

said Orders be varied to the extent hereinafter specified in respect of burials in Leamington :

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of February last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz. :—

ST. PAUL'S, PUDSEY, CALVERLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. Paul's, Pudsey; and that in the churchyard the Official Regulations for new Burial Grounds, omitting the third, be observed.

CLEE.—In the parish churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, except in now existing vaults, and walled graves in which each coffin shall be enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented; and except in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of the parents, widows, or widowers, of those previously buried in the churchyard.

LEES, ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.—In St. John the Baptist's churchyard, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which are free from water, and that each coffin buried in such vaults and walled graves shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and in the additional churchyard of St. John the Baptist, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, with the like exception, and except also in earthen graves in which no coffin shall be buried within a foot of any other coffin or less than four feet below the surface of the ground.

LEAMINGTON.—Forthwith in the additional churchyard, in New-street, Leamington, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in respect of interments in the burial-ground of Spencer-street Chapel, Leamington be varied as follows: That burials shall be forthwith discontinued in Spencer-street Chapel, Leamington, and in

the burial-ground thereof except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the fourteenth of January one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in respect of interments in the old cemetery or additional churchyard of Leamington be varied by the addition of the following words; no earthen graves to be re-opened except to bury other members of the families of those already buried therein.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in respect of interments in the burial-grounds of the Roman Catholic, Lady Huntingdon, and Warwick-street Chapels, be varied as follows; that burials shall be forthwith discontinued in the Roman Catholic Chapel, George-street, the Lady Huntingdon's Chapel, Mill-street, and the Warwick-street Chapel, and in the burial-grounds of the said chapels, except in walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons or person having the care of the parish churchyard of Dwygyfylechi, in the county of Carnarvon, has made a representation, stating that, for the purpose of preventing the said churchyard from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;
