The Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt hereby give notice, that the sum of four hundred and sixty-three thousand and forty-three pounds and seven pence, being one-fourth part of the said surplus of one million eight hundred and fifty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-two pounds two shillings and seven pence will be applied, under the provisions of the said Act, in the quarter ending the 31st day of December, 1874, towards the reduction of the National Debt.

REGULATIONS AS TO LODGING-HOUSES.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Sanitary Act, 1866, and the Local Government Board Act, 1871, application has been made to us by the Sanitary Authority of the Rural Sanitary District of the Bramley Union, in the West Riding of the county of York, as the Nuisance Authority for that district, to declare by notice, to be published in the London Gazette, the enactments contained in the 35th section of the Sanitary Act, 1866, to be in force in the said district:

Now, therefore, we, the said Local Government Board, do hereby give notice and declare, that the said enactments as extended by the 47th section of the Sanitary Law Amendment Act, 1874, are in force within the said district.

(No. 132.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ITALY—WEST COAST—NAPLES BAY.

Fixed and Flashing Light at St. Vincent Mole.

THE Italian Government has given notice, that from the 5th day of August, 1874, a light was exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the extremity of St. Vincent Mole, Naples Bay, on the site of the one which was destroyed on the 4th day of December, 1872.

The light is a *fixed and flashing red* light exhibiting a *flash every three minutes*, red to seaward and white within the port; it is elevated 49 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order,

On the same date the exhibition of the temporary lights on the Mole ceased.

Alteration in Reedy Island Light.

(No. 135.)—NOVA SCOTIA—BAY OF FUNDY.
(1.) *Fixed Light on White Head Island.*

THE Canadian Government has given notice, that from the 25th day of September, 1874, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the south point of White Head Island, Yarmouth County, for the purpose of guiding vessels into Argyle Harbour.

The light is a *fixed red* light, elevated 115 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 12 miles.
