The Auxiliary Troops of Bavaria, and of Franconia, and Suabia,

are on their march homeward.

Vienna, Octob. 14. The Elector of Bavaria, after having affilted at the Conferences that have been held here upon the Arrival of several Expresses from Germany, parted from hence the 10th instant, for Municke. There will be formed a Body of Germans, Hungarians, and Croats, who are to act on the Rhine under the Command of General Dunewalt; and to shorten their way they will take their March through Stiria. Commissions are daily given out for new Levies, which the Officers are obliged to have compleat within two Months, General Caprara having given the necessary Orders for the Security of Belgrade, and the other Conquests on that side, is gone to his Government of Waradin; But the Generals Palfi and Heuser are to act with Detachements in Servia and Ras-cia as long as the Scason will permit.
