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The DECLARATION

His Highness the Prince of ORANGE,
For the Authorizing Sheriffs, Julices of the Peace,
and other Officers and Ministers, to Act in their
respective Places.

THEREAS the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, the Knights, Burgeffes, Gentlemen and Citizens, heretifore Members of the Commons House of Parliament, during the Reign of King Charles the Second, residing in and about the City of London, and the Aldermen, and Members of the Common-Council of the Said City, in their Affemblies, in this extraordinary Conjuncture, have by their respective Applications, desired Us to take the Administration of Publick Affairs, both Civil and Military, and the disposal of the publick Revenue, for the Preservation of the Peace, and for other the good ends and purpoles in their faid Applications mentioned, and to exercise the same till the meeting of the intended Convention on the Two and ementieth of January next:

We defiring the happy State and Peace of this Kingdom and Nution, and to prevent, by the bare and circumspection of the Civil Magistrates, by their putring the Laws of the Kingdom, according to their respective Offices and Places, in Execution the inconveniences that otherwise may drife ; do hereby Constitute, Direct, and Appoint, That all and every Person, (not being a Papist) that upon the First Day of this instant December was in the Office of Sheriff, or Justice of the Peace, or concerned in the preservation of the Peace, or had or were concerned in the Custody of any Prison or Gaol, or keeping of any Prisoner, be, and it hereby Impowered. Authorized and Required to take upon him, and to execute the faid Office and Place respectiooly. And that the said Sheriffe, Justices, and Persons in their respective Offices and Places do take upon them the execution of the Laws for Suppressing all Rives. Roues and enmulenous Afferm-blies, and for keeping the Peace, relief of the Poor, and keeping the Gaols and Prisons, and Persons committed to their Custody, and to do and excense all other Matters to their respective Offices and Places appersaining And We do hereby likewife Impower, Authorize and Require all and every Person, (not being a Papist) that upon the said First Day of De-cember last was in any Office or Imployment, in Collecting, Receiving, Managing or Ordering of the publick Revenue, in or within the Kingdom of Eng-

land, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, to proceed and act in the Managins, Ordering, Collecting, Receiving and Paiment of the same, in the land method, manner and form as to their respective Offices and improments to do apportain; except and is such Offices or Places, where since our Arrival into this kingdyn, we have diready, or hall otherwise proceed. The Powers and Authorities levely given, to continue, remain, and be in Force and Viven; till the westing of the said Convention, or other Order to the contrary.

Constantinop's Septemb 22. Since the departure of the Court for Adrianople, whither it removed to prevent new Diffurbances, we have had little News stirring here, except of the Continuance and Encrease of the Disorders in Asia, where the Robbers appear in great Bodies (the chief Commanded by one Tedie) and spoyl the Country. Several Officers sent into shole Parts with Orders from the Visier, were to far from being able to execute them, that they are returned hither stript and plundered, and declare, that in several Villages they past through, they found no Provisions of any kind, the People being all fled. It is faid, that Teghen Baffa is retired on this fide Nisa, that he has not 3000 Men with him at the most; and if his Party should Encrease so, that he should think himself strong enough to fight with the Visier, that then a Civil War will happen as mong them in those Parts: If nor, that he will endeavour to pass over and joyn with the said Tedic, which will probably cause a General revolt of Asia. It is certain, that the Ottoman Court is in a great Consternation. Their Militia is quite ruined, all the Old Commanders and Soldiers dead, and the Revenue by the loss of the Morea and Himgary, and the ill condition of Alla dimilbed one half: Their great hopes are that the Ambassadors sent to the Emperor will conclude a Peace. The new Caimacan fince the Visier's departure often walks privately about the Streets, to seize such Soldiers as deserted the Camp, and others, who taking the Habit of Soldiers commit many Infolencies in this Town. The 16th instant, the Galleys which had been Cruising in the Black Sea, came into
