tine," Belides there new Levies, his Excellency has refolved to re-inforce all the old Bodier. The French Troops continue to Affemble between the Simbre and the Meufe. They write from Nuremberg of the 11th Initant, that the Elector of Bavaria; who was returning to Municke, was, upon some fresh Advice he had received of the motion of the French, gone back to his Forces. The Duke of Lirraine is to Command the Imperial Army on the Rhine, which will be com-poled of 30000 Germans, 6000 of the Circles, and 4000 Hungarians, The Elector of Bavaria will Command his own Troops, with those of the Circles of Bavaria, Suabia, Franconia, and the Upper Rhine, which together will amount to 52000, without reckoning the Troops of Sa-xony, Brand Burg, Lunenburg, and the other Allies. The science are going to guit the Palatinate ; They have laid in Afhes 18 Bourgs and Villages between Hydelberg and the Rhine.

St. George Kt. Garter Principal King of Arms, having received a Proclamation, and the faid Officers of Arns being Ordered by the House of Lords forth-withto Proclaim the fame, York Herald (after the 'Trumpets had thrice founded) Proclaimed it at White half-Gate accordingly (the faid Garter Reading it to him by Periods) in the prefence of the fuid Lords and Commons and Multitudes of People there Affembled, who concluded the fame with repeated Acclamations of Joy. From whence they proceeded in this manner. First, the Head Bayl H of Wellminfter with his Men ; Next, the Anight Marshals Men, then a Clafs of Trumpets, followed by the Sergeant Trumpeter ; Then an Officer of Arms fingly, followed by fix other, each accompanied with a Sergeant at Arms; Then Garter King of Arms with the Proclamation, accompanied by the Ufher of the Black Rod ; Then the Lord Marquifs of Halifax, who Executes the Place of Speaker in the House of Lords, in his Coach, attended by Sir Roger Harfnet, Eldeft Sergeant at Arms, with his Mace; Then Henry Pomlebig; Speaker of the House of Commons, in his Coach, attended by Bergeant Topham, with his Mace; Then the Duke of Norfolk, Earl Man thal of England, in his Coach, followed by the relt of the Heers in Order, all in Coaches; Latily, the Members of the Huile of Commons in their Coaches. dered the Gates to be opened, and the Whole Frocceding entred (except the Bailiff of Westmanfter and his Men who went off there) and the Lord Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermon receiving them in their Formatities, a fecond Proclamation was made between the two Temple Gates; and the faid Aldermen, Sheriff and Lord Mayor falling into the Proceeding, at Woodftreet end in Cheapfide Their Majetties were Proclaimed a Third time; and to at the Royal Exchange in Cornhill a Fourth time; each Proclamation being ecchoed with Universal Acclamations of Joy by the Multitudes of People which crowded the Streets, Windows and Balconies ; the Streets all the way from Temple Bar to the Royal Exchange being lined with four Regiments of the City Militia. Thus the Ceremony ended, and the night was concluded with Borfires, ringing of Bells, and all other Expressions of Duty and Affection to Their Majelties, king WILLIAM, and Queen MARY, with hearty Wilhes for Their Long and Happy Reign.
