PRESENT,

The **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of "The Saint Paul's Cathedral, London, Minor Canonries Act, 1875," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of "The Saint Paul's Cathedral London Minor Canonries Act 1875" have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for regulating the office and the duties of the Minor Canon of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in the city and diocese of London who shall be appointed after the passing of the said Act.

"Whereas the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Saint Paul have submitted to us certain proposals having for their object the regulation of the office and the duties of the Minor Canon of the said Cathedral Church of Saint Paul who shall be appointed after the passing of the said Act.

"And whereas it appears to us to be desirable that the said proposals should be carried into effect.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of London in testimony whereof he hath set his hand and his episcopal seal to this scheme, and with the consent of the Very Reverend Richard William Church the Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London and of the Chapter of the same church in testimony whereof the said Dean and Chapter have set their common or capitular seal to this scheme we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette all that is in the said proposals contained being all that is set forth in the numbered clauses (nine in number) hereinafter appearing shall take effect as follows that is to say

"I. The duties of the Minor Canon of the

said Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London shall be

"(a.) To take such part in all or any of the services of the said cathedral church as the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church may from time to time direct.

"(b.) To give lectures hold classes and otherwise give or conduct religious instruction in the said cathedral church and to exercise pastoral supervision over the servants of the said church as the said Dean and Chapter may from time to time direct.

"(c.) Generally to give diligent assistance (as the said Dean and Chapter may direct) in promoting the usefulness of the said cathedral as a place of religious service and instruction.

"(d.) To obey all such lawful regulations or directions as may from time to time be made or given either generally or on special occasions by the said Dean and Chapter with respect to the several matters aforesaid or any of them.

"II. It shall also be the duty of each of the said Minor Canon to lead a sober godly and religious life and to preserve a blameless character and to bring no scandal upon the body of which he is a member by any immoral conduct or by any behaviour inconsistent with the office he holds.

"III. The said Dean and Chapter shall make such provision with respect to the performance of their duties by the said Minor Canon respectively as that each Minor Canon shall in the course of each and every year have a vacation together or to be accounted at several times of not less (in the whole) than ten weeks and every Minor Canon shall throughout the year (except in the time of his vacation and except during any special leave of absence which may have been given to him by the said Dean and Chapter) personally occupy and reside in the house of residence to be appropriated to such Minor Canon by the said Dean and Chapter and not elsewhere. And no Minor Canon shall at any time let or part with the possession of his said house of residence or of any part thereof without the licence and authority of the said Dean and Chapter first for that purpose obtained provided that no such licence or authority as aforesaid shall extend to or be deemed to justify the letting or use of any such house of residence as aforesaid or any part thereof for the purposes of any trade or business.

"IV. None of the said Minor Canon shall do or suffer any act or thing whereby either through

his own act or default or by operation of law his income and house of residence as such Minor Canon or either of them or any part thereof respectively may be charged or encumbered or may become vested in or payable to or enjoyed by any other person or persons except as to the said house by letting the same with such licence and authority as aforesaid.

"V. Every Minor Canon who shall attain the age of fifty-five years shall retire from office and his minor canony shall upon his attaining that age ipso facto become vacant. And the said Dean and Chapter shall pay to any Minor Canon so retiring during the then residue of his life a pension according to the following scale:—

"(a.) If the Minor Canon so retiring shall have held his minor canony for less than ten years a pension of such amount not exceeding forty pounds annually as the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the Visitor and the Dean and Chapter shall in each particular case deem adequate.

"(b.) If the Minor Canon so retiring shall have held his minor canony for ten years and less than fifteen years a pension of eighty pounds annually.

"(c.) If the Minor Canon so retiring shall have held his minor canony for fifteen years and less than twenty years a pension of one hundred and sixty pounds annually (which sum includes an allowance of forty pounds for house rent).

"(d.) If the Minor Canon so retiring shall have held his minor canony for twenty years or upwards a pension of two hundred and fifty pounds annually (which sum includes an allowance of fifty pounds for house rent.)

"Every such pension shall be payable by equal half yearly payments and shall commence and be computed from the day on which the Minor Canon so retiring shall have attained the age of fifty-five years provided that it shall be the duty of every Minor Canon to furnish to the said Dean and Chapter such information with respect to or reasonable evidence of his age as the said Dean and Chapter shall from time to time require.

"VI. In case any Minor Canon shall before attaining the age of fifty-five years become from any cause unable in the judgment of the said Dean and Chapter duly to discharge the duties of his office or any of them (the fact of such inability being if necessary established by due enquiry) it shall be lawful for the said Dean and Chapter by writing under their common seal to remove such Minor Canon from his minor canony and such minor canony shall thereupon become vacant and the said Dean and Chapter shall pay half yearly to every Minor Canon so removed during the then residue of his life a pension to be computed from the date of removal and to be of such an amount as the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the Visitor of the said Cathedral Church and the said Dean and Chapter shall under the circumstances of the particular case deem adequate Provided that as to any Minor Canon so removed who shall have held his office for ten years or upwards in case the amount of the same pension shall not be ascertained before the expiration of six calendar months from the date of such removal the said Dean and Chapter shall at the expiration of such six calendar months and thenceforth half-yearly until the amount of the same permanent pension shall be ascertained (or until the death of the Minor Canon so removed which shall first happen) pay to the

