THE Secretary of State for War has received Despatches, of which the following are copies, from Major-General Sir Garnet Joseph Wolseley, C.B., K.C.M.G., Commanding the Troops on the Gold Coast:—

*Head Quarters, Camp, Insarfu,
January 30, 1874.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before you the following further reports as to the progress of the four columns last named in my despatch of the 25th instant.

Right Column.—Captain Glover has reported up to the 17th instant. He had crossed the Prah on the 15th, with about 750 Houssas and Yorubas, and had advanced to Obogo, whence he dates his despatch. He had taken this village by assault his troops having been fired upon as they were marching towards it. He had seven Houssas and one Yoruba wounded; the enemy's loss not being ascertained. Being in want of ammunition and supplies, he would be compelled to halt. His troops had behaved well, except in their "wild and unnecessary firing."

Second Column.—Captain Butler's last report is dated 24th instant. He writes from Yancoma, where he had arrived on the 22nd instant, about twenty miles north of the Prah. Hence two paths branch off, one towards Lake Boosum-Eching, the other towards Dadiasoo, in a westerly direction. He had proposed to follow the latter path, but the opposition of the kings was such that he was forced to abandon the movement. He hoped to get his whole force to move on the 25th; but he thus describes his position, "I can scarcely convey to you a true conception of the position in which I find myself. All information is studiously withheld from me; carriers are constantly refused; distances are grossly exaggerated; the most vexatious and trifling pretexts are put forward; anything and everything is done to effect the one great object,—delay."

Third Main Column.—My advanced posts are to-day on the River Dunsaboo about two and a quarter miles beyond this place, and within three-quarters of a mile of the enemy's forces at Egginassie. My entire force is concentrated here and at Ahkankuassie, two and three-quarter miles in rear, and it is probable that to-morrow I may have to fight whatever force the King has been able to collect to resist my advance. Further details of my position are given in the Despatch which accompanies this.

Fourth Column.—The last report from Captain Dalrymple is dated 25th instant from Kotakee; he had arrived there on the 24th with King Apcoon and about 50 men; King Aquasi Bedoo was there with no men; Kroo of Commendah had gone home; Buarbin and Atrew were still at Damun on pretence of collecting their men.

Captain Dalrymple, though he had used every effort to influence the kings, was of opinion that he would be fortunate if he should succeed in crossing the frontier with 200 men.

SIR,

IN continuation of my Despatch of 25th instant, I have the honour to inform you that the troops forming the column under my immediate command had advanced to the following positions:—

On the Dunsaboo river, about two and a quarter miles beyond this place, is the advanced guard, under Colonel McLeod, consisting of Wood's and Russell's Regiments, and two Rocket Detachments.

My own Head-Quarters, the Brigade Staff, the 42nd Regiment, and 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade, with Rait's Artillery, two 7-pounder rifled guns, and two rocket detachments, are here at Insarfu.

Between this and Ahkankuassie, two and three-quarter miles in rear, are the Naval Brigade, Head-Quarters and detachment, 2nd Battalion, 23rd Regiment, Head-Quarters and detachment 2nd West India Regiment, the Small-Arm Ammunition Reserve, and Field Hospitals.

At Foomanah, to move forward to-morrow, is a detachment of the 1st West India Regiment.

The following fortified posts have been established and garrisoned on my line of communication with Prahsu:—Essiaman, Accrofoomu, Cross Roads, north of Parakoom River, Moinsay, crest of Adansi Hills, Foomanah, Ahkankuassie, and Insarfu.

Although I have used every possible effort, and neglected no means which I could devise to bring about a peaceable solution of the negotiations with the King of Ashanti, I regret that he appears to be determined to resist my further advance on Coomassie.

After I had, on 25th instant, given due warning to the King of Adansi, whom I knew to be on my left flank, that I could not allow his troops to collect there, I ordered a reconnoissance to be made on the 26th, towards the village of Adubiassie, a little to the north-west of Foomanah, which resulted in the capture of the village, two Ashantis being killed, and two captured, without casualty on our side, though the reconnoitring party was opposed by about 200 armed men.

