

THE SANITARY ACT, 1866, AND THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD ACT, 1871.

REGULATIONS AS TO LODGING-HOUSES.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the provisions of the Sanitary Act, 1866, and the Local Government Board Act, 1871, application has been made to us by the Local Board of Walker, in the county of Northumberland, as the Nuisance Authority for their district, to declare by notice, to be published in the London Gazette, the enactments contained in the 35th section of the Sanitary Act, 1866, to be in force in the district of the said Local Board.

Now, therefore, we, the Local Government Board, do hereby give notice and declare, that the said enactments are in force within the said district.

WHEREAS, on the 11th day of November, 1873, his Honour the Vice-Chancellor Hall appointed Matthew Ingle Joyce, Esq., of Lincoln's-inn, to be his Secretary, at an annual salary of £400, Robert Forsaith to be his Clerk of the Chamber, at an annual salary of £300, and Frederick William Barringer to be his Trainbearer, at an annual salary of £120, such salaries respectively being according to the rates as at present established for those offices; and whereas the said appointments were so made and have been accepted subject to the conditions hereinafter appearing: Now, therefore, we, Fulke Greville and William Henry Gladstone, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, with the concurrence of the Right Honourable Roundell, Baron Selborne, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, testified by his signature hereto, in pursuance and by the authority of the Courts of Justice (Salaries and Funds) Act, 1869, do hereby order as follows:—That the aforesaid appointments be made and be respectively held upon the conditions that they are not to continue beyond the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, being the date fixed for the commencement and coming into operation of "The Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1873;" that on the abolition of the said offices, the holders thereof shall have no claim to compensation, by way of pension or otherwise; and that during the continuance of the said offices respectively, the said Matthew Ingle Joyce shall be paid a salary at the rate of four hundred pounds per annum, the said Robert Forsaith shall be paid a salary at the rate of three hundred pounds per annum, and the said Frederick William Barringer shall be paid a salary at the rate of one hundred and twenty pounds per annum; all which salaries respectively shall commence on the said 11th day of November, 1873, and shall be paid quarterly, on the 16th day of March, the 16th day of June,

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and the 16th day of September, 1874; the proportionate parts of such salaries respectively which will have accrued from and inclusive of the said 11th day of November, 1873, to the 16th day of December, 1873, to be paid to them on the 16th day of December, 1873, and the proportionate parts thereof respectively which will have accrued from the 16th day of September, 1874, to the 2nd day of November, 1874 (both days inclusive), to be paid to them on the 2nd day of November, 1874.—Dated this tenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 139.)—NOVA SCOTIA—SOUTH-EAST COAST.

Revolving Light on Green Island.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada, has given notice, that from the 15th December, 1873, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the south point of Green Island, off Mahone and Margaret Bays.

The light is a *revolving red and white light*, showing *red flashes and white flashes* alternately every minute and a half, completing the revolution every three minutes. It is elevated 59 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 13 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

The lighthouse is a square wooden building, 28 feet high, painted white, and attached to the keeper's dwelling. Position, lat. 44° 23' N., long. 64° 2' 45" W.