Minor Canon so removed an interim pension according to the following scale, that is to say, If the Minor Canon so removed shall have held his canony for ten years and less than fifteen years an interim pension of eighty pounds annually. If the Minor Canon so removed shall have held his canony for fifteen years and less than twenty years an interim pension of one hundred and sixty pounds annually (which sum includes an allowance of forty pounds for house rent.) If the Minor Canon so removed shall have held his canony for twenty years or upwards an interim pension of two hundred and fifty pounds annually (which sum includes an allowance of fifty pounds for house rent) Provided that after the amount of the said permanent pension shall have been ascertained as aforesaid the payments which shall have been made to the Minor Canon so removed in respect of his said interim pension shall if less in amount than the payments which ought to have been made to him in respect of his permanent pension (if ascertained) be deemed to have been made on account of such last-mentioned payments but if equal or greater in amount to or than such last-mentioned payments be deemed to have been made in satisfaction of the same payments.

"VII. It shall be lawful for the said Dean and Chapter to appoint any Minor Canon who may have so retired or been removed from his office as aforesaid to be an Honorary Minor Canon of the said cathedral church with a right to a stall in the choir of the said church, provided that no emolument whatsoever nor any place in the College of Minor Canons of the said cathedral church shall be taken or held by any Honorary Minor Canon by virtue of his appointment as such Honorary Minor Canon.

"VIII. Every pension which under the provisions of any scheme and Order of your Majesty in Council passed or made under the authority of the said 'Saint Paul's Cathedral, London, Minor Canons Act 1875' shall become payable to any Minor Canon who shall have retired or been removed from his office shall be subject to the provisions contained in section 9 of the last-mentioned Act in regard to sesser and reduction of pensions.

"IX. It shall be the duty of the said Dean and Chapter in selecting Minor Canons to have regard not to musical excellence alone but to all the provisions hereinbefore contained and to the fitness of any Minor Canon to discharge all the duties of the office as hereinbefore specified or appearing.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

Alterations in the Buoyage of Burford, Kish, Codling, Ridge, and India Banks.

No. 38, dated 6th April, 1876, on intended alterations and additions in the buoyage of the Burford, Kish, Codling, Ridge, and India Banks—
 The Commissioners of Irish Lights have given notice, that the alterations therein mentioned have been made, viz. :—

Burford Bank.

North Buoy has been changed to a *conical buoy chequered black and white*, with staff and globe.

South Buoy has been moved one cable to the westward, and moored in 4 fathoms. The staff and globe having been removed.

Kish Bank.

The Kish, Bray, and Codling Banks will in future be considered as one danger.

North, or No. 1 Buoy.—A *black conical buoy* with staff and globe marks the northern extremity of these banks; it is moored in 6 fathoms N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., one cable from its former position.

No. 2 Buoy.—A *black can buoy*, with Bailey Lighthouse N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., and Mapas Obelisk N.W. by W., westerly.

No. 3 Buoy.—A *black can buoy* has been moored in 17 fathoms E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 6 cables from the position of the buoy formerly marking the south end of the Kish Bank, and which buoy has been removed. Mapas Obelisk bears N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., and Great Sugar-loaf W. by N.

No. 4 Buoy.—A *black can buoy* has been moored in about 8 fathoms, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and Wicklow Head S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., westerly.

The black and white vertical striped buoy marking the east end of Codling Bank has been removed.

S.E., or No. 5 Buoy.—A *black conical buoy* has been moored on the south-eastern extremity of the Codling Bank, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and Wicklow Head S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., westerly.

S.W., or No. 6 Buoy.—A *conical buoy*, painted black and white in vertical stripes, is moored in about 20 fathoms, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and Wicklow Head S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.]

South Ridge and India Bank.

These banks will in future be considered as one danger.

Ridge North Buoy.—A *conical buoy*, painted with black and white horizontal bands with staff and globe, is moored at the north end of the Ridge in about 8 fathoms, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. by N., and Wicklow Head Lighthouse S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

India Bank South Buoy.—The south end of the India Bank is marked by a *conical buoy*, painted with black and white horizontal bands, with Great Sugar-loaf N.N.W. westerly, and Wicklow Head Lighthouse W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.

Intended Alteration in Roche Point Light.

(1.) *Alteration in Light at Bustard Head.*

THE Colonial Government of Queensland has given notice, that from the 3rd April, 1876, the following alteration would be made in the lights exhibited on Bustard Head, viz. :—

The two small leading lights heretofore exhibited to mark the position of the outer rock off Bustard Head would be discontinued, and a near approach to the rock would be denoted by a light exhibited from a square tower, bearing S.E. by S., distant 500 yards from the Bustard Head Lighthouse, and elevated 280 feet above the level of high water.

This light is of the fifth order between the bearings of S by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. and S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., but it will also be seen as a natural light as far southward as the bearing S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., and also between the bearings of S.E. and E.S.E.

This light is so screened as to be obscured between the bearings of S.S.W. and S. by E., to a distance of one mile outside the rock at high water; the northern line of eclipse running in a W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. direction.

NOTE.—Vessels when passing Bustard Head, in order to clear the outer rock, should keep this auxiliary light in sight until the ray of red light exhibited from the principal lighthouse is passed.

INNER ROUTE TO TORRES STRAIT.

(2.) *Light-Vessel at Piper Islands.*

Also, that a dioptric light is now exhibited from a light-vessel moored at Piper Islands, inner route to Torres Strait.

The light is elevated 35 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.
