In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

## EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875 (38 Vic., c. 17).

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 18.)—GULF OF FINLAND.

(1.) *Alteration in Fog Signal, Revelstone Light-vessel.*

INFORMATION has been received that on the opening of navigation the following alteration will be made in the fog signal of Revelstone Light-vessel:—

A fog whistle will be established, which in thick or foggy weather will be sounded for *thirty seconds*, at intervals of *one minute*.

With the wind, the whistle will be heard from a distance of about 6 miles, and against the wind from a distance of about one mile.

## NORTH SEA—ELBE RIVER.

(2.) *Light-vessel near Cuxhaven.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 175, dated 4th December, 1875, on the establishment of a light-vessel near Cuxhaven.

The German Government has given the following additional particulars, viz:—

The *fixed* white light is elevated 25 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 6 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The vessel has been named *Elbe Light-vessel* No. 4, and is moored in mid-channel in  $7\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on the following bearings:

The lighthouse at Cuxhaven bears S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.

The Neuwerk High Lighthouse bears W. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.

In thick or foggy weather the ship's bell is rung for *one minute*, at intervals of *fifteen minutes*, and if a vessel is noticed steering a wrong course, guns are fired in the day time, and a blue light is burnt at night.

When the light vessel is not in position by reason of the ice, the light is not exhibited, and the wicker cage on the mainmast is removed.

NOTE.—It is not yet decided whether the light-vessel will be permanently established.

(3.) *Harbour Light at Hamburg.*

Also, that a *fixed* light of the sixth order, with *red* and *green* sectors, is now exhibited at the west corner of the Sandthor Quay, Hamburg.

The light shows red in the direction of Ostergatt, and *green* towards Sandthor Harbour.

(No. 19.)—HINDOSTAN, WEST COAST—KARACHI.

#### (1.) *Light at the Extremity of the Breakwater.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 76, dated 11th June, 1875, on the establishment of a red light at the outer extremity of the breakwater extending from Manora Point—

#### (2.) *Pulo Brasse Auxiliary Light.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 144, dated 9th October, 1875, on the establishment of a light on the north point of Pulo Brasse, and the intended exhibition of an auxiliary light:—

The Netherlands Government has given further notice, that the auxiliary light is now exhibited below the principal light.

The auxiliary light is a *fixed red* light, visible through an arc of 90 degrees, between the bearings of S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. and E. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., elevated 430 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The light indicates the positions of the islands and shoals that lie to the north-west of the lighthouse.

#### (3.) *Island between Pulo Nias and Sumatra.*

The Netherlands Government has given notice, that a low barren island, Konig Willem Island, has been discovered in the strait between Pulo Nias and Sumatra, lying S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. about 10 miles from Pulo Doca.

About 8 miles eastward of Konig Willem is situated a white rock, at two miles from which the sea was observed to break.

Position of the island, lat.  $1^{\circ} 24' N.$ , long.  $98^{\circ} 17' E.$  Position of White rock, lat.  $1^{\circ} 27' N.$ , long.  $98^{\circ} 24' E.$

### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 20.)—NEW ZEALAND, MIDDLE ISLAND, WEST COAST.

#### (1.) *Stewart Breaker, near Kiourangi Point.*

THE Colonial Government of New Zealand has given notice, that the danger known as *Stewart Breaker (Kiourangi Shoal)*, lying of Kiourangi Point, has been ascertained to consist of rocky ground, to be three quarters of a mile long and half a mile broad, having near its southern end a depth of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms.

From the shoal part, Kiourangi Point bears S.S.E.  $\frac{2}{3}$  E., distant  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles. This bearing and distance places Stewart Breaker in lat.  $40^{\circ} 44' 40'' S.$ , long.  $172^{\circ} 12' E.$

NOTE.—In heavy weather this rock should be approached cautiously, but the passage inshore of it is clear of danger.

#### (2.) *Intended Light on Cape Foulwind.*

Also, that a lighthouse is in the course of erection on Cape Foulwind, west coast of Middle Island.

The light (which is expected to be exhibited in June or July, 1876), will be a *revolving* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy *every half minute.*

#### (3.) *Buller River.*

Also, that the bay eastward of Cape Foulwind, as also the entrance to the Buller River, have been surveyed and the following directions given; viz.:—

Vessels taking shelter in the bay should, with the wind from seaward, get under-way on the ebb tide, as the flood sets towards the Steeples.

