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Venice, January 8.

Several Vessels are arrived here this week from the *Levant*, with divers Noble *Venetians* and others who served the last Campaign as *Volontiers* in the Army of this State: They give an Account, that the Doge *Morosini* continued at *Napoli di Romania*, having put his Troops into good Quarters, and, that the Officers and Soldiers who were wounded, or fell sick, during the Siege of *Negrepont*, were mozt of them recovered; That Signior *Vener*, Captain Extraordinary of the Ships, was Cruising with a Squadron of Men of War in the *Archipelago*; and, that he had sent several Ships to block up *Negrepont*: That the Garrison of *Napoli di Malvasia* had made an Incursion towards *Ziranto*, but that in their return they were fallen upon by the Country People, and the greatest part of them cut off. The Doge has demanded a supply of 6000 Italian Soldiers against the next Campaign, which the Senate have consented to; and have besides Ordered 4000 of the Troops that are at present under the Command of the *Proveditore General Cornaro* in *Dalmatia*, to be forthwith sent to the *Levant*. It's said likewise, that the Senate intend to make a Levy of 3000 *Suiffers*.

Vienna, Jan. 16. Commissions are given out for three new Regiments more of Foot. And the Regiments of *Staremberg*, *Anhalt*, *Serini*, *Lorraine*, *Neubourg*, and *Caunitz*, will have four new Companies added to each of them. The Count de *Czobor* has already raised 2000 *Hussars*; and has undertaken to raise 2000 more against the Spring. The day is not yet fixed for the Audience of the Turkish Ambassadors, though they continue to press very earnestly for it, but, it's not doubted, they will now very quickly be admitted thereunto; and, in the mean time, we are assured by the last Advices from *Turkey*, that the Grand *Visier* had, to prevent a general Revolt in the Ottoman Empire, caused it to be published, that a Peace was concluded. The Garrison of *Great Waradin* has mutinied against their *Bassa*, whereupon Orders have been sent to General *Heuser*, who Commands the Imperial Forces on that side, to block up that Place yet closer, and to propose good Conditions to the Garrison, the more to induce them to a surrender. Those of *Sieeb* are likewise reduced to great extremity, and cannot subsist much longer, though they have rejected the Proposals which were lately made to them by Colonel *Macaire*, who, to streighten them yet more, has built several small Forts round the Town. The Garrison of *Cansfa* is in no less necessity; one of their Parties which was sent out, to seek for some

Corn or other Provisions in the Neighbouring Villages, was lately met and defeated by the *Imperialists*; The Prisoners could not sufficiently express the Miseries they suffered within the Place, but declared withal, that they were resolved to perish through Famine, rather than surrender before they saw the success of the Treaty of Peace that's now on foot.

Ratisbonne, Jan. 10. Yesterday was published here the Imperial *Avocatoria*, by which all the Subjects of the Empire that are engaged in the Service of *France*, are required forthwith to quit upon pain of Death and Confiscation of Goods; and the same will be published in all other Considerable Places of the Empire. The *Dyer* has at present in Consideration the Re-establishing the Imperial Chamber; *Ulme* and *Hildesheim* have been proposed as very Convenient Places, but, it's believed, that *Augsbourg* or *Francfort* will be rather made choice of for that purpose. The Troops of *Bavaria* are to Rendezvous to Morrow at *Fridberg*, where his Electoral Highness will be in Person. The three Regiments that are quartered in this Neighbourhood are to march, to join these Forces at *Donawert*, and when they are all together, the Elector of *Bavaria* will have of his own Troops, and those of the Circles of *Bavaria*, *Suabia*, and *Franconia*, an Army of 25000 Men; with which he will act on the *Upper Rhine*; The Elector of *Saxony* will have another Army of about the same number under his Command. And these two Princes are to have a Conference this week at *Norlingen*.

Strasbourg, Jan. 14. The four new Regiments that have been raised in *Alsace* for the Service of *France*, have Orders to march to *Burgundy*. Great provision is made here, and in all the other places of this Province, of Ammunition, Forage, &c. Divers Hostages are daily brought hither, which are taken out of the places the *French* Troops have been forced to abandon in the Circles of *Suabia* and *Franconia*, for the security of their Contributions. We are told from *Baden* in *Suisserland*, that the Imperial Minister did Negotiate a Levy of 4000 men, in which, 'twas not doubted, but he would succeed.

Cologne, Jan. 20. The *French* have, upon the approach of the Forces of the Empire, quitted all the Places they had possessed themselves of in *Suabia*; And, there is a report, that their Troops, which are at present quartered in the *Palatinate* and the Electorate of *Mentz*, will very suddenly have Orders to march this way. The *French* demand 80000 Crowns for Contributions of the Counties of *Saurland* and *Recklingausen* belonging to this Archbi-

shoprick; and pretend to have the Contributions, which the Dutchies of *Fuliers* and *Bergues* agreed to pay in *May* or *June*, paid before the end of the next Month. It is confirmed by all the Letters from *Munich*, that the Electors of *Bavaria* is with Child, to the great joy of that Court.