Yesterday, having received information that a considerable body of the enemy was assembled at Borumassie (about six miles west of Kiang Boassu), I ordered a reconnoissance to be made to that village. This reconnoissance, which was commanded by Colonel McLeod, was entirely successful. A body of several hundreds of Ashantis was surprised, and driven out of the village with considerable loss. Fifty-three stand of arms and twelve kegs of powder were destroyed, and several prisoners taken. I have received Colonel McLeod's report, and regret that he has to announce the loss of Captain James Nicol, Adjutant of the Hampshire Militia, who was killed while commanding a company of

Russell's Regiment. Our casualties were few,* and I am glad to note that the expenditure of ammunition was small, which shows the steadiness of the troops.

The intelligence report, which I have the honour to forward in despatch, will inform you that the enemy are known to be in position near the villages of Amoaful and Becquah. I intend to attack them to-morrow.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint James, Devonport, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-third day of June, in the same year, the district of Saint James, Devonport, was constituted out of the parish of Stoke Damerel, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And whereas the said district of Saint James, Devonport, has since become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the

boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James, Devonport, should be altered by way of extension, so that they shall include a certain additional part of the said parish of Stoke Damerel.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend, and propose that, from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme or representation, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James, Devonport, shall be altered by way of extension so that they shall include all that part of the said parish of Stoke Damerel, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and is thereon coloured pink, and that from and after the day of the same date, and without any other assurance in the law, the said part of the parish of Stoke Damerel so to be included as aforesaid shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint James, Devonport.

"And we further represent, recommend, and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending, or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Saint James, Devonport, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Stoke Damerel, in the said county and diocese, wherein the present Incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the west by the new parish of Saint James', Devonport aforesaid, on the south by the new parish of Saint Paul, Devonport, in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the east by the district chapelry of Saint Michael, Devonport, in the same county and diocese, and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the north by the inlet called or known as Keyham Lake."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patron and the incumbent of the said parish of Stoke Damerel, and to the patrons and the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint James', Devonport.

And whereas the incumbent of the said parish of Stoke Damerel has made certain objections to the same scheme or representation.

And whereas one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said scheme or representation were so transmitted as aforesaid.

And whereas the said scheme or representation, notwithstanding such objections as aforesaid, has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of

Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate at Minley, in the particular district of Cove, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said particular district of Cove, and of the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, in the said county of Southampton, and in the said diocese of Winchester, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such particular districts respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said particular district of Cove, and of the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Minley as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Cove, and with the consent of Elizabeth Randall, of Hawley, in the said county of Southampton, Spinster, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said particular district of Cove, and

of the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Minley as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Minley.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Minley, being:

"All that portion of the particular district of Cove, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, which is bounded on the south-west by the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Fleet, on the west by the parish of Elvetham, on the north by the parish or parochial chapelry of Yateley, on the north-east by the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon all other sides, that is to say: on the south-east and on the south by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, from the particular district of Cove aforesaid, at the point where the road leading from Cove through Minley to Yateley is joined by a certain occupation road, numbered 359 upon the map of the ordnance survey of the said parish of Yateley, published in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said occupation road to its south-western end; and continuing thence still generally south-westward to and along the fence which divides the closes numbered respectively 358, 346, and 345 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 361 upon the same maps, to the source of the stream or watercourse which flows past the northern side of Brooke House towards Elvetham; and extending thence westward for a distance of one mile and thirty-one and a half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said stream (thereby passing along the northern side of Brooke House aforesaid) to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Fleet to Elvetham over the same stream or watercourse, which boundary divides the said particular district of Cove from the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Fleet, aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, aforesaid, which is situate on the north-eastern side of the road leading from Cove through Minley to Yateley as aforesaid, opposite to the church of Saint Andrew, at Minley, and which said portion of such particular district is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the several closes numbered respectively 66, 67, 272, 273, 271, and 295, upon the before-mentioned maps."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the

same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Little Chester, in the county of Derby, and now vested in us.

"Whereas, under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and made or expressed to be made between the the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Derby, of the first part, Henry Whitmore, Esquire, and Sir Graham Graham Montgomery, Baronet, two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, of the second part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, a certain piece or parcel of land, situate in the parish of Little Chester, in the county of Derby, particularly described in the first schedule annexed to the said indenture, and therein called the New Close, containing seven acres one rood and thirty-eight perches, became with its appurtenances and is now vested in us.

