W Heres upon Our Calling together the Forces, We have appointed such Officers so Command them, in whom We may Repose entire Trust and Confidence, as well for their Readiness and Inclination for Our Service, as for their Care and Diligence in keeping the said Forces in good Order and Discipline: And having out of the tender Regard and favourable Consideration which We shall always express for the good Service and dutiful Behaviour of the Forces, taken Care for their Maintenance and Encouragement, and given Orders for the satisfying and making good to every Officer and Soldier their full Pay and Arrears due to them until the First day of this Instant January, and for the making constant and punctual Payment of the Subsistence-Money, and Clearings of the Army in the usual Method without any the least diminution of the former Pay: We have thought fit hereby to declare the same, that no Officer or Soldier may be mist, or diverted from Our Service by any groundless Reports, or malicious Insinuations, strictly Charging and Requiring all Officers to repair forthwith to their respective Commands, and all Soldiers to their respective Quarters and Places of Rendezvous, upon pain of Our highest Displeasure, and being punished for their default as the Nature of their Offences shall deserve. And if it shall so happen, that notwithstanding these Our Gracious Intentions and Offer of Pardon for their past Absence or Desertion, any Soldiers shall obstinately continue to absent themselves from their Duties, We do hereby Direct and require all Officers Civil and Military to Seize and Apprehend, and to be Aiding and Assisting in the Seizing and Apprehending of all Soldiers that have deserted, or shall desert the Service, in order to the bringing them to Condemn Punishment, to be inflicted upon them with the utmost Severity.

Paris, Jan. 26. There is a Discourse of raising
 50 new Troops of Dragoons, and of adding 200 Men
 to the Guards du Corps, and 20 to each Company in
 the Regiment of Guards. The Marechal de Lorge is
 going to Command in Guyenne, and the Marechal
 d'Estrees in Bruary. It's said that the 1300 Bales
 of Silk that were lately taken in the Dutch Merchant
 Ship, which came from Alexandria, do almost all
 belong to the Merchants of this City, Lyon and Tours.
 The Sieur Gabarit put to Sea the last Week with
 the Squadron under his Command, but the ill wea-
 ther forced him into Port again.

St. James's, Jan. 21. The High Sheriff with
 all the considerable Gentlemen of Estates in
 the County of Cambridge, having unanimously
 enter'd into an Association, whereby they en-
 gage themselves solemnly to stand by His
 Highness the Prince of Orange, with their
 Lives and Fortunes, in his glorious Designs of
 redeeming these Kingdoms from Popery, and
 Slavery; Mr. Cotton of Madingley, was this Day
 to wait upon His Highness, and Presented it
 in the Name of the County; to which His
 Highness return'd a very gracious Answer.

Jan. 22. This day the Lords Spiritual and Tem-
 poral and Commons assembled at Westminster.
 The Lord Marquis of Halifax executed the Place
 of Speaker in the House of Lords; And the
 Commons chose Henry Powle Esq; to be their
 Speaker; After which a Letter from his High-
 ness the Prince of Orange was read in both
 Houses on the occasion of their Meeting; And
 the Lords and Commons unanimously resolved
 upon an Address to be presented to his Highness
 of Thanks for what He had done, and humbly

to desire him to continue the Administration of
 Publick Affairs till farther Application be made
 by them to his Highness. It was likewise Or-
 dered by the Lords and Commons that Thurs-
 day the 31 of January instant be appointed for a
 Day of Publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God
 in the Cities of London and Westminster, and Ten
 Miles distance, for having made his Highness the
 Prince of Orange the Glorious Instrument of the
 great Deliverance of this Kingdom from Popery
 and Arbitrary Power; And that Thursday the
 14th of February next be appointed for a Publick
 Thanksgiving throughout the whole Kingdom
 for the same: And then the Lords and Com-
 mons went in a Body to St. James's to present
 the forementioned Address to his Highness.
