

hours march of this place, under the command of the Marquis of *Baen Do. rlach*; They arrived here soon after, and sent out immediately a Party of Horse and Dragoons, who overtaking the Enemy, defeated some Troops of their Rear-guard, and took the Baggage of the Marquis de *Lufgnan*, and several Officers. It's said that their Foot being surprized at *Conflat*, above 400 were killed upon the place. They have likewise abandoned *Ansberg*.

*Genen, Jan. 19.* The Troops of *Bavaria* are on their march towards the Duchy of *Wintemberg*. The Lieutenant-General Baron de *Sternau*, and the Count de *la Tour* and *Taffis*, General of Battalia, arrived here the 16th instant, with several other principal Officers, and parted again from hence the 18th to join the said Forces: Before their departure they had advice, that the French were encamped, to the number of 8000 Men, at *Potvedsheim*, with a design to return to *Sturgard*.

*Ulm, Jan. 19.* The Elector of *Bavaria*, who parted from *Munick* the 15th instant, arrived here yesterday, and this day about Noon went from hence for *Nürtingen*, to join the main Body of his Forces, and the Train of Artillery, with which his Electoral Highness intends to march towards *Wirtemberg* with all the haste he can; the French threatening to ravage that Duchy and the Neighbouring Countries.

*Nuremberg, Jan. 21.* The Lieutenant-General Count de *Souches* arrived here the 16th instant, to demand passage through *Franconia* for the Imperial Troops that are marching towards the *Rhine*; Of which two Regiments took their march the 18th towards the *Necker*, and four towards *Suabia*; And the rest, who are encamped not far from hence, will shortly follow. Prince *Louis of Baden* parted from this place the 20th instant on his return to *Ratisbonne*; And the Count de *Souches* towards *Suabia*, to command, under the Elector of *Bavaria*, the Imperial Forces that are marched that way. The French have resolved to dismantle *Frankenda*, and all the other Towns of the Palatinate.

*Frankfurt, Jan. 13.* The French Troops have quitted *Heylbron*, after having plundered the Town, and blown up the Gates, and part of the *VValls*; They carried away with them 4 Hostages for the Payment of the remaining part of the Tax of 50000 Crowns which they had laid upon the Inhabitants: About 2 or three hours after their departure, a Regiment of Dragoons of the Troops of *Saxony* entered the place, which has been since relieved by another of Foot. The French have likewise slighted *Offembourg*, and continue to demolish *Manheim*. A French Party of the Garison of *Mentz* have burnt *Oberardt*, a Village belonging to this City.

*Frankfurt, Jan. 25.* We hear from *Heylbron*, that 8000 Saxons are advanced towards the *Necker*; And that they had taken a French Lieutenant-Colonel, who was retreating from *Eberbach* with 12000 Crowns in Money. The Elector of *Bavaria* is marching at the Head of his Troops towards the Country of *Wirtemberg*.

*Magstrich, Jan. 5.* Our Parties have put part of the County of *Chim*, and of the Duchy of *Luxembourg*, under Contribution; And make their Incursions as far as *Mabeuge* in the Country of *Hainault*.

*Brussels, Jan. 22.* The new Levies of Horse, Foot, and Dragoons, that are making for the service of these Countries, advance with good success. We hear from *Liege*, that an Envoy was arrived there from *France*, to see the Treaty lately con-

cluded at *Paris*, by the Count de *Grosbeck*, put in execution; and, that he required to have the Citadel of *Liege* demolished within 24 hours. They write from *Holland*, that of the 8000 *Suedes* that are to pass into the service of the States General, 3000 were already arrived within the Dutch Territories, and the rest were daily expected. All our Letters from *France* speak of the great preparations that are making there for the *VV*.

*Brussels, Febr. 1.* The Letters from *Germany* give an Account, That the Elector of *Bavaria* was marching with 20000 Men towards the Duchy of *Wirtemberg*; and, that the French Troops had thereupon quitted several Places with great precipitation. Our Governor General has given Orders for the providing a great Magazine at *Monr*, and another at *Namur*. The Citadel of *Liege* is not yet demolished.