"And whereas the said land is not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but is now in our possession; but some portion thereof, on account of its character and situation, is unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said land, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time, and from time to time, think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such land, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

And whereas the Guardians of the Poor of the Shardlow Union, in the counties of Derby, Leicester, and Nottingham, being the Rural Sanitary Authority for that Union, have applied to the Local Government Board to issue an Order investing them, as such Sanitary Authority, with certain of the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations of an Urban Sanitary Authority, as regards the parish of Long Eaton, in the said Union:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board, having duly considered the said application, and acting under the authority of the several statutes in that behalf, do hereby invest the Guardians of the Poor of the said Shardlow Union, as such Sanitary Authority within such district as aforesaid, from and after the 9th day of March, next, with all the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations of an Urban Sanitary Authority, as regards the parish of Long Eaton, with reference to making bylaws, and otherwise, in respect to the following matters, viz.:

In respect to the various matters mentioned in Sections 33 and 34 of the Local Government Act, 1858;

And in respect to the various matters mentioned in Section 32 of the Local Government Act, 1858, so far as the powers under that section are not already conferred upon the said Sanitary Authority in pursuance of Section 8 of the Public Health Act, 1872, and Section 5 of the Sanitary Act, 1868;

And We do hereby direct the said Guardians to cause this our Order to be published once in some newspaper circulated within their District, before the expiration of one calendar month from the date hereof.

METROPOLITAN CONSOLIDATED ORDER
(1874).

PART I.—ELECTION OF GUARDIANS.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions and separate Parishes in the Metropolis;—

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the several Parishes comprised in the said Unions, and of the said separate Parishes;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by certain General and other Orders addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions and separate Parishes in the Metropolis, the Poor Law Commissioners, the Poor Law Board, and the Local Government Board respectively prescribed regulations relating to the election of Guardians of the Poor in the said Unions and separate Parishes;

And whereas it is expedient that certain alterations should be made in the regulations so prescribed, and that the provisions of the said Orders, as so amended, should be consolidated:

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order and Direct that, from and after the First day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, all the provisions of every Order, whether General or Special, issued by the Poor Law Commissioners, the Poor Law Board, or the Local Government Board, to the Unions or separate Parishes in the Metropolis, which relate to the election of Guardians of the Poor, shall be rescinded, so far as the same may relate to the conduct of the election, or the expenses thereof.

And with respect to each of the said Unions and separate Parishes, We hereby further Order and Direct as follows:—

Art. 1. The following regulations shall take effect from and after the said First day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

Interpretation of Terms.

Art. 2. In this Order—

The term "Metropolis" means the Metropolis as defined by "The Metropolitan Poor Act, 1867."

The term "Parish" means any place for which a separate Poor Rate is or can be made, or for which a separate Overseer is or can be appointed.

The term "separate Parish" means a Parish which is under a separate Board of Guardians.

The term "Overseers" includes any person or body of persons performing the duties of Overseers, so far as regards the assessment, making, and collecting of rates for the relief of the Poor.

The term "Clerk" means the Clerk to the Guardians.

The term "Ward" means a Ward for the purposes of the Election of Guardians of the Poor, constituted under an Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, or the Poor Law Board, or the Local Government Board.

Conduct of the Election.

Art. 3. In every Parish containing a population exceeding two thousand persons according to the census last published by authority of Parliament, the Overseers shall from time to time enter in some book, to be provided for that purpose, the names and addresses of the owners and proxies who shall send statements of their claims to vote, and the assessment of the poor-rate on the property in respect whereof they respectively claim to vote, which book shall be kept in the Form (No. 1) in the Schedule to this Order, headed "Register of Statements of Owners and Proxies claiming to Vote."

In any other Parish the Overseers may, at their

option, make such entries either in a Register of like form or in the Poor Rate Book.

Art. 4. The Overseers of every Parish shall, before the Twenty-sixth day of March in every year, distinguish in the Rate Book the name of every ratepayer in their Parish who has been rated to the relief of the Poor for the whole year immediately preceding that day, and has paid the poor rates made and assessed upon him for the period of one whole year, excepting those which have been made or become due within the six months immediately preceding the said day.

Art. 5. The Clerk shall be the Returning Officer at every annual election of Guardians, and shall perform the duties hereby imposed upon such officer; and all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing such election; and in case the office of Clerk shall be vacant at the time when any duty relative to such election is imposed on the Returning Officer by this Order, or in case the Clerk, from illness or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to discharge such duties, the Guardians shall appoint some person to perform such of the said duties as then remain to be performed, and the person so appointed shall perform such duties.

