Warfam, Octob. 13. HE Army of this Crown being retired from their Camp near Caminiec, the Tartars made use of the opportunity to put into the place a great Convoy of Provisions, of which the Garison was in great want. The King was according to our last advices from Lemberg returned to Zolkiew, where he intended to ftay 4 or 5 days; and the Troops, as well those of Poland as Lithuania, are marching to their Winter-Quarters. A general Dyet of this Kingdom will be held here the 16th of December. All that the Moscovites have done this Summer has been to build several large Forts on the River Samara, where they pretend to lodge 60 Thousand Men this Winter, to secure their Frontiers against the Incursions of the Tartars.

Resubonne, Octob. 25. The Elector of Bav wia returned the 17th instant to Municke, and the next day gave Audience to the Ambaffador from the Great Duke of Tuscany, who presented to the Princes of Bavaria the Picture of the Prince of Tuscany fet with Diamonds to a great value. The Troops of Bavaria that have ferved this Campagne in Himgary are on their March homeward: General Dunewaldt is like the coming this way with a Body of 6 Thousand imperial Horse, to joyn the Troops of the Confederate Princes that are drawing together on this fide. The States of Franconia are to meet

the 25th instant at Nuremberg.

Hamburg, Octob. 26. They write from Leipfig of the 18 inftant, That the Elector of Saxony had thoughts of marching himself with his Troops defigned towards the Rhine, at least as far as Francfort. The Princes of Brunswick and Lunenburg have had lately a Meeting at Zell, at which affifted the Ministers of Brandsnburg and Hesse Cassel; and it's said another Conserence will be very suddenly held at Magdebourg, at which the Elector of Saxony will be likewise present. We hear from Pomerania, That two Regiments of Foot, of 12 Companies each, are raising there for the Service of the Crown of Sweden, and that feveral Troops were expected at Straelfond from that Kingdom. Hamburg, Nov. 2. The Lunenburg Troops, being fix Regiments of Horfe and nine of Foot, began their March yelterday towards the Upper Rhine; They will joyn with those of Brandenburg, Saxony, and Hesse Cassel, and form an Army of 3200 Men.

Thom the Camp before Philipsbourg, Ostob. 24. The 14th Instant, the two Attacks of the Upper and Lower Rhine, having been carried on to the foot of the Counterfearp of the Hornwork, were joined by a Line of Commit

fcarp of the Hornwork, were joined by a Line of Communication between that Work and the Rhine. The 15th in the Morning the Dauphin visited the Trenches of the great Attack, where he staid three hours. The same day the Frenches were advanced very near to the Redoubt de la Loude; so that the Lodgment, made on the Counterscarp

of that Redoubt, becoming useless, it was abandoned the next day. On the 16th, the Works of the great Attack were stopp by the Water, which lying before the Counce. 16. p, and being 30 Yards over, firved for an outward Dirch. We found it to be hard at bottom; wherefore twas resolved to carry of the Water by a Drein. All than Night there were but 4 or 5 Men wounded. At the attack of the Lower Rhine they made themselves Masters of the Angle of the Counterlearp of the Hornwork, and made a' Lodgment on it. The 2 Branches, which had been drawn from the great Trench, the one on the right, the other on the log. the left, were joined by a Line of Communication, which run along the outward Ditch: There were about 10 of 12 Soldiers killed. The 17th at Night we carried a Sappe from the faid Line towards the Redoubt de la Loide, and raifed against it a Battery of two pieces of Cannon. The Enemy made a Sally on the fide of the Churchyard, but were presently bearen back by the Regiments of Ragrands. but were prefently beaten back by the Regiment of Bourbon; The Duke de Bourbon and the Prince de Conty fignalizing themselves on this Occasion. At the Attack of the Rhine the Enemy were forced from the covered way by our Granadiers; and we began to make a Breach on the Hornwork with fix Pieces of Cannon. The fame Night the Dauphin had advice, That the Baron de Monclar, Lien tenant General, had made himself Master of Hailbron, an Imperial Town on the Necker; And that the Marquiss de Boufflers likewise, Lieutenant-General, had put a Garison into the Town and Cittadel of Mayence. The 18th at Night, they made, on the fide of the great Attack, a Lodgment on the covered way of the Redoubt. The Count de Chasteauvilain, Ayde de Camp to the Mareschal the Duke du Duras, was flightly wounded. The Sieur de Vauban, Lieutenant-General, found a way to drain the Water that serves for the outward Dirch on that side. At the Areas of the Direct of the University of the Unive tack of the Rhine the Ditch of the Hornwork was drained, and we began to fill it up with Fagots. The Marquiss de Bordage, Mareschal de Camp, being shot in the Head with a Musket-Bullet, died some five hours after. The 19th at night we continued to fill up the Ditch of the Hornwork, and to make two Lines for the encompassing that Work. The Marquis a Huxettes, a Licutenant-General, received there a great Wound in his Shoulder; and feven or eight Officers, with about 30 Soldiers, were kill'd or wounded, the Enemy having fir'd very fiercely on us with finall Shot and Granadoes. The 20th our Cannon playd continually, and made a Breach in one of the Branches of the Hornwork: At the great Attack, the Drein having almost dried the outward Dirch, there were three Trenalmost dried the outward Dirch, there were three Trenches carri'd through it to the Foot of the Glacis of the Counterscape, where we ladged our selves. There were about 25 Men killed or wounded. The same night the Dirch of the Hornwork being fill'd up, we prepared to carry it by Assault. The Marquis d'Harcourt, Mareichai de Camp, who was at that Attack, commanded four Companies of Granadiers to advance; They crept without any noile to the foot of the Hornwork, where they expected the signal. The Dauphin came into the Trenches little street, between I welve and One a Clock, the signal was given with 6 Bombs; The 4 first were laden after the ordinary manner; the 2 last were empty, having each of them only one Rocket, yet they finglisted the Belieged. The Granadiers at that Moment made the Assault with 6 much Courage, that they in a short time made themselves much Courage, that they in a short time made themselves.

