SPECIAL REGULATIONS (Supplementary to the General Regulations issued 8th April, 1872, and amended by Notices in the London Gazette of the 24th January, 1873, 21st November, 1873, 16th June, 1874, and 5th February, 1875) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Clerk of Works in the Board of Public Works, Ireland.

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration.*

I. The limits of age for this situation are 25 and 30, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

II. Candidates must possess the practical experience necessary to qualify them for a situation of this nature. They must have been employed for at least five years in the superintendence of buildings, and will be required to produce satisfactory proof of their efficiency and practical knowledge.

III. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. Handwriting.
2. Orthography.
3. English Composition.
4. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions).
5. Geometrical Drawing.
6. Freehand Sketching in outline.
7. Knowledge of Materials.
8. Designing simple buildings, with specification and estimate, and working drawings of details of carpenters' and masons' work.
9. Taking out quantities from plans, and measuring and valuing buildings.
10. Surveying and levelling and valuing lands.

IV. Candidates failing in any of the above subjects will not be eligible.

V. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

VI. A fee of £2 will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that an Open Competitive Examination for two situations of Clerk of Works in the Board of Public Works, Ireland, will be held in Dublin, under the above Regulations, on Tuesday, the 29th of June, 1875, and following days.

SOUTHAMPTON (TRINITY) FAIR.

WHEREAS a representation has been duly made to me, as Secretary of State for the Home Department, by the Town Council of Southampton, as owners, that a Fair has been annually held in the parish of Southampton, in the Southampton Petty Sessional Division of the county of Hants, beginning at noon on the Saturday immediately before Trinity Sunday, and continued on the Monday and until the evening of the Tuesday next following, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be held on a less number of days than those on which such fair is heretofore used to be held ; and that of the days above-mentioned on which such fair has used to be held, such fair should cease to be held on any portion of the Saturday, and on the Tuesday, and should be held on Trinity Monday, and on that day only.

And whereas notice of the said representation, and of the time when I should take the same into consideration, has been duly given to the Justices acting in and for the said borough of Southamp-
