**A**T the Court at Windsor, the 7th day of July, 1874.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtieth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty, King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Bartholomew, situate in the township of Meltham, in the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Bartholomew, situate in the township of Meltham as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Almondbury, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Bartholomew, situate in the township of Meltham as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Meltham.'

"And with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Meltham, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of that portion of the township and chapelry of Meltham which is not included within the limits of the new parish of Helme, or of the new parish of Saint James, Meltham Mills, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, all which said part of such parish is bounded on the east by the said new parish of Saint James, Meltham Mills, and on the north by the said new parish of Helme, and upon the remaining sides, that is upon the north-west, west, and south, by the chapelry of Slaithwaite-cum-Lingards, by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Marsden, and by the new parish of Upper Thong, all in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

An Act to amend the Act of the fifty-fifth year of King George the Third, chapter one hundred and ninety-four, intituled "An Act for better regulating the Practice of Apothecaries in England and Wales."

An Act to amend "The Conjugal Rights (Scotland) Amendment Act, 1861."

An Act to amend "The Drainage and Improvement of Lands Act (Ireland), 1863."

An Act to extend the powers of "The Leases and Sales of Settled Estates Act."

An Act for confirming certain Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under "The Gas and Water Works Facilities Act, 1870," relating to Braintree and Bocking Gas, Brough Elloughton and District Gas, Chelmsford Gas, Dartford Gas, Guildford Gas, Harwich Gas, Lofthouse and District Gas, Retford Gas, Romford Gas, Sidmouth Gas, Sutton-in-Ashfield Gas, High Wycombe Water, Maidstone Water, Inverness Gas and Water.

An Act for empowering the Local Board for the district of Horbury, in the West Riding of the county of York, to make waterworks, and to supply water, and to make sewerage works; and for other purposes.

An Act for conferring further powers on the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company; and for other purposes relating to that Company, and to the London and North-Western Railway Company.

An Act to confer upon the South-Eastern Railway Company further powers with reference to their own undertakings and those of other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Swansea Harbour Trustees to construct additional docks, railways, and other works; and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the North-Eastern Railway Company to construct railways in the counties of York and Durham, and at or near York; and for other purposes.

An Act to amend "The Shipley Waterworks and Police Act, 1854," and to make further provision for the improvement of the Local Board District of Shipley, in the West Riding of the county of York; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the abandonment of the Harrow, Edgware, and London Railway; and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the boundaries of the municipal borough of Middlesbrough, in the North Riding of the county of York, to purchase a private road, to raise further moneys, to alter, amend, and in part repeal the existing Acts relating to the borough and district; and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the time for the purchase of lands for and for the construction of the North British Arbroath and Montrose Railway.

An Act for transferring to the Skipton Local Board of Health the undertaking of the Skipton Water Company, and for empowering the Local Board to supply water within the limits of supply of the Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for empowering the Corporation of Wigan to make sewerage works for utilization or treatment of sewage, and to make new streets and

improvements of streets, and to acquire the undertaking of the Wigan Gas Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for the transfer to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Belfast of the undertaking of the Belfast Gaslight Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the Caledonian Railway Company to make and maintain certain new works, and certain deviations of authorised and existing works, and to acquire certain lands in the counties of Lanark, Forfar, Perth, and Cumberland; for vesting in them the undertaking of the Busby Railway Company; for dissolving that Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from Coalville to Loughborough, in the county of Leicester, to be called the Charnwood Forest Railway; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising the Great Eastern Railway Company to make railways to Alexandra Park, and in the parish of Chingford, and to make a quay in the River Stour, and railways connecting it with their Harwich Branch, and to make various improvements of their railways and works, and to abandon a certain railway, and for conferring on them further powers in relation to their undertaking and the undertakings of certain other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the North-Eastern and London and North-Western Railway Companies to extend and enlarge the Leeds New Railway Station, and to make an approach thereto; and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the London and North-Western Railway Company to construct new railways and acquire additional lands in the counties of Glamorgan, Brecon, Monmouth, Merioneth, and Carmarthen; and for other purposes.

An Act to vest the undertaking of the South Yorkshire Railway and River Dun Company in the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway Company.

An Act for authorising the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway Company to make new branch railways and other works, for vesting in them the undertakings of the Macclesfield, Knutsford, and Warrington Railway Company and the Widnes Railway, for conferring upon them additional powers; and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the Midland and North-Eastern Railway Companies to make a railway from the Midland Railway, near Swinton, to the North-Eastern Railway, near Knottingley; and for other purposes.

An Act for conferring additional powers on the North-Eastern Railway Company, for the construction of works, and for the acquisition of lands; and for other purposes connected with their undertaking.

An Act to alter and amend the Acts relating to the Alliance and Dublin Consumers' Gas Company, and make further provision with respect to the quality and price of gas within the Company's district, to confer on the Company additional powers as to money, as to steam-vessels, and otherwise; and for other purposes.

An Act for transferring to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Nottingham the undertaking of the Nottingham Gas Light and Coke Company.

The surtax on beer may also be paid, at the option of the importer, according to the ascertained degree of strength. A drawback of 27 centesimi for every degree and hectolitre, in the case of spirits, and of 6 lire per hectolitre in the case of beer, will be allowed on exportation.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, do hereby, subject as hereinafter mentioned, grant to the Incumbent of the vicarage of Two Mile Hill, in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and to his successors, Incumbents of the same vicarage, one yearly sum or stipend of fifty pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions, on the first day of May and on the first day of November, in each and every year: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient, in our opinion, to produce the said yearly sum or stipend, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said vicarage, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Walthamstow, in the county of Essex;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Walthamstow, in the county of Essex, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas at a Vestry Meeting of the said parish of Walthamstow, held at the Vestry Room of the said parish, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Friday, the twentieth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order under their Seal of Office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850, (13 and 14 Vict. cap. 57,) entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this parish, as regards the appointment of a Vestry Clerk.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf, hereby order and direct as follows, that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,” as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Walthamstow.

ARTICLE II.—An annual salary of one hundred and twenty pounds shall be paid to such Vestry Clerk by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE III.—Such salary shall be payable from the day on which such officer commences the performance of his duties, and shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of “The Apportionment Act, 1870,” and shall be paid quarterly on the 29th day of September, the 25th day of December, the 25th day of March, and the 24th day of June in each year.
