THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by David Graham Drummond, Earl of Airlie, K.T., to the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the Queen, which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously :-

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland in the General Assembly convened, beg to acknowledge with profound gratitude your Majesty's gracious letter, in which your Majesty is pleased to convey a renewed expression of your attachment to that church: We assure your Majesty that, appreciating as we do the benefits conferred on the nation by your beneficent and auspicious reign, we are animated by sentiments of devoted loyalty to your Majesty's person and government. We are greatly gratified by your Majesty's recognition of the services which the church established by law is rendering to the Scottish people, as well as by the sympathy your Majesty is pleased to express with the labours of its Ministers. We are fully persuaded that the important qualities of christian prudence and charity which your Majesty has stated as having characterised former General Assemblies will be manifested in the present, and we trust that in all our deliberations about the interests of a church which has been so signally owned and blessed by its Divine Head as an interest of good to this land, we may be guided by that wisdom which cometh down from above, the wisdom that is first pure, then peacable, and profitable to direct.

It affords us sincere gratification to welcome as your Majesty's Commissioner and representative in this Assembly, David Graham Drummond, Earl of Airlie, whose courtesy and kindness, as your Majesty's representative on a former occasion, so eminently entitle him to our cordial support.

We renew the expression our thankfulness for your Majesty's annual grant of $\pounds 2,000$ to be applied to the reformation of the Highlands and Islands, and we trust that it may be so dispensed as to promote not only the temporal, but the eternal welfare of an interesting race, who in their remote solitudes are thus reminded that they have a large share in the consideration of love which your Majesty entertains for all your people.

That your Majesty may long be preserved to reign over a free, a loyal, and a happy because a moral and religious people, is the earnest prayer of