Art. 6. The Guardians shall, before or during every such election, appoint a competent number of persons to assist the Returning Officer in conducting and completing the election in conformity with this Order; but if the Guardians do not make such appointment within the requisite time, the Returning Officer shall take such measures for securing the necessary assistance as he may deem advisable.

Art. 7. The persons appointed under Art. 6 shall obey all the directions relative to the conduct of the Election, which may be given by the Returning Officer for the execution of this Order.

Art. 8. The Overseers, and every officer having the custody of the Poor Rate Books of every Parish, shall attend the Returning Officer at such times as he shall require their attendance, for the purposes of the election of Guardians, and shall, if required by him, produce to him the Rate Books, and the registers of owners and proxies, together with the statements of owners, and appointments, and statements of proxies, and all books and papers relating to the Poor Rates in their possession or power.

Provided that where any register of owners shall have been prepared in any Parish containing a population exceeding two thousand persons, it shall not be necessary to produce the statements of owners.

Art. 9. The Returning Officer shall prepare and sign a notice of the ensuing election, which shall be in one of the Forms (No. 2) in the Schedule to this Order applicable respectively to Unions and separate Parishes; and he shall cause such notice to be published on or before the Fifteenth day of March, in the following manner:

1st. A printed copy of the notice shall be affixed on the principal external gate or door of every Workhouse in a Union or separate Parish, or, where there is no such Workhouse, on the external gate or door of the building in which the Board Room of the Guardians is comprised; and shall from time to time be renewed, if necessary, until the Ninth day of April.

2nd. Printed copies of the notice shall likewise be affixed on such places in every Parish as are ordinarily made use of for affixing thereon notices of parochial business.

Provided that whenever the day appointed in this Order for the performance of any act relating to or connected with the Election of Guardians shall be Sunday or Good Friday, such act shall be

performed on the day next following, and each subsequent proceeding shall be postponed one day.

Art. 10. Any person entitled to vote in any Parish or Ward may nominate for the office of Guardian thereof himself, if legally qualified; or any other person or persons, if legally qualified, not exceeding the number of Guardians to be elected for such Parish or Ward.

Art. 11. Every nomination shall be in writing, in the Form (No. 3) in the Schedule to this Order, and shall be signed by one person only, as the nominator, and shall be delivered through the post or otherwise after the fourteenth and on or before the twenty-sixth day of March, to the Returning Officer, or to such person or persons as may have been appointed to receive the same; and the Returning Officer, or such person or persons, shall, on the receipt thereof, mark thereon the date of its receipt, and also a number according to the order of its receipt.

Provided that no Nomination Paper delivered before the fifteenth or after the twenty-sixth day of March, or delivered, except through the post, to the Returning Officer or to any person appointed to receive the same, or at the office, address, or residence of such Returning Officer or other person, before the hour of nine o'clock in the morning, or after the hour of eight o'clock in the evening, shall be valid.

Art. 12. As soon as practicable after the twenty-sixth day of March, the Returning Officer shall make out a list in the Form (No. 4) in the Schedule to this Order, containing the names and residence and quality or calling of every person nominated for the several Parishes in the Union, or for the separate Parish, or for the several Wards of any Parish, as the case may be, and containing also a statement of his opinion as to the invalidity of any nomination, whether in respect of the qualification of any person nominated or of the nominator, or in respect of the form of the nomination or otherwise, and shall cause a copy thereof to be suspended in the Board Room of the Guardians, and another to be affixed on the principal external gate or door of the Workhouse of the Union or separate Parish, or if there are more Workhouses than one, then on the principal external gate or door of each such Workhouse, or where there is no Workhouse, on the external gate or door of the building in which the Board Room of the Guardians is comprised.

Art. 13. If the number of persons duly nominated for the office of Guardian for any Parish or Ward shall be the same as, or less than, the number of Guardians to be elected for the Parish or Ward, such persons, if duly qualified, shall be deemed to be the elected Guardians for the Parish or Ward, and shall be certified as such by the Returning Officer as provided in Art. 26.

Art. 14. If in any Parish or Ward a greater number of qualified persons be duly nominated than the number of Guardians required to be elected for it, the Returning Officer shall, as soon as practicable, make out a list in writing in the Form (No. 5) in the Schedule to this Order, containing the names and residence and quality or calling of every person nominated, and the names and addresses of the several nominators, and also a statement of his opinion as to the invalidity of any nomination, whether in respect of the qualification of any person nominated, or of the nominator, or in respect of the form of the nomination, or otherwise.

