TAMES R.

Orasmuch as the great Preparations made to In-wade and Couquer this Our Kingdom, require oude and Couquir this Our Kingdom, require Our utmost Care in providing for the neciffary Safety and Defence in prevent Wherein We refolve (phrough God's Affiftance) not to be wanting the heavy and Jad Calamities of War, may not frempthen themselves at their coming hither, by seizing the stocked and Cattel of any of Our Subjects, which may be usful and serviceable to them for Burthon and Draught: We have therefore thought fit, and We do by this Our Boyal Proclamation (Published by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council) strictly Charge, Require and Command all and every the Lords Lieutenants, and Deputy-Lieutenants, of Our respective Counties adjoyning and Command all and every the Lords Lieutenants, and Deputy-Lieutenants, of Our respective Counties adjoyning to the Sea, and all Sherist, Justices of Peace, Mayors, Bailist, and all and every other Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, within their respective Counties, Cities, Towns and Divisions, that they cause the Coasts to be carefully watched, and upon the first approach of the Enemy, to cause all Horses, Oxen and Cattel, which may be fit for Burthen or Draught, and not actually Implosed in the Service and Defence of Us, and the Country, to be driven and removed by the space at least of twenty Miles from the Plate where the Enemy shall account to Event, and to scure the same in such effectual manner, that they may not fall into the Hands or Power of any of Our Enemies: Wherein nevertheless it is Our Will and Pleisure, that the respective Owners may suffer as little Damage that the respective Owners may suffer as little Dannage and Loss, as may be Consistent with the Great and Pub-

lick Safety of the Kingdom.

Venice, Octob. 2. Our last Letters from the Venetian Camp before Negrepont are of the 23d of August, which tell us, that on the 20th they stormed all the Queworks, and after a long and obstinate dispute, made themselves Masters of them, with the loss of 2000 Turks; On our side about 300 Men were kill d in this Action, and the Prince de Harcourt and the Prince de Tigrenne, with some other Persons of Quality, were wounded. Since the arrival of these Letters, we have Advice by a Vetel come in 17 days from Milo, that the Doge Morofini understanding the Serasquier advanced with 5000 Men to succor Negrepont, he sent a Detachement to meet him, who deseated the Enemy, and kill'd 3000 upon the place; Whereupon the Besieged hung out a white slag to capitulate; But were fold. That they must surrender at discretion; Which shey had not set resolved to submit to. The Basks of Clin, with the other Officers of Note, will be brought hither, and the rest at the Garison put into the Gallien.

Venice, Octob. 15. The Prince of Harcours arrived here on Monday last from the Venetian Army to be cared of his Wounds; And brought Letters of the 17th past, which give an Account of the Death of General Coningsmark, after a long Sickness. Vienna, Octob. 3. A confiderable Derachement has been lent from the Imperial Army, which, according to our last Advices, was encamped at Semlyn; about three miles on this side Belgrade, to join the Forces commanded by General Viterani on the Frontiers of Valachia; And, it's believed, if the Season permits, they will pass the Danabe and make some Attenspts in Bulgaria, the People of that Country being up in Arms in great numbers. Prince Louis ot Baden is reinforced, and proceeds in his Conquests in Bajana; On the 18th of the last month he rook the City. of Bertske on the 18th of the last month he took the Lay of Bertske on the Save, which being an open Place, but very populous, and lituated very advantageoully for Trade, he cauted a Fort to be raifed upon an adjoining Hill for its Security, and left there, and in the Town, 2000 Men under the Orders of Major-General Dingen, who is Governor of the New Conquetts in Bosnia, which are so considerable that they take up about 10000 Men for their Garilous. The Governor of Carelfadt, Count Herberstein, is according to the Siege of Ribac. an important Place on is preparing for the Siege of Bihac, an important Place on the Frontiers of Greatia, in order to which he sent out, the Frontiers of Groatia, in order to which he sent our, on the 3d instant, a Party of 2000 Men to learn the Motions and doligns of the Enemy; They arrived the 5th near Offres, where they met and defeated 300 Tyrkish Horse, and 200 Foot, and asterwards possessed themselves of a large and rich Village, and returned to Garessalt with a good deal of Booty, and several Prisoners. Take-ley, who is wandring about Viddin in Bulgaria with a small company, has made some Overtures towards an Accommodation for himself, but they have been very coldly received. The Duke of Mantua, being returned from Hung gary, took yesterday his leave of the Emperor as Eberstant, whither his Imperial Majesty went to hunt, and presently after parted from thence on his Journey to Italy. fently after parted from thence on his Journey to Italy

Vienna, Octob. 7. The Emperor has resolved to raise a Regiment of 1500 Hungarians, which is to be called the King of Hungary's Regiment, and will be exercised after the German Discipline; The Officers are already named. The Electoress of Bava-ria parted from hence on Tuesday last on her return to Munick; Whither the Elector will follow in few days. We have Advice, that General Vererahi received, on the 18th of the last month, a Letter from the Grecian Bishop of Sophia, inviting him to advance towards that place, and promising him an easie Conquest of it, for that the Country People, at his approach, would take up Arms and join with him; Upon which the sa'd General has sent to have Directions from hence. The last Letters from Beigrade gave an account, that they were repairing the Breaches, and when that was done, feveral new Works would be made for the greater strength of the place; And that General Caprard was gone with 4000 Horse and Dragoons, and 1500 Hungarians, towards Semandria, to view that City, and to give such Orders as he should find necessary for the Security of it. We have Advice from Venice of the taking of the Fortress of Clin in Dalmatia.

