We have Advice from Bolnia, that the Turks had fent some Troops to attack Novi, sitriated on the River Unna, above Castanovitza, which hindered their Incursions on that fide, but that they were regulfed by the Croats in Garifon there, with confiderable lois. The Letters from the Polish Camp near Caminiec, of the 29th paff, tellus, that part of the Army had been engaged with the Tartars, and had put them to flight. The 21th Initant To Deum was fung here for the late great Victo y in Bojnia. The Advice of Teghen's retreat from Nista is confirmed.

Ratisbonne, Septemb. 27. We hear from Hungary that the Imperial Army is separated; several Regiments being sent to reinsorce Prince Louis of Badenin Bosnia; and General Veterani on the Frontiers of Valachia; and the rest going to their Winter Quarters. The 20th Instant Te. Deum was fung here with the Solemnity usual on the like occasions, for the taking of Belgrade, the Capital City of Servia, confiderable for its largenels, and fituation on a Hill, near the Danube and Save, which renders it very ftrong, and convenient for Trade. Amurat II. and Mahomee II. be-Rieged it in the years 1442, and 1456, but unsuccessfully; Solymon II. at last took it in 1521. and it has ever since Continued in the hands of the Turks, notwithstanding all the Efforts of the Christians to recover it, till now, that it has pleased God to Crown the Imperial Arms with this important Conquest.

Francfort, Sept. 30. The French Troops under the Command of Monsieur de Monclar have invested Philipsburg; and the Marquis de Boufflers is with another Body of Men before Keylerstauter. The City of Spire having, upon the approach of the French Forces, fent Deputies to the Mareschal Duras, it was agreed, that they should receive a Garison of 2000 Men. We hear from Mentz, that they had broke down their Bridge over the Rhine.

Hamburg, Octob. 1. We are told from Berlm, that the Elector of Brandenburg had ordered three Regiments more to march towards Cleves. They write, from Copenhagen,

that the Danish Fleet lay ready to fail.

Cologne, October 1. The French Minister here continues to prefs these Magistrates to embrace a Neutrality; but they are so far from accepting of it, that they have resolved to take in 2000 Men more of the Troops of the Circle. The General Rendezvous of the Confederate Forces is, it's faid, appointed to be between this Place and Duisbourg. The Bridge at Bonne is finished.
