THE King having declared His Resolution to Preserve the Church of England in all its Rights and Immunities, His Majesty, as an Evidence of it, has signified His Pleasure to the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of *Winchester*, as Visitor of *St. Mary Magdalen College in Oxford*, to settle that Society Regularly and Statutably.

Amongst those of the Nobility that continue to offer their Service to His Majesty is the Lord Marquis of *Winchester*.

London, Octob. 13. On Thursday last Sir *John Chapman*, named Lord Mayor in the Instrument for Restitution of the Cities Franchises, was, at a Common Hall, according to ancient Custom, elected Lord Mayor for the year ensuing. Sir *Humphrey Edwin*, and Mr. *John Fleet* (upon whom His Majesty has been since pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood,) were elected Sheriffs; And Sir *Peter Rich* Chamberlain of this City. There was on this Occasion a very great appearance of the Citizens; And the whole Proceeding was with great Order and Unanimity.

THE following Addresses have been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, of Your Majesties ancient and ever Loyal City of *Exeter*.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being very sensible of the great Happiness that we, as well as all other Your Majesties Subjects, do enjoy under Your most Gracious and Favourable Government, do at this time, when Your Majesty hath declared You have received undoubted Advice of an Invasion to be made on these Your Majesties Kingdoms, crave leave to re-assure Your Majesty, that, as in Duty and Allegiance we are bound, so by our own Inclination and ardent Affection, for the Preservation of Your Majesties Government, we shall always be ready to stand by and assist Your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes against all Your Enemies whatsoever. And that the Great God of Heaven, who hath hitherto preserved Your Royal Person from such great and imminent Dangers, and made

You Triumphant over all Your Enemies, may still continue to Protect Your most Sacred Person, to be a farther Blessing to these Nations; and all the Designs formed against Your Royal Person and Government may be confounded, and Your Enemies ever fall before You, shall be the daily and hearty Prayers of Your most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

In Testimony whereof we have caused our Common Seal to be hereunto affixed, the 9th day of October, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesties Reign, Annoq; Dom. 1688.

Great SIR!

THE surprizing Account which Your Majesties Proclamation gives us of a Foreign Invasion, as it is in us that just Indignation, which we ought to have against the Enemies of our Country, and fills us with Horror and Detestation, that any of Your Majesties Subjects should so far forget all the Obligations of Nature and Gratitude, as to promote such an Enterprize, so it makes us emulous upon so Glorious an Occasion, to shew Your Majesty that we are not degenerated from the ancient Courage and Allegiance of True English-men; We do therefore heartfully offer Your Majesty our most ready and vigorous Concurrence, to the very utmost of our Powers, upon so pressing an Emergency; being firmly resolved to employ our Lives and Fortunes in the Defence of Your Majesties Crown and Dominions; and we doubt not but all Your Majesties Subjects will unite in so just a Cause; and that Your Majesties Heroick Example will inspire them with so Generous a Warmth in it, as will render all Foreign Assistance useless, and make this [88] as illustrious in the English Annals as the last was, there being nothing too Triumphant to be expected; under God, from the Courage of True English-men, under the Influence and Conduct of a Prince, who hath heretofore so often made Victory familiar to them. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our Hands, and fix'd our Common Seal, the 8th day of October, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesties Reign, Anno Domini 1688.

From the Venetian Camp before *Clin*, September 13. General *Cornaro* having landed his Forces and Artillery at *Scardona*, gave Orders for their march; And on the 26th of the last month the whole Army arrived before this Place. The 27th the Troops took their Posts; And we began a Line of Circumvallation, and fortified the same with several Redoubts. The 28th an Officer was sent to summon the Garrison, which they answered with a volley of Small-shot: The Night following the Trenches were opened. The 29th we began to batter the Place with our Cannon and Mortars, which did great Execution.

