NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 27.)—SOUTH ATLANTIC OCEAN.

Shoal off Coast of Brazil.

INFORMATION has been received from the Peruvian Legation of a declaration having been made before the Maritime Authorities at Callao, by the Master of the English barque "Professor Airy," of the existence of a shoal, on which that vessel grounded near the 17th parallel of south latitude, and about 180 miles from the coast of Brazil: similar information has also been obtained from the owner of the ship, Mr. James Burgess, of Swansea.

When on a voyage from Cardiff to Callao, on the evening of the 4th October, 1875, in lat. 17° 9' S., long. 36° 4' W., with a light S.S.E. wind and clear weather, the Barque "Professor Airy," going at the rate of 4 knots, suddenly scraped the bottom and remained aground for nearly an hour.

Mr. Morgan, commanding the vessel, considers the shoal to be of coral formation. Whilst aground, the depth alongside was 17½ feet: when the vessel floated, no bottom could be found with 25 fathoms; and during the night soundings were several times tried for with 40 fathoms, but no bottom obtained.

The position assigned to the shoal ground (presumably by observation, as the ship had two chronometers on board), is about 10 miles S.S.E. from the southern part of a bank on which, in the year 1823, soundings, varying from 31 to 70 fathoms, were obtained by H.M.S. "Fly." It is also about 40 miles northward of the Hotspur Bank, on which the soundings vary from 25 to 34 fathoms.

Until this region of irregular soundings has been more fully examined, navigators should, in the neighbourhood of these banks, proceed with

caution, and are recommended to use the lead frequently.

(No. 28.)—ENGLAND—WEST COAST.

Light-Vessel and Buoy marking Wreck off Dover.

THE Trinity House, London, has given notice, that a light-vessel with *Wreck* painted on her sides, and from which a riding light is exhibited by night, has been placed 1¼ cables W. by N. from the wreck of the steam-vessel "Strathclyde," sunk off Dover.

The light-vessel is moored in 16 fathoms at low-water spring tides, with the following mark and bearings; viz:—

The Garrison Chapel touching the east side of the Lord Warden Hotel, N.N.W. ¼ W.

Dover Pier Head, N.N.W. ¼ W. 1¼ miles.

South Foreland High Light, N.E. by N. 3 miles.

Also, that a *green* buoy marked *Wreck* has been placed 25 fathoms east of the sunken vessel, and lies in 16 fathoms at low water.

When the masts of the wreck, which at present show above high water, are removed, the light-vessel will be taken away.
