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*Genoa; Novemb. 2.*

**W**E have Advice of the Arrival of the Gallies of *Tuscany* at *Messina*, in their return home from *Negrepoint*, where they left the Land Forces

which the Great Duke sent with the said Gallies to the Assistance of the Venetians: At their departure from thence, the Besieged were reduced to that Condition, that 'twas believed they could not hold out many days longer. The Master of a Vessel come from *Alexandria* says, that they were preparing there a Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition to be sent to *Constantinople*.

*Venice; Octob. 31.* On Monday last arrived here a Vessel from *Cefalonia*, the Master whereof reports, That being, on the 10th instant, in the Port of *Casoppo*, he heard, by a Bark from *St. Maur*, that *Negrepoint* was taken by Storm: Which is confirmed by another Vessel that is come in 6 days from *Monopoli*. But we have had of late so many false Reports of this kind, that we must expect this great News from the Doge himself, before we can give an entire Credit to it.

*Warsaw, Novemb. 5.* The last Letters from *Fawarow* informed us, That the King had resolved to go, on the 8th instant, to *Zolkiew*, to consult with the Senators and Principal Officers of the Army, who are appointed to meet there, about securing the Frontiers, and making the necessary Preparations against the next Campaign; After which, his Majesty will return, with the whole Court, to this place, where the General Diet of the Kingdom is to meet on the 17th of the next month. They write from *Lemberg*, that the Tartars, understanding the Forces of this Crown were gone into their Winter-quarters, were on their march, in several Parties, to make Incursions into our Frontier Provinces; One of which had been met and defeated by a Body of Cossacks near *Tampol* in the *Upper Volhinia*, the greatest part of them being kill'd upon the place, and the rest pursued almost to the Gates of *Caminiac*. The Moscovite Forces are likewise gone into Winter-quarters, having left strong Garrisons in the new Forts

they have built on the River *Samará*, to secure the Country against the Incursions of the Tartars. We hear from *Valachia*, That the Prince and States of that Country have resolved to send Deputies to *Vienna*, with an ample Power to Treat and Conclude with the Imperial Ministers upon the Overtures that have been lately made of putting that Country under the Emperor's Protection.

*Vienna, Novemb. 7.* The Imperial Troops are gone into their Winter-quarters, pursuant to the Orders that have been sent to General *Caprara*. The Count de *Carbelli*, who commands the Forces that block up *Great Waradin*, has written hither, That some of his Troops had advanced so near to that City, that they set fire to the Suburbs, the Garrison not daring to sally out upon them; And that they had afterwards taken some Prisoners, who all declared, that they within the Town were reduced to great Necessities; But that the *Bassa* endeavoured to encourage the Garrison with the Assurances of a sudden Peace. We have an account from *Besni*, That, on the 10th of the last month, Prince *Louis* of *Baden* marched, with the Cavalry, and four Battalions, towards *Swernick*, a considerable City and Pass on the River *Trina*, near the Confines of *Besnia*, and on the 13th arriv'd in the Neighborhood of it; That the Governor of the place having Notice thereof, sent out a Party, who advanced about two miles, to make some discovery of the Germans, but upon sight of them, immediately fled, and the Imperial Cavalry pursued them; But the Enemy coming to a place where they were sheltered by a Fort, which they had lately built to secure the Passage of the River, made a Halt and put themselves into a posture; Which obliged the Germans to stay for the coming up of their Foot; Upon whose arrival, 3 Companies of *Souches*, who had the Vanguard, made the attack, and forced the Turks to retire in some disorder into the City. In the mean time, the Count de *Stirum* had, with the Right Wing of the Cavalry, passed the River *Trina*, and posted himself on the other side of the Town; Upon which, the Inhabi-

tants were so disinay'd, that they obliged the Bassa to capitulate, who, the next day, sent out Hostages, and the Agreement was quickly made. That they should have Liberty to march out with what they could carry, except Arms, and that the Bassa, and principal of the Inhabitants, should be allowed 30 Horses for Carriage. On the 15th there accordingly went out of the place, about 4000 Persons, of which 500 were fit to bear Arms; There was very little Ammunition or Artillery found in the place, but a great Quantity of Grain, and all sorts of Provisions, which was left for the Subsistence of 5 Companies, which Prince Louis put into Garison there. This Town is of great Importance, for that it not only covers the former Conquests in *Bohemia*, but likewise Subjects a new and large Territory to our Contributions.