execution. The 30th we had made a considerable Breach in the first Wall, which the Besieged endeavoured to repair, but our Cannon quickly ruined their Work. And on the first instant our Trenches were advanced so far, and the Breach was made so large, that it was resolved to give an Assault, which was made accordingly the next day, with that Resolution and Success, that our Men, notwithstanding the vigorous Opposition of the Enemy, mounted the Breach, and having lodged themselves there, obliged the Enemy to retire within their second Wall or Intrenchment. The 3d and 4th we raised several new Batteries, from whence we greatly annoyed the Enemy. The 5th we understood by a Deserter, that a Bomb had set fire to one of their Magazines of Powder, which blew up and kill'd many of the Inhabitants. The 6th and 7th we continued to make use of our Batteries with good effect. On the 8th we had made a large Breach in the second Wall. The 9th we understood the Enemy began to be in great want of Water, and that they could not hold out many days longer. The 10th and 11th we continued to play upon the Town with our Cannon and Mortars as before, and it was resolved to storm it the next day, but before we began the Assault, the Enemy hung out a white Flag, and presently after sent two Aga's to General Cornaro, to desire they might march out with their Arms and Baggage; But this being rejected, the Garrison surrendered the same day at discretion; The Bassa Attalick (who was formerly Bassa of *Alba Regalis* and *Bosnia*,) and his Son, were brought to General Cornaro, who received them very courteously; about 400 Men, able to bear Arms, and 800 Women and Children, were made Slaves, and 160 Christians were released; We found in the place 20 pieces of Cannon, and a good Quantity of Provisions and Ammunition. The Troops Commanded by Signior Fenzì have taken *Verlicca*, situate on the River *Cettina*, between this place and *Singn*.

Hague, Octob. 16. The Dutch Fleet has suffered very much by the late Storms; And the Vice-Admiral of *Zealand* is quite disabled. The Troops in the mean time lie ready to go on Shipboard with the first fair Wind, and some of them are already embark'd at *Rotterdam* and the *Texel*. The Prince of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friesland* and *Groningen*, will remain here.

Paris, Octob. 16. The 6th instant the Dauphin arrived in the Camp before *Philipsbourg*, which was invested the 27th of the last month; The Marschal Duke de *Duras* came to receive him at the head of the Bridge, which was laid over the *Rhine* near *Germersheim*: The same day the Dauphin visited the Quarters, and observed the situation of the Place. The 7th he went to see the Artillery disembark'd, which was brought down the *Rhine*, and afterwards to view the Bridge made below *Philipsbourg*; The Besieged in the mean time played their Cannon very warmly. The Fort on this side the *Rhine* was taken the 6th, after an attack of two days, wherein we lost but 6 or 7 Men, of which number was the Sieur de la Loge, Captain in the Regiment of *Picardie*; Besides the Artillery that was in the Fort, several pieces of Cannon more were placed there, with which they began the 7th to batter the Hornwork, in order to ruine the Defences, and to make afterwards a Line of Communication between the two Attacks that were begun along the River above and below the Place. The 8th the Sieur de la *Londe* and the Sieur *Pigeon* two Engineers, were killed with a Cannon shot as they were giving directions about carrying on the Works. The 10th at night the Trenches were opened on the

side of the great Attack, with the loss of six men; the Marquis de *Gersey* had the same day his right hand shot off. The Army is composed of 40 Battalions, and 15000 Horse; and it is said there is in the place 2000 Foot and 100 Horse. The Kings Troops are entered into *Nürm*, *Spre*, *Neistadt*, and other places in the *Palatinate*. The 11th instant the Count de la *Tour Taxis* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, had his Audience of Leave of the King at *Fontainebleau*, We have advice that the Venetians have taken *Negrepont*, but it needs a confirmation.

Whitehall, Octob. 12. On Sunday last the Right Reverend *Timothy Hal*, Bishop Elect of *Oxon*, was consecrated at *Lambeth* by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*, assisted by the Bishops of *Chichester* and *Chester*.
