HIGHWAY ACT.

Cornwall to Wit.

WHEREAS at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at Bodmin, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 8th day of April, 1873, a Provisional Order was made in the words following, that is to say:—

"Whereas William Henry Peel, John Samuel Hawker, Richard Foster, David William John Horndon, and William Nicholas Connock Marshall, Esquires, five Justices of the Peace for the county of Cornwall, did, by writing under their hands, dated the 18th day of March, 1873, require the Clerk of the Peace for the said county to add to or send with the notice required by law to be given for holding this Court of Quarter Sessions, a notice that at these Sessions a proposal would be made to alter the Highway Districts of Liskeard and Callington, in the county of Cornwall, by taking from the Highway District of Callington the parish of Menheniot, and adding it to the Highway District of Liskeard.