*Strasbourg, Novemb. 17.* On Saturday last *Te Deum* was sung here for the taking of *Manheim*; And we have since advice, that *Frankendall* is likewise surrendered; And that the Dauphin is returning to *Paris*, having put good Garisons into the places beforementioned, as also into *Philipsbourg*, *Heydelberg*, and *Offenburg*; The rest of the Troops are to winter in *Alsace*. The Count de *Nassau Sarbrucke*, Colonel *Quadr*, Colonel *Rosenburg*, and Colonel *Montefox*, have received Commissions from *France* to raise four new Regiments.

*Brussels, Novemb. 23.* The last Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that the Emperor had resolved to have a considerable Army on the *Rhine* the next Spring: And at the same time to continue the War against the Turks. That the Count de *Kaunitz* was going in the Quality of the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary to the *Swiss Cantons*, to negotiate a Levy of 12000 Men. And that the Recruits and new Levies his Imperial Majesty had ordered to be made, will amount to above 30000. The German Letters give an Account of the Surrender of *Frankendall*. The French have put into *Manheim* a Garison of 3000 Men.

*Falmouth, Nov. 15.* Yesterday there was seen plying off of the *Lizard* about 25 Sail of great Ships, supposed to be part of the Dutch Fleet.

*Exeter, Novemb. 17.* The Prince of *Orange* has appointed the Lord *Wilshire*, Mr *Herbord*, and Mr. *Rou*, Commissioners for the managing His Majesties Revenue here, who yesterday Collected the Monthly Duty of Excise for this City. And our Magistrates are Suspended for not complying with him. It's said the Prince of *Orange* will march from hence some time the next week; And in the mean time Parties are sent out to take all the Horses they meet with; Some have been as far as *Bridgewater*, where they took 20 Horses from the Market-people.

*Portsmouth, Nov. 18.* Yesterday His Majesties Fleet under the command of the Lord *Dartmouth* passed by here to the Westward, the Wind at E.S.E. The *Mountague*, *Jersey*, *Nonsuch*, and *Constance Warwick* came to *Spurhead*, and this day intend to follow the Fleet. The Wind blows now very hard at S, and most of the Tenders are coming into this Harbor.

*Salisbury, Novemb. 19.* This Evening about Four of the Clock the Duke of *Berwick*, the

*Earl of Pembroke*, Sir *John Fenwick*, and several other Officers on Horseback, met His Majesty about a Mile from hence, and attended him to the Gates of the City, where His Majesty was met by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Gowns, who waited upon His Majesty at the Bishop's Palace, which is appointed for his Lodging; The People in a very great Multitude following His Majesties Coach from His Entrance into the City quite to the Doors of the Palace, with Huzzas and Demonstrations of Joy and Satisfaction, the Bells Ringing all the while.

*Whitehall, Nov. 21.* We have an account that on Friday last the Lord *De la Mere* came to *Manchester* at the head of 50 Horses, and that the next day he went to *Bodon Downs*, where he had with him about 150, declaring his Design was to join with the Prince of *Orange*.

There are Letters from *Exeter* of the 19th instant, which say, That the Prince of *Orange* does every day go out to view the Country with the Marechal de *Schomberg*, and last Saturday he went to *Aury* 12 miles from thence, and returned thither at night; And that it was reported the Prince of *Orange* would go from thence on Tuesday, part of the Army being already advanced 20 miles from *Exeter*, intending to leave there only a Guard of 200 Foot and 200 Horse. The Prince of *Orange* had forbid Praying for the King, who is now left out both by Churchmen and Dissenters in their Prayers. The New Prayers made on the Occasion of this Invasion are laid aside, and *Burnet's* Prayer for the Prince of *Orange* is used by some.
