The sincere and humble Address of Your Majesties most Faithful and ever Loyal Subjects, now in Arms for Your Majesty in the Shire of Argyll.

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and most Dutiful Subjects, in Your Shire of Argyll, from the deep sense we have of our own Duty, and of the great Happiness and many Blessings we enjoy, (Great SIR!) under Your Auspicious Reign, do, in this juncture of Affairs, humbly offer our Lives and Fortunes to be sacrificed, where-ever Your Majesties Honour and Greatness may be concern'd, which is that true Holocaust, which all True-honest-hearted Scots-men will give to so Good, so Just, and so Great a Prince, And thus we declare to all the World, that we will maintain, to the last Period of our Lives and Fortunes, which we are ready, not only to subscribe with our Hands, but, on all Occasions, to seal with our Blood. We have entreated the Honourable Sir John Drummond of Machanic, Your Majesties Lieutenant for this Shire (under whose Conduct we are now in Arms ready to march, where-soever Your Majesty Commands,) to present to Your Majesty these our firm and unalterable Resolutions. In Testimony whereof we do, with all Cheerfulness, subscribe our Names hereto for our selves, Branches of our Families, and Followers, at Killmichell in Argyll, the Sixth day of November, 1688.

Having at this our Meeting been informed of a most unjust and unnatural Invasion, designed against Your Majesty and Your Kingdoms, we do find our selves concerned by our Allegiance and Gratitude, to assure Your Majesty, and let all Your other Subjects see, that the former Professions we have made of adhering to Your Royal Interest upon all Occasions, were not meer and empty Compliments, but that the same Sincerity, from which they proceeded, shall still animate us to hazard all for Your Majesty, his Royal Highness the Prince of Scotland, and the Royal Line; Being fully convinced, that whatever tends to shake the Throne, must necessarily overturn the Liberty and Property of all Your Subjects, notwithstanding of all the Masks and Pretensions that may be made use of by any Undertakers whatsoever.

THE new Proof, we have had of Your Majesties Royal Favour to us in Your last Letter, relating to the Conversion; The Passer of the Admiralty, and the Entertainment of Prisoners, but especially the great Care Your Majesty expressed for repairing and augmenting our much decayed Trade, do oblige us to renew, to Your Sacred Majesty, our sincere and hearty Thanks for these, and for the Kindness Your Majesty was Graciously pleased to show to the Provost of Your good Town of Edinburgh, our Præses, who represented us; And all Your Majesty's Princely Favours bestow'd on us, since God was pleas'd to bring Your Majesty to the Throne of Your Royal Ancestors; And for which we hope our Successors, who are to find the Advantages thereof, as well as our selves, shall ever think it their true Interest to depend immediately upon the Monarchy, from which only they can find a true and solid Support.

to Defer and Prohibit the keeping of the said Fair, and all other Fairs within Twenty Miles of Our said City of Exeter, at the Times accustomed, and until the same shall be Licensed by Us. And to the end that all Persons may take Notice thereof, We do hereby Admonish and Require all Our Subjects, that they forbear to resort to the said Fair at Exeter, or any other Fairs within Twenty Miles of the said City, until We shall declare Our further Pleasure concerning the same; Hereby also strictly enjoining and Commanding the respective Lords, Owners and Proprietors of all and every the said Fairs, and all other Persons interested therein, that they do not presume to hold the said Fairs, or any of them, without Our Licence first obtained in that behalf; upon pain of such Punishment as can or may by Law be inflicted upon such as shall be found Offenders therein.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the 16th day of November, 1688. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

Francfort, Novemb. 18. Our Magistrates have sent Deputies to Compliment the Elector of Saxony, and the Duke of Hanouer, who are marching this way with the Forces under their Command. The 16th arrived here two Troops of Lunenburgh Horse. The French have put into Manheim a Garison of 3000 Men.

Hamburgh, Novemb. 19. We have an Account, that the Duke of Hanouer arrived at Hanaw the 17th instant with 8000 Men, commanded under him by Lieutenant-General Chauvet. He intended to continue his march the next day towards Francfort. They write from Stockholm, that the King of Sweden had given out Commissions for several new Regiments both of Horse and Foot.

Cologne, Novemb. 19. Yesterday arrived here another Reinforcement of 1000 Brandenburgers; so that there is now in this City a Garison of 6000 Men; And besides these there are 10000 Burghers that bear Arms. They write from Francfort, that the Elector of Saxony was come with 13000 Men into the Country of Eysenacke. That the Duke of Hanouer was arrived at Hanaw with 8000. And that 6000 of the Troops of Hesse Cassel, Wirtemberg, and other Princes, were marching to joyn them.

Wesel, Novemb. 20. The Troops that were encamped at Duisbourg, under the Command of Prince Waldecke, are returned to their former Quarters, after having sent a Detachement to Cologne to reinforce that Garison.

Brussels, Novemb. 23. The French Troops, in the Electorate of Cologne, have demanded 200000 Crowns of the Country of Juliers, to be paid in 8 days, upon pain of Military Execution. They likewise demand Contributions of the Diocesis of Liege; Which that Country refuses to pay. The Letters from Germany give an account of the taking of Frankendall. And that great Preparations are making in all parts of the Empire against the Spring. Our Mairre de Camp General is gone to visit the Frontier Garisons of this Province towards the Country of Liege.

Paris, Novemb. 24. On Sunday last arrived here an Express with the News of the taking of Frankendall. The Dauphin is expected at Versailles on Saturday next. The Count de Mautourier, who is Governor of Tournay, has Orders to repair to Dunkerke to command there.

Whitehall, Novemb. 16. His Majesty has been Graciously pleased to Translate the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of Exeter to the Archbishoprick of York; And the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of Bristol to the See of Exeter.

His Majesty being very sensible of the pressing Necessities of the Poorer and Meaner Sort of the Inhabitants in and about the City of London through want of Trade during the present Distractions, has been Graciously pleased to signify His Pleasure to the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of London, and to the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor of that City, That they cause such Publick Collections to be made throughout the said City, the Liberties and Suburbs thereof, and parts adjacent, as may be competent for the Relief of the said Distressed Inhabitants.

Whitehall, Nov. 18. Yesterday about 3 in the afternoon His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, parted from hence for Windsor; where His Majesty lay last night, and this day continued his Journey to Salisbury, near which Place His Majesty has Appointed the general Rendezvous of His Forces; And His Majesty has Commanded, That in His Absence, the Privy Council shall meet for the dispatch of all Affairs as Occasion require.
