**W** Hereas in the Charters, Patents or Grants, made to several Cities, Boroughs and Towns Corporate, a Power is reserved to His Majesty by His Order in Council, to remove, displace and discharge the Mayors, Sheriffs, Recorders, Town-Clerks, Aldermen, Common-Council-Men, Assistants, Officers, Magistrates, Ministers, Freeman, and other Members of the same: His Majesty is this Day in Council pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered accordingly, That all Mayors, Sheriffs, Recorders, Town-Clerks, Aldermen, Common-Council-Men, Assistants, Officers, Magistrates, Ministers, Freeman, and other Members of the said respective Cities, Boroughs and Towns Corporate, which have, or claim such Offices or Places by Charter, Patent or Grant from the late King of blessed Memory, or from His Majesty since the Year 1679. (except such Cities and Towns in His Majesties Proclamation named, whose Deeds of Surrender are Inrolled, or against whom Judgments in Quo Warranto are Entered) be removed, displaced and discharged, in pursuance of the Power reserved as aforesaid; And they, and every of them, are hereby removed, displaced and discharged accordingly.

**W** Hereas in the Charters, Patents, or Grants made to several Cities, Burroughs, and Towns Corporate, a Power is reserved to Us to Remove, Displace and Discharge, by Order under Our Signet and Sign Manual, the Mayors, Sheriffs, Recorders, Town-Clerks, Aldermen, Common Council-men, Assistants, Officers, Magistrates, Ministers, Freeman, and other Members of the same; We do accordingly hereby Remove, Displace, and Discharge all Mayors, Sheriffs, Recorders, Town-Clerks, Aldermen, Common-Council-men, Assistants, Officers, Magistrates, Ministers, Freeman, and other Members of Our said respective Cities, Burroughs, and Towns Corporate, which have or claim such Offices or Places by Charter, Patent, or Grant from the late King Our most Dear Brother of Ever Blessed Memory, or from Us, since the Year 1679. (except such Cities and Towns in Our Proclamation named, whose Deeds of Surrender are Inrolled, or against whom Judgments in Quo Warranto are entered, and they and every of them are hereby removed, displaced and discharged accordingly, in pursuance of the Power reserved to us as aforesaid. Whereof all Persons concerned are hereby required to take notice. Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the 17th day of October, 1688. in the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

Cologne, Octob. 17. The 10th instant the Sieur Carrich, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, arrived here from Munich, with the original Bull by which the Pope confirms the Election of Prince Clement of Bavaria to this Archbishoprick; The 12th it was published in the Cathedral Church, and then Te Deum being sung, the Prince de Croÿ, one of the Canons, having a Procuration from the said Prince for that purpose, took possession in his name of this Archbishoprick and Electorate, and afterwards of the Archiepiscopal Palace, with the requisite Solemnity, though none of the Canons of the Cardinal's Party were present at it; But we are told that several of them that were with him at Rome are since this Publication retired from thence. The French Minister continues to press these Magistrates to accept of the Neutrality he has proposed to them. We hear that 3400 Men of the Forces that were encamped under the Command of the Marschal d'Humieres,

between the Sambre and the Meuse, arrived the 12th instant at Malick, the rest of the Troops being returned to the Garisons from whence they were drawn. This Detachement passed through the Country of Luxemburg and Treves, and comes it's believed to reinforce the French Troops quartered in this Electorate.

Spire, Octob. 16. The Besieged in Philipsburg defend themselves very vigorously; they made the 14th instant a furious Sally, and it's said that 4 or 500 of the French were killed. The latter suffer likewise very much by the Rains, being up to the middle in Water in their Trenches. They have put the Countreys of Wittemberg, Franconia, and Suiabia, under Contributions. A Regiment of Foot of the Forces of the Landtgrave of Hesse Cassel is arrived at Francfort.

Lamburg, Octob. 18. We hear from Berlin, That the Elector of Brandenburg has, upon the News of the March of the French Forces, given Orders for the raising several new Regiments. The Princes of Luemburg do likewise raise Men. The Troops of Saxony are encamped at Torgau to the number of 13000 Men, from whence 6 Regiments are ordered to march towards the Rhine.

Brussels, Octob. 19. Our Governour-General has resolved to raise ten new Regiments, 4 of Horse, 4 of Dragoons, and 2 of Foot, which are to be all compleat within 2 Months; his Excellency provides the Horses and Arms, but the Officers are to Levy and Cloath the Men at their own Charge. They write from Francfort of the 14th instant, That the Siege of Philipsburg goes on very slowly, by reason of the Difficulties the French daily meet with; their Bridge over the Rhine being broken, and their Batteries ready to swim, all being overflowed quite round the place. We hear from Cologne, That the Pope's Bull, confirming the Election of Prince Clement, had been published there, and that the Prince de Croÿ had thereupon, in his name, taken Possession of that Archbishoprick. The Marschal d'Humieres, who was encamped between the Sambre and the Meuse, is returning with his Troops into the new Conquests.

Brussels, Octob. 22. The new Colonels are very busie in preparing for their Levies. His Excellency has likewise resolved to add 4 Companies to each of the old Walloon Regiments. We are told from Spire, That the Garison of Philipsburg makes a very brave Defence, and that on the 14th they made a vigorous Sally, wherein the French lost a great many men, with some Officers of note.

Whitehall, Octob. 15. This day in the Chapel at St. James's, his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, being before Christened, was Solemnly named (amidst the Ceremonies and Rites of Baptism) JAMES, Francis, Edward; His Holiness, represented by his Nuncio, Godfather; and the Queen Dowager, Godmother: The King and Queen assisted at the Solemnity, with a great attendance of Nobility and Gentry, and concourse of People, all expressing that Joy and Satisfaction, which was suitable to the Place and Occasion.
