LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A DISTRICT TO BE STYLED THE DISTRICT OF PRESTON, IN THE COUNTY OF SUSSEX.

WHEREAS a Petition has been presented to the Local Government Board from ratepayers resident within the parish of Preston, in the county of Sussex, praying for the settlement of boundaries of a district to be styled the "District of Preston," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858.

And whereas the said Petition set forth the proposed boundaries of the district, and was signed by one-tenth of the ratepayers resident within such boundaries, and inquiry has since been made as to the genuineness of the said Petition, and the propriety of the proposed boundaries, by John Thornhill Harrison, Esquire, the Inspector appointed by the Local Government Board for that purpose.

Now, therefore, we, the said Local Government Board, after consideration of the matter, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in us by the Local Government Act, 1858, and the Local Government Board Act, 1871, make order:—

That from and after the date of this present order the boundaries hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in and accompanying the report of the said Inspector, bearing date the 2nd day of May, 1872, shall form and constitute the boundaries of the district to be

called the "Preston District" for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858, and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated, shall for the purposes of such Act be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act accordingly.

The boundaries hereinbefore referred to are the following; that is to say: on the north, the boundary of the parish of Patcham; on the south, the boundary of the parish of Brighton; on the east, the road known as the Ditchling-road: such part of the said road as lies within the parish of Preston to be included in the said district; and on the west, the extreme westernmost boundary of the line of railway from Brighton to London, known as the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway.

And we do hereby appoint John Robson Hawkins, late Churchwarden of the parish of Preston aforesaid, to be Summoning Officer, under the provisions of section 16 of the Local Government Act, 1858, and to take such steps as may be necessary for convening a meeting to decide as to the adoption of the said Act within the said district, and to discharge all other duties which devolve on him as such Summoning Officer.