He shall keep such list in the Board Room of the Guardians until the close of the election, and shall allow any person entitled to vote at the election for such Parish or Ward to inspect such list, and

to copy the whole or any part thereof, between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and eight o'clock in the evening, on any day except Sunday or Good Friday, and except during a meeting of the Board of Guardians.

Art. 15. When the Returning Officer shall have prepared the list prescribed in Art. 14, he shall further cause Voting Papers, in the Form (No. 6) in the Schedule to this Order, to be duly prepared, and shall insert therein in the alphabetical order of the surnames the names of all the qualified persons duly nominated, and it shall not be necessary to insert more than once the name of any person nominated.

Art. 16. The Returning Officer shall, on the seventh day of April, cause one of such Voting Papers to be delivered, by the persons appointed for that purpose, to the address in the Parish or Ward of each ratepayer, owner, and proxy qualified to vote therein.

Art. 17. If any person nominated, whose name is inserted in such Voting Papers, or any person on his behalf, give at least one clear day's notice in writing to the Returning Officer of an intention to send an Agent to accompany each or any of the persons appointed to deliver or collect the Voting Papers, the Returning Officer shall make the necessary arrangements to enable such Agents to accompany such persons accordingly; but no such Agent shall interfere in any respect in the delivery or collection of the Voting Papers.

Art. 18. The Guardians shall provide for the use of every person appointed to collect the Voting Papers, a box or bag having a small opening for the reception of Papers, which shall be delivered by the Returning Officer to such person locked, and such person shall deposit every Voting Paper received by him, or allow the Voter to deposit his own Paper, in the box or bag, through the opening, and shall deliver the box or bag to the Returning Officer on the day of collecting the Papers, and the Returning Officer shall open the same at the casting up of the Votes, and not before.

Art. 19. If any person put in nomination for the office of Guardian in any Parish or Ward shall tender to the officer conducting the election his refusal, in writing, to serve such office, and if in consequence of such refusal the remaining number of qualified persons duly nominated for the office of Guardian for the Parish or Ward shall be the same as, or less than the number of Guardians to be elected for the Parish or Ward, the persons so remaining shall be deemed to be the elected Guardians for the Parish or Ward, and shall be certified as such by the Returning Officer, as provided in Art. 26.

Art. 20. Each Voter shall write his initials in the proper column of the Voting Paper delivered to him against the name or names of the person or persons (not exceeding the number of Guardians to be elected for the Parish or Ward) for whom he intends to vote, and shall sign his name at the foot of the Voting Paper; and when any person votes as a proxy, he shall in like manner write his own initials and sign his own name, and state also, in writing, the name of the person for whom he is proxy.

Provided that if any Voter cannot write, he shall affix his mark at the foot of the Voting Paper in the presence of a witness, who shall attest the affixing thereof, and shall write the name of the Voter against such mark, as well as the initials of such Voter against the name of every person for whom the Voter intends to vote.

Art. 21. If in filling up any Voting Paper the

Voter or the Proxy or the attesting witness fail to comply in any particular with the directions contained in Art. 20, or if any Voting Paper shall not have been delivered or collected at the Voter's address in the Parish or Ward by the persons appointed or employed for that purpose, every such Voting Paper shall be omitted in the calculation of votes, except in the cases specified in the provisoes to this Article.

Provided that every person qualified to vote who shall not on the seventh day of April have received a Voting Paper, shall, on application before twelve o'clock at noon on the ninth day of April to the Returning Officer at his office, be entitled to receive a Voting Paper, and to fill up the same in the presence of the Returning Officer, and then and there to deliver the same to him.

Provided also, that in case any Voting Paper duly delivered shall not have been collected through the default of the Returning Officer, or the persons appointed or employed for that purpose, the Voter in person may deliver the same to the Returning Officer before twelve o'clock at noon on the ninth day of April.

And in either of the cases specified in the provisoes to this Article, any Voting Paper so delivered to the Returning Officer shall, if free from objection in any other respect, be included in the calculation of votes.

