THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that *The Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to apply the sum of eight million pounds out of the Consolidated Fund to the service of the year ending the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

An Act for amending the law in certain cases in relation to naturalization.

An Act for the better protection of infant life.

An Act for enabling the Great Southern and Western Railway Company to effect a communication between their railway and the North Wall, Dublin, and the works of the London and North-Western Railway Company at the North Wall, Dublin; and for other purposes.

An Act to incorporate a Company for making the Ryde and Newport Railway; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Athenry and Tuam Railway Company, to extend their railway to Claremorris; and for other purposes.

An Act to incorporate a Company for making a subway under the River Thames, to be called "The Temple Subway."

An Act for connecting the Glasgow and Kilmarnock Joint Line of Railway, and the Hamilton Branch of the Caledonian Railway, with the city of Glasgow Union Railway; and for other purposes.
