The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called 'The Church of Saint Mary, Riddlesden,' situate at Morton Banks, in the new parish of Morton, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, Riddlesden, situate at Morton Banks as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Morton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mary, Riddlesden, situate at Morton Banks as aforesaid, and that the same

should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Riddlesden.'

"And with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in, or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Riddlesden, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Morton, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, which is bounded on the north by the parish of Ilkley, on the north-west by the chapelry of Silsden, in the parish of Kildwick, on the west by the parish of Keighley, on the south-west partly by the last-named parish and partly by the new parish of Eastwood, on the south by the parish of Bingley, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the south-east, partly by the last-named parish and partly by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said last-named parish from the new parish of Morton aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the River Aire, at or near to the point where it is joined by the stream called or known as How Beck; and extending thence, first northward to, and then generally north-eastward, for a distance of about one mile along the middle of the said How Beck to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the road leading from East Morton to Holden-gate over the same beck; and extending thence, north-

westward, for a distance of twelve chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-described road to its junction, near Moor House, with the road which leads from Morton Banks over Morton Moor to Ikley; and extending thence, that is, from the point near Moor House aforesaid, generally north-eastward for a distance of nearly one mile and three-quarters along the middle of the last-described road to the boundary at Whetstone-gate, on the northern side of the said Morton Moor, which boundary divides the said new parish of Morton from the parish of Ikley aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Giles, Reading, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, which is bounded on the east by the new parish of Earley, in the said county and diocese, on the north and on part of the west by the parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, in the same county and diocese, and upon all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the west and on the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, from the parish of Saint Giles, Reading aforesaid, at the point a little to the west of the northern end of Sidmouth-street, where the Kennett and Avon Canal diverges from the River Kennett: and extending thence, that is from the said parish boundary, eastward, for a distance of thirty-seven yards, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said canal, to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Sidmouth-street aforesaid; and extending thence, southward, to and along the middle of the said street for a distance of two hundred and eighty-five yards, or thereabouts, to the junction of the same street with the street or road which connects Sidmouth-street aforesaid with the road called or known as the Grove; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the said connecting street or road to its junction with the road called or known as the Grove aforesaid; and extending thence, generally north-eastward, along the middle of the last-named road to the point near the church of Saint John the Evangelist, where such road joins Wallington-street; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of one hundred and seventeen yards, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named street to a point opposite to the western end of the wall at the back of, and forming the northern bound-

dary of, the gardens in rear of, and attached to, the houses called or known as Melrose-villas; and extending thence, eastward, to and along the said wall to its eastern end on the western side of Princes-street, and continuing thence, still eastward, across the last-named street, and along the wall at the back of, and forming the northern boundary of, the house and grounds called or known as Eldon House, to the eastern end of the last-described wall on the western side of Eldon-road, and continuing thence, still eastward, and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the last-named road; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of one hundred and four yards, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same road to its junction with the street or road called or known as Eldon-terrace; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the last-named street or road, to its junction with Montague-street; and continuing thence, still eastward, to and along the line of walls or fences which divides the houses and gardens situate on the southern side of the King's-road from the houses and gardens situate on the northern side of the London-road (such line of walls or fences being intersected and broken at one point by a certain new road which is now in course of formation, and which extends southward from a point in the King's-road near to the south-eastern angle of Victoria-square), to the point where the wall or fence dividing the house and garden called or known as No. 2, Stowell-place, and situate on the southern side of the King's-road aforesaid, from the house and garden called or known as Sydney House, and situate on the northern side of the London-road aforesaid, is joined by the wall or fence dividing the last-described house and garden from the house and garden called or known as Hope Cottage, and situate on the northern side of the London-road aforesaid; and extending thence, southward, along the last-described wall or fence, to its southern end, on the northern side of the London-road aforesaid; and continuing thence, still southward, to a point in the middle of the last-named road; and extending thence, eastward, for a distance of three hundred and thirty yards, along the middle of the same road, to the boundary at the junction of the same road with the King's-road aforesaid, which boundary divides the said parish of Saint Giles, Reading, from the new parish of Earley aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.
