THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as The Markets Order of 1872.

2. This Order extends to Great Britain only.

3. Words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

4. Every Local Authority is hereby empowered to make from time to time, with the view of preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disease among animals, regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:—

(1.) For requiring the owners, lessees, or occupiers of places used for the holding of markets, fairs, exhibitions, or sales of animals, or for the lairage of animals, to cleanse those places from time to time at their own expense:

(2.) For requiring the owners, lessees, or occupiers of those places to disinfect the same, or any specified part thereof, from time to time at their own expense, where, in the judgment of the Local Authority, the circumstances are such as to allow of such disinfection being reasonably required:

(3.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and such disinfection shall be effected.

5. Notwithstanding anything in The Animals Order of 1871, Article 39 of that Order shall not apply to the cleansing and disinfecting of any such place as aforesaid.

6. If the owner, lessee, or occupier of any such place as aforesaid does any act in contravention of the regulations of a Local Authority under this Order, or fails in any respect to observe the same, it shall not be lawful for him or any other person

at any time thereafter, until further Order of the Privy Council, to hold a market, fair, exhibition, or sale of animals in that place, and the holding therein of any market, fair, exhibition or sale of animals shall be and the same is hereby prohibited accordingly, and if any person holds any market, fair, exhibition, or sale of animals in contravention of this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

the Austrian Government for supplying the Kingdom of Poland with salt, the Russian Government will cease to renew the engagement, and that from the 1st of January, 1873, private individuals will have the right of importing into Poland salt by the Prussian and Austrian frontiers, and of selling it on the same terms as in the other parts of the Empire.

Now therefore, I, as the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1871," do hereby order that the Fairs which have been annually held on the 24th day of August, in the public street of the town of South Benfleet, and on the 24th day of June in Canvey Island, both in the parish of South Benfleet, in the Petty Sessional Division of Rochford, in the county of Essex, shall be abolished as from the date of this order.

SANITARY AND SEWAGE UTILIZATION ACTS.

ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A DISTRICT TO BE STYLED THE SPECIAL DRAINAGE DISTRICT OF BUNTINGFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF HERTFORD.

WHEREAS a Petition has been presented to the Local Government Board from ratepayers resident within the town of Buntingford, in the county of Hertford, praying for the settlement of boundaries of a special drainage district for the purposes of the Sanitary and Sewage Utilization Acts.

And whereas the said Petition set forth the proposed boundaries of the district, and was signed by one-tenth of the ratepayers resident within such boundaries, and inquiry has since been made as to the genuineness of the said Petition, and the propriety of the proposed boundaries, by Robert Morgan, Esquire, the Inspector appointed by the Local Government Board for that purpose.

Now, therefore, we, the said Local Government Board, after consideration of the matter, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in us by the Sewage Utilization Act, 1867, and the Local Government Board Act, 1871, make order :—

That from and after the date of this present Order the boundaries hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in and accompanying the report of the said Inspector,

bearing date the 28th day of June, 1872, shall form and constitute the boundaries of the special drainage district of Buntingford, for the purposes of the Sanitary and Sewage Utilization Acts :—

The boundaries hereinbefore referred to commence at the point marked A, on the said plan, on the west side of the Ware, Hadham, and Buntingford Railway; thence the said boundaries extend northward, along the west side of the said railway for a distance of one hundred yards, to the point marked B; thence westward to the point marked C, where the River Rib crosses the road from Aspeden to Buntingford; thence westward, and crossing the said river and road, along the south fence of the field numbered 108, on the said plan, the property of Sir Henry Lushington, to the point marked D, at the south-west corner of that field; thence northward, along the east side of fields, numbered respectively 106, 105, and 103, also the property of Sir Henry Lushington, to the point marked E, at the north-east corner of the field numbered 103; thence westward, along the north side of that field, to the point marked F; thence northward, across the allotment numbered 22, the property of Sarah and Ann Green, Spinsters, and along the west side of the allotments numbered respectively 20 and 21, 18 and 19, and 17, to the point marked G; thence westward, along the south side of the fields numbered respectively 271, 268, and 267, to the point marked H; thence northward, along the west side of the field numbered 267, to the road leading from Buntingford to Cottered; thence northward, crossing the said road, and along the west side of the field numbered 322, the property of the said Sir Henry Lushington, and the allotments numbered respectively 5 and 4, the property of the executors of the late John Farquharson, to the point marked I; thence eastward, along the north side of the allotments numbered 4 and 2, to the point marked K, on the west side of the turnpike-road between Ware and Royston; thence northward, along the west side of the said turnpike-road for a distance of forty yards, to the point marked L; thence, crossing the said turnpike-road and pound, and eastward along the south side of the field numbered 22, the property of William Butt, Esquire, to the point marked M, on the east side of the River Rib; thence southward, along the east side of the River Rib, and including it, to the point marked N; thence eastward, along the fence between the lands numbered respectively 159 and 162, to the point marked O; thence southward, along the west side of the fields the property of the executors of the late Captain Young, and numbered respectively 163 and 164, to the point marked P; thence southward, along the east side of the building land belonging to the National Free Land Society, numbered 170; thence southward, along the east side of the fields numbered respectively 182, 183, and 185, to the point marked Q; thence eastward, along the north and east sides of the field numbered 184, to the road leading to Harestreet; thence crossing the said road and westward along the south side of the fields numbered respectively 191, 190, and 189 to the point marked R; thence southward, along the west side of the fields numbered 192, 39, 38, and 33, the property of William Butt, Esquire, to the point marked S; thence crossing the field numbered 32, to the road leading to Owl's Hill; thence southward, and crossing the field numbered 30, the property of the said William Butt, Esquire, the field numbered 29, the property of the said Sarah and Ann Green, the field numbered 28, the property of F. G. Hobson, the field num-

bered 27, the property of the executors of the late John Farquharson, and the field numbered 21, the property of William Dellon, to the point marked T, in the field numbered 20, the property of George Burr, Esquire; thence eastward, across the said field, to the turnpike-road leading from Ware to Royston; thence crossing the said turnpike-road, and westward along the south side of the allotment numbered 42, and crossing the Ware, Hadham, and Buntingford Railway, to the starting-point marked A.

FALMOUTH HARBOUR.

REMOVAL OF SHINGLE PROHIBITED.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 54 Geo. III., cap. 159, that "in order to prevent damage being done to the shores or banks of the ports, harbours, or havens in this kingdom, no person or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary, for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by Order under their hands, or the hands of any three of them, or the hands of his or their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds."