The bar at the entrance of the Buller River lies E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles from the outer Steeple Rock. Vessels bound for the river should be guided by the signals made at the flagstaff, and in crossing the bar keep the flagstaff and beacon in line, paying attention to the semaphore arm, as a strong current at times sets across the entrance, and the bar is liable to shift.

By night, a *fixed* white light is shown from the flagstaff, and a *red* light from the beacon, the white light should be seen 6 miles. By day, a red flag is hoisted on the beacon.

NOTE.—The Colonial bar and danger signals are shown from the flagstaff. The pilot only boards inside.

NORTH ISLAND—WEST COAST.

#### (4.) *Harbour Light at New Plymouth.*

Also that a harbour light is now exhibited at New Plymouth (Taranaki) from the flagstaff on Mount Elliot.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 75 feet above the level of the sea.

(No. 23.)—CANADA—RIVER ST. LAWRENCE.

(1.) *Alteration in Kamouraska Light.*

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, that from the 1st April, 1876, the following alteration will be made in the light on Grande Island, Kamouraska Islands, River St. Lawrence, viz.:—

The light will be changed from a fixed *white* light to a *revolving* *white* light attaining its greatest brilliancy *every minute*.

NOVA SCOTIA—TOR BAY.

(2.) *Fixed Light on Berry Head.*

Also, that on the 10th April, 1876, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the eastern point of Berry Head, west side of the entrance to Tor Bay.

The light will be a *fixed* light, showing *red* to seaward, and *white* to the northward into the bay and towards Molasses Harbour; it is elevated 51 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

The tower, 36 feet high, is a square wooden building, attached to the keeper's dwelling, and painted white with red vertical stripes. Position, lat. 45° 11' 40" N., long. 61° 18' 40" W.

HALIFAX HARBOUR.

(3.) *Two Fixed Lights on George Island.*

Also, that two lights are now exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the west side of George Island, Halifax Harbour.

The lights are *fixed* *white* lights, 20 feet apart vertically, the upper one elevated 50 feet above the level of high water. They are seen from seaward, and also into the harbour on the north side, but on the west side the upper light only is seen.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

The tower, 21 feet high, is a square wooden building, painted drab.

This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels into and out of Halifax Harbour, westward of George Island.

NOTE.—Vessels entering the harbour, passing Maugher Beach, must keep these lights on the starboard bow, and after passing George Island, may anchor in any part of the harbour.

## Borough of Batley.—Tramway Bye-laws.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that at a Special Meeting of the Council of the Borough of Batley, held on Friday, the 25th day of February, 1876, in pursuance of notice for that purpose duly given, and summonses duly served, at which said meeting two-thirds of the whole number of the said Council were present, it was ordered and ordained, and the said Council in pursuance of the Tramways Act, 1870, and of every other Act of Parliament, power and authority enabling them in that behalf, did make, ordain, and declare the following Bye-laws, to commence and take effect from and after the 7th day of May, 1876, namely:—

1. There shall be granted a licence for such and so many tram cars and drivers and conductors thereof as the Council shall from time to time determine, upon payment of a sum not exceeding 2s. 6d. for each such licence, and such licences may be either suspended or withdrawn at any time by direction of the Council, and every person who shall act as driver or conductor without a licence, or during its suspension or revocation, or as driver or conductor of an unlicensed car, shall forfeit and pay for each offence a sum not exceeding 4s. All licences shall be signed by the Mayor or the Chairman of the Watch Committee, and shall continue in force for one year after the date thereof, unless in the meantime such licence shall be suspended or withdrawn as aforesaid.

If the Company shall permit any car to be used or plied for hire within the borough without being duly licensed for that purpose, they shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of 40s., and to a further penalty of 40s. for every day on which such car shall be used or ply for hire without being so licensed.

2. Every application for a licence to a car shall be in writing, and signed by the Secretary of the Company, and shall state the number of passengers which the same may carry at any one time, both inside and outside, and not less than sixteen inches shall be allowed to each person measuring in a straight line, the seats to be in all respects convenient for sitting on, and every such licence shall also state the number of passengers which the car licensed may carry at any one time.

3. The driver and conductor of every car shall not allow more than the number of persons for which such car shall be licensed to be carried in or on such car, nor shall any person except the conductor and driver be allowed to ride on the steps or stairs, or on the outside platform of such car, nor shall any person ride in or on any car if informed by the driver or conductor thereof that the same has already the full number of passengers.