From the Camp before Philipsbourg, Octob. 15. The Dauphin arrived here the 6th instant. This Place is fitte-Dauphin arrived here the 6th instant. This Place is insulated near the Rhine on the German side, is almost surface and is regularly fortified with 7 Bathions and Halfmoons in the places by which it is accellible. The Ground between the place and the Rhine is covered with a Crown-work and an Horn-work, which stands about 20 Yards from the Rhine; All these Fortifications are lined with Stone, as likewise the Covered Way, and the order Works that environ it. The two salks Attacks, that were begun before the Dauphin's Arrival are directed. that were begun before the Dauphin's Arrival, are dire-ched against these Works, one on the North-side, and the wither on the South, and are to have a Communication by

The great Atrack is against the Bastions of Anguien and Therme, and the Halimoon before the Courtin that joins them. The same day, about 4 in the morning, the Dauphin, accompanied by the Duke de Beauvilliers, the Marcfeal de Duras, and the Sieurs de Pauban and Vandevil, went to view the Ground where the Trenches were to be opened, and the places for the Batteries, and he advanced within fourscore Paces of the Counterscarp. At fix at Night the Trenches were opened, the Dauphin being prefept, by the Regiment of Pricardie commanded by the Sieur de Joyeufe as Lieutenant General, and the Sieur de Polafirm as brigadier. The Dauphin continued there till 9 a Clock to encourage, by his prefeace, the Soldiers, to whom he gave a great deal of Money, particularly to those that most distinguished themselves. That Night the Trenches were carried on above 1000 Yards, without thosing one Man, for that the Belieged did hardly fire at tall upon our Worksten. And Lieutenant General Monall upon our Worksten. And Lieutenant-General Mon-clar, who commanded the Attack of the Upper Rhine, clar, who commanded the Attack of the Upper Rhine, advanced it to the outward Dirch of the Horn-work. The 11th we placed 12 pieces of Cannon and several Mortars on Batteries, on both sides of the Trenches, and were employed the whole day in making a Place of Arms at the head of the Work, capable to hold 2000 Men. The Dauphin went to visit the Outworks of the Camp, and was almost o hours on Horseback. Towards Evening we obliged the Enemy, with our Cannon, to quit a Mill patient of the Counterscarp. The same day, at the Seur de Monclar's Attack, the Ingenier de Rebè made a Lodgment on the Glaces of the Counterscarp of the Horn-work. The 11th at Night the Chevalier de Tilladet, theurenant-General; mounted the Guard of the Trenches, which, at the great Attack, were carried on near 400 which, at the great Attack, were carried on near 400 Yards, and within 30 of the Counterfearp; The day following was employed in perfecting the Works. The 12th at Night we advanced our Batteries nearer to the Place. The next day the Prince of Baden Dourlach came, into the Camp, to falute the Dauphin. The 13th at Night we attracked an interenchment reliefed to the Counter Westerded on interenchment reliefed to the Counter Westerded. attack'd an Intrenchment palifado'd on the Covered Way of the Redoubt de la Londe, on the left of the Attack; 20 Granadiers were commanded to make the first Onfer, of Granadiers were commanded to make the first Onler, of which 7 were presently kill'd, which hindred nor the rest from devancing and making themselves Masters of that Post, killing those that resisted them, and taking three Prisoners; We command posicised of this Post till about 3 in the Morning, when the Enemy made a Sally, and kill'd and wounded 20 of our Men. But the Sieur de Catinat, Lieutenant-General, who commanded the Trenches, hastising to their Assistance, the Enemy were repulsed, and 15 of them kill'd. The Marquis de Prosse, Coionel of the Regiment of Asvergue, was, in this Occasion, wounded in the Body with a Musquet Bullet, and the Marquis de Neste, Marescal de Camp, was likewise dangerously wounded. Last Night we continued to work on the Batteries, which will not be fixed eill to morrow in the places where they are to remain. Yesterday our Mortars began'to play with good effect, the Bombs having set fire to some Houwith good effect, the Bombs having fet fire to fome Hou-

fes, and difmounted some of the Enemies Cannon.

Bruffels, Octob. 26. Our Governor-General has already given our Commissions for eleven new Regiments. The Letters from Vienna, of the 14th instant, tell us, that the Elector of Bavara parted from thence the eleventh on his return to Manich... And that General Dimensalar had Orders to march with a confiderable, Rody of Germans, Hungarians and Croats, towards the Rhine. The Cities of Mentz and Ther have received French Garifons. We are told from Spire, by Letters of the 20th instant, that the Garifon of Philipsburg continued to make a very vi-