Art. 22. The Returning Officer shall cause the Voting Papers to be collected on the eighth day of April by the persons appointed or employed for that purpose, in such manner as he shall direct, subject to the provisions contained in Arts. 17 and 18.

Art. 23. The Returning Officer shall, on the Ninth day of April, and on as many days immediately succeeding as may be necessary, attend at the Board Room of the Guardians, and ascertain the validity of the votes by an examination of the rate-books, and the registers of owners and proxies, and such other documents as he may think necessary, and by examining such persons as he may see fit; and he shall enter in a Poll Book in the Form (No. 7) in the Schedule to this Order, and cast up such of the votes as he shall find to be valid, and shall ascertain the total number of such votes given for each person.

Art. 24. The Returning Officer shall allow any person nominated, whose name is inserted in the Voting Papers under examination, or some person on his behalf, to be present at the casting up of the votes, and shall declare at the close of such casting up the number of votes allowed by him to every person whose name is inserted in the Voting Papers, and shall, if he reject any Voting Paper, mark thereon the act of its rejection, and declare the ground of such rejection.

Art. 25. So many of those persons nominated, whose names are inserted in the Voting Papers, to the number of Guardians to be elected for each Parish or Ward, as shall be ascertained in accordance with Art. 23 to have received respectively a greater number of votes than the remainder of those persons respectively, shall be deemed to be the elected Guardians for the Parish or Ward, and shall be certified as such by the Returning Officer, as provided in Art. 26.

Art. 26. The Returning Officer shall, on the Ninth day of April, or as soon after as may be practicable, make a list containing the names of the qualified persons duly nominated, and in case of a contest the number of votes given for each, and the names of the elected Guardians, in the Form (No. 8) in the Schedule to this Order, and shall sign and certify the same, and shall deliver such list, together with the Poll Book and all the Nomi-

nation and Voting Papers which he shall have received, to the Board of Guardians, at their next meeting, who shall preserve the same for a period of not less than two years.

Art. 27. The Returning Officer shall cause copies of such list to be printed, and shall deliver or send, or cause to be delivered or sent, one or more of such copies to the Overseers of every Parish in the Union or of the separate Parish.

Art. 28. The Overseers shall affix, or cause to be affixed, copies of such list, at the usual places for affixing in each Parish notices of parochial business.

Art. 29. The Returning Officer, when he shall have certified that any such person is duly elected as Guardian, shall notify the fact of his having been so elected by delivering or sending, or causing to be delivered or sent, to him a notice in the Form (No. 9) in the Schedule to this Order.

Art. 30. The Nomination and Voting Papers, when delivered by the Returning Officer to the Board of Guardians, as required by Art. 26, shall, during the six calendar months next following such delivery, be open between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon on any day, except Sunday, to the inspection of any person who may have nominated or may have been nominated at the election, or any person appointed in writing on behalf of either of them.

Art. 31. In case of the decease, necessary absence, refusal, or disqualification to act, during the proceedings of the election, of the Returning Officer or any other person appointed or employed to act in respect of such election, the delivery of the Nominations, Voting Papers, or other documents to the successor of the Returning Officer, or person so dying, absenting himself, refusing, or disqualified to act, shall be as valid and effectual as if they had been delivered to such Returning Officer or person.

Expenses of the Election.

Art. 32. The Guardians shall pay, to the Returning Officer, for the performance of the duties hereby prescribed in regard to the election, such sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds as the Guardians shall determine, which shall include the remuneration of the persons who may have been appointed or employed so assist him in conducting and completing the election.

Art. 33. In the case of every election in any Parish or Ward in which Voting Papers have been delivered in conformity with Art. 16, the Guardians shall pay to the Returning Officer, in addition to any sum which he may receive under Art. 32, the sum of Twopence in respect of each separate assessment to the current Poor Rate in the Parish or Ward.

Art. 34. The Guardians shall defray the cost of providing the several Forms required for use by the Returning Officer in pursuance of this Order; and may, if they think fit, also defray the cost of a supply of Nomination Papers for the use of persons entitled to nominate Guardians.

Art. 35. In a Union, the cost of providing the several Forms, except the Voting Papers, together with any payment which may be made to the Returning Officer under Art. 32, shall be charged to the Common Fund; and the cost of providing Voting Papers, together with any payment which may be made to the Returning Officer under Art. 33, shall be charged to the Parish in respect of which, or of any Ward in which, the expenses shall have been incurred.