4. Every driver and conductor of any car shall be sober, and conduct himself in an orderly and respectful manner.

5. No person under the age of 16 years shall drive or act as driver or conductor of any car, nor shall any proprietor of such car employ in either of the capacities aforesaid any person under the age of 16 years.

6. The owner, and driver, and conductor of every car shall at the time of procuring his licence, obtain either with or without charge (as the Council may determine) a copy of these Bye-laws, certified by the signature of the Town Clerk, with the name of the owner, driver, or conductor legibly written thereon, and shall at all times have such certified copy of these Bye-laws ready to produce, and shall produce the same for perusal and inspection to any passengers, and shall point out the Bye-law

applicable to any question which may have arisen, and shall likewise produce to such passenger, or the Inspector of Hackney Carriages, or any police constable, on demand, the duplicate of his licence.

7. In case of any property or thing being left in any car by a passenger, the conductor or driver of such car shall, within twelve hours from its being found, take the same in the state in which it was discovered, to the nearest police station, there to be deposited for reclamation, and such conductor or driver shall be entitled for his trouble and loss of time to the sum of sixpence, to be paid by the owner of such lost property on claiming it.

8. The Company shall, before permitting any car to be plied for hire have the name of the Company painted and kept painted on the outside of such car in a legible and conspicuous manner to the satisfaction of the Council or their inspector, and with such other notices and particulars as the Council may from time to time direct.

9. A table of fares shall at all times be affixed, in clear and legible characters, on the inside of every car, together with the number of the licence of such car, and on the outside the number of passengers such car is licensed to carry.

10. Every car shall, when it is being plied for hire, be in good order, the glasses and frames of the windows thereof whole, the inside clean, the harness in good repair and order, and the horses competent to perform the duty required of them.

11. The Company shall, upon request, give the name and place of abode of the driver or conductor of any car.

12. In every car there shall be provided steps for getting inside and outside of such car, which shall be safe and convenient.

13. No smoking shall be permitted inside any car, nor shall any dog be allowed under any circumstances to ride inside any car.

14. No driver or conductor of any car, shall wilfully deceive any person in respect of the route or destination thereof, or for the purpose of taking up or setting down any passenger, or (except in case of accident or other unavoidable necessity) stop such carriage upon any place where foot passengers usually cross the roadway.

15. No driver or conductor of any car shall be drunk when plying for hire, nor use abusive language to any person nor to each other, nor loiter with such car on the highway.

16. The cars shall be driven at a rate not exceeding six miles in the hour upon the average.

17. The driver of every car shall stop the car whilst passengers are getting on or into, or alighting therefrom, and shall not proceed until such passengers are seated, or shall have alighted.

18. Every car shall start punctually from the places and at the times stated, both on the outward and inward journey, and a printed table, showing such times and places, shall be affixed inside such car.

19. So long as there shall be room in any car, every driver or conductor thereof shall convey every person desiring to ride in or on such car, except persons intoxicated, or others who from their dress would interfere with the comfort or convenience of other persons riding in or on such car.

20. It shall be lawful for the inspector or for any constable to inspect and examine any car when plying for hire, and the horses attached to or drawing the same, and to report thereon to the Chairman of the Watch Committee for the time being, and any driver, owner, or conductor who shall interrupt any such inspector or constable in or about such inspection or examination, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

21. No person being the owner, driver, or conductor of any car shall knowingly convey any dead body, or any person labouring under any infectious fever or disease.

22. No tram car shall be drawn by any steam or other engine without the consent of the Council.

23. The penalty for breach or non-observance of these Bye-laws shall in every case (except where otherwise provided) be any sum not exceeding 40s.

In the foregoing Bye-laws, the words herein-after mentioned shall be interpreted as follows, that is to say, the word "Borough" shall mean the borough of Batley, the word "Council" shall mean the Council of the borough of Batley, or the Committee appointed by the Council for the purposes of these Bye-laws, "tram car" or "car" shall mean all tram cars or other carriages with flange wheels using the metals laid down by the Company in the said borough by virtue of the provisions of the Tramways Act, 1870, and of any Provisional Order made thereunder, the word "Company" shall mean the Dewsbury, Batley, and Birstall Tramways Company Limited, and shall include any other Company or person or persons respectively, owner or owners of tram cars running or plying for hire within the borough; the words "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the person licensed to act in either of those capacities, and the word "inspector" shall mean the Inspector of Hackney Carriages for the time being appointed by the Council, or any other person so appointed for the purposes of these Bye-laws.
