bouffiere ; They will be commandell by the Marefelial d Humueres. There are Letters from Vienna which lay, That Temestoaer was forrendfiel to the Imperialifts.