Cologne, Jan. 26. We expect to morrow the Troops which the Bishops of *Munster* and *Paderborne* are to send hither as their Quota's for the reinforcing the Garrison of this City. The Cardinal of *Furtemberg* has caused several Parties of Horse and Dragoons to advance towards *Nuis*, *Rhinberg*, and *Sibourg*, to put the Dutchies of *Fuliers* and *Bergues* under Military Execution, in case they do not forthwith pay the Two-hundred and eighty thousand Crowns they had agreed to pay in *June* next; which makes us think, the French Troops, that are under his Orders; will not continue long in this Country. The Elector of *Brandenburg* demands the same Contributions of the Electorate of *Cologne*, as the French, who are there quartered, pretend to the Dutchy of *Cleves*, and the Counties of *Marck* and *Ravensberg*. The City of *Aix la Chapelle* has not yet agreed with the French about their Contributions, but have sent Deputies to *Bon* to sollicite some abatement. We have an Account from *Munich*, that the Elector of *Bavaria* had sent to the French Minister at his Court, to retire from thence; and was himself gone to Command his Forces, which were, with those of the Circles, marching towards *Wurtemberg*.

Hambourg, Jan. 18. Part of the Suedish Troops, which are to enter into the Service of the States-General of the *United Provinces*, have begun their march, which they will take through *Friseland*; and the rest will follow in few days.

Liege, Jan. 24. The Prince and States of this Country have ratified the Treaty of Neutrality concluded by the Count de *Grossbeck*, their Minister at the Court of *France*; by which they are obliged to pay to the French 50000 Crowns yearly as long as the War shall continue; and to raze the Cittadel, except the Wall that joins to the City. And the French are to quit the Town of *Huy*. But it having been represented to the said Prince and States, how prejudicial the demolishing of the Cittadel may be to this Country and Neighbourhood, that Article is not yet complied with, though an Envoy is come hither from *France* on purpose to require the execution of it. The 18th Instant a Dutch Party of 50 Men meeting with about the same number of French near *Avroy*, put them to flight, and took 23 Prisoners, which they carried to *Maestricht*. The French who came from the Country of *Eyselt*, have possessed themselves of the Castle of *Dalenbroek*. We hear from *Westphalia*, that 10000 Suedes are marching towards the *Rhine* and the *Meuse*.

Maestricht, Jan. 22. A Party of this Garrison having notice, that the French that are at *Huy*, had sent a Convoy to fetch some Arms and Provisions from *Liege*, and joining thereupon with another Party of the Garrison of the Castle of *Oppey*, they posted themselves in a Covered Way between *Huy* and *Liege*, which the said Convoy was to pass; Their Design succeeded, for attacking the Enemy in their return, they slew divers of them, and took 17 with 3 Officers prisoners, who were brought hither with 3 Wagons laden with Arms.

Brussels, Febr. 2. Several of the new raised Regiments, as those of Horse Commanded by *Don Gaspar de Espinosa*, the *Sieur de Baye*, and the *Sieur de Summarga*, and the Dragoons of *Don Fre-*

deric de Castro, have already been Mustered; And the Regiments of Horse of the Duke de *Cro*, and the *Sieur de Mont*; the Dragoons Commanded by the *Prince de Soubise*, and the Regiment of Foot of the *Marquis de Dange* will be likewise compleat in few days. We hear from *Bon*, that the Cardinal of *Furtemberg* has sent Count *Kerdinand*, his Nephew, to the Court of *France*, to desire farther Success. And that the Swissers in the French Service, which are at present quartered in the Electorate of *Cologne*, have declared, that they cannot serve against the Empire. The French continue to plunder and burn the Places and Countries which they are forced to quit on the East-side of the *Rhine*; and intend to demolish all the Places in the *Palatinate* and the Electorate of *Mentz*, except *Philipsbourg*, which they fortifie. We are going to provide Magazines in several Places, particularly at *Mons* and *Namur*; and Orders are likewise given for the preparing a Train of Artillery, and a good number of Baggage Wagons. The French have begun to demolish the Walls of *Huy*.

Paris, Febr. 2. The Baron de *Spanheim*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has had his Audiences of Leave, in order to his return home; And the Suedish Minister is likewise on his departure. The *Marschal d'Espre* parted from hence on Sunday last, having Orders to repair with all diligence to *Britany*, to Command there. It's said, that *Spain* has declared against this Crown.
