THE Board of Trade have received through the Foreign Office a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Charente, reporting that all vessels coming from ports in the United Kingdom, or from European ports to the northward thereof, to any French port from Brest to Bayonne inclusive, are required to be provided with a bill of health bearing the visa of a French Consular Officer, under pain of being placed in quarantine. That all vessels from any French port coming into another in a different department of France, whether through stress of weather, or in course of trade, are likewise required to be provided with a bill of health sanctioned by the signature of the

Local Sanitary Authority. That the British Consul's bill of health or visa is not necessary for British ships in the last-mentioned cases, in so far as the sanitary service of French ports only is concerned.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Foreign Office a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, reporting that that city has been declared "infected" with cholera, and that foul bills of health are issued to all vessels in free pratique with the city on their clearing from it outwards bound. Vessels arriving from other ports with clean bills, and which have not taken free pratique at Naples, proceed on their voyage with a certificate endorsed on their original bill of health to the effect that they have not communicated with the shore. Cargoes are thus discharged without the ships being subjected to quarantine.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Foreign Office a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Copenhagen, reporting that the Danish Government have declared Havre and Wiborg (in Finland) "infected" with cholera, and that in consequence all vessels arriving in Danish ports from those places must hoist the quarantine flag, and be inspected by the health officer before communication with the shore will be allowed; neglect to comply with these regulations will subject the offenders to a penalty of 200 dollars.