Masters of the Hornwork. It was defended by 150 Men,
who were all slain or taken, except 20 that got into the
Crownwork. The Frency left there a Pieces of Council. Crownwork. The Enemy left there 4 Pieces of Cannon, with ftore of Ammusition, and loft 2 of their bravet Offices, whose Bodies were, at their Request, restored to them. There were about 20 Granadiers kill'd and wourds od, and force Officers wounded: Amongst others, the Che

valier Gourtin had 2 Wounds, of which he is fince dead. The Marquis d'Harcourt, the Count d'Estrees, the Gount de Guiche, the Count de Biley, Page to the King, and several other Persons of Quality, signalized themselves on this occasion. The taking of this Work will exceedingly facilitate that of the place, which has been much hindred by the continual Rains, great Cold, and Marshy Ground, where we could not make any Trenches in which the Water was not at least a Foot deep. Yesterday we took the Redoubt of Earth on the Lest of the great Attack without any Resistance: We are on that side on the Cover'd Way, and on the side of the Lower Rhine we continue to drain the Waters out of the Dirch of the Crownwork.

From the Camp before Philipsburg, Octob. 29. The 22d at night we took the Redoubt de la Londe with little opposition, the Besieged having left there but 12 Men and a Corporal, who were all taken or killed. The day following we made on the Right of the Redoubt a Lodgment on the Glacis, and carried on our Work to the Palifadoes of the Covered Way. We made divers Lines of Communication, and raised several Batteries against the Crown-work. The 24th we had advice, That the Great Master of the Tentonick Order, who remained at Heydelberg after the departure of the Elector Palatine his Father, was likewise retired from thence. The 25th the Kings Troops entred into that City, the Garison, according to the Capitulation, being conducted to Manheim. The 25th at night we continued to work on the fide of the Rhine on the Batteries, to ruine the Crown-work, and all things were prepared to fix the Miner. On the fide of the great Attack we carried on our Works along the Covered Way on the Glacis within a Yard of the Palisado; the Chevalier de Denonville was dangeroufly wounded with a Musket-Shot, and about 12 Soldiers were killed and wounded. The 26th we began to batter the Crown-work with fuch Success that the 27th a confiderable Breach was made. The 28th we continued to batter the Crown-work, and the Breaches were fo large that it was relolved & give an Affault the next day. The 29th the Regiment of Anjou, and the second Batallion of the Kings Regiment, were commanded to make the Attack; a Detachement of Grenadiers mounted the Breach, and the other Troops mounting likewise by the other Breaches of the two Half-moons, made themselves Matters thereof without any great oppofition, and with little loss on our fide. Of the Befieged about 30 were killed. We were working with great diligence to make a Lodgment there, when we saw a white Blag hung out on the Rampart, and a Parley was demanded, upon which the Firing ceated on both fides, and Holtages were exchanged; after which the Major of the place came out and adjusted the Articles of Capitulation; according to which the B. fieged, who are now about 1800 strong, are to march out the 1st of the next Month, being the Birth-day of the Dauphin, with Arms and Baggage, Drums beating, Colours flying, and 4 Pieces Cannon, and are to be conducted to Ulme. The Court will return to Versaules the 12th or 14th of this Month.

Hague, Novemb. 5. The Damage the Dutch Fleet sustained by the late Storms, appears to be much greater than was at first reported. There are 1500 Horses dead and unserviceable: The Prince of Orange has lost most of his own, and the Mareschal de Scomberg the best of his Horses: His Son Count Charles Schomberg was in great danger, the Ship he was in having spent her Main-Matt. A Captain of Horse in the Sieur Benting's Regiment is missing, with his whole Troop; and two Captains of the Foot-Guards are likwife miffing, with their Companies. To supply these Losses, a great many fresh Horses are ordered to be sent to the Fleet; and it's faid the Regiment of the Baron de Frizes will be Embarkt. In the mean time the Prince of Orange continues at Helvoetsluys, intending to Sail again to foon as the Fleet is in a condition, and the Weather permits.

London, Octob. 29. This day Sir John Chapman, Elected Lord Mayor for the Year enting, being accompanied by the Aldermen and Sheriffs, and attended by the several Companies, went to Westminaster, with the Solemnities cuttomary on the like occasions; His Majerty being pleased to do them the Honour to be upon the Leads at Whitehall as they passed by. And having been sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer, returned to Blackfryers Stairs; from whence they passed in the usual manner to Gracer's-Hall, where a splendid Entertainment was provided, at which were the Lorde of His Majesticamon Honourable Pary Concil, the Junear dother Terlons of Quality.
