A PROCLAMATION

In Order to Their Majesties Intended Coronation.

WILLIAM R.

WHEREAS We have Resolved, by the Favour and Blessing of God, to Celebrate the Solemnity of Our Royal Coronation upon the Eleventh Day of April next, at Our Palace at Westminster, and for so much as by Ancient Customs and Usages of this Realm, as also in regard of divers Tenures of sundry Mannors, Lands, and other Hereditaments, many of Our Loving Subjects do Claim, and are bound to do and perform divers several Services on the said Day, and at the Time of the Coronation, as in Times precedent their Ancestors, and those from whom they Claim, have done and performed at the Coronations of Our Predecessors, Kings and Queens of this Realm: We therefore out of Our Princely Care for the Preservation of the Lawful Rights and Inheritances of Our Loving Subjects whom it may concern, have thought fit to give Notice, and Publish Our Resolution therein, and do hereby give Notice, and Publish the same accordingly. And We do hereby further Signifie, That by Our Commission under Our Great Seal of England, We have Appointed and Authorized Our Right Trusty and Right Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor Thomas Earl of Danby, President of Our Council; Our Right Trusty and Entirely Belov'd Cousin and Councillor George Marquess of Halifax, Our Keeper of Our Privy Seal; Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Belov'd Cousin and Councillor Henry Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshall of England; Our Right Trusty and Entirely Belov'd Cousin and Councillor Charles Marquess of Winchester; Our Right Trusty and Right Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor Robert Earl of Lindsey, Great Chamberlain of England; Our Right Trusty and Right Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor William Earl of Devonshire, Steward of Our Household; Our Right Trusty and Right Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor Charles Earl of Dorset and Middlesex, Chamberlain of Our Household; Our Right Trusty and Right Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor Charles Earl of Shrewsbury, One of Our Principal Secretaries of State; Our Right Trusty and Wellbelov'd Cousin and Councillor Francis Viscount Newport, Treasurer of Our Household; The Right Reverend Father in God Henry Dord Bishop of London; Our Right Trusty and Wellbelov'd Councillor Ralph Lord Montague, Master of Our Wardrobe; Our Trusty and Wellbelov'd Sir William Dolben Kt. one of the Justices of Our Court of Kings Bench; and Our Trusty and Wellbelov'd Sir John Powell Kt. one of the Justices of our Court of Common Pleas; or any three or more of them, to receive, hear, and determine the Petitions and Claims which shall be re them Exhibited by any of Our Loving Subjects in this behalf. And We shall appoint Our said Commissioners for that purpose, to meet, and sit in the Painted Chamber of Our Palace at Westminster, upon the Twenty eighth Day of this Instant March, at Nine of the Clock in the forenoon of that Day, and from time to time to Adjourn as to them shall seem meet, for the Execution of Our said Commission, which We do thus Publish to the intent, That all such Persons whom it may any way Concern, may know when and where to give their Attendance for the Exhibiting of their Petitions and Claims concerning their Services beforementioned, to be done and performed unto Us, as Our said Commission. And We do hereby Signifie unto all and every Our Subjects whom it may concern, That Our Will and Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly Charge all Persons of what Rank or Quality soever they be, who either upon Our Letters to them directed, or by reason of their Offices, or Tenures, or otherwise, are to do any Service at the said Day, or Time of Our Coronation, That they do duly give their Attendance accordingly in all Respects, Fulfilled and Appointed as to so great a Solemnity apper-

taineth, and answerable to the Duty of such Places which every one of them respectively holdeth; and that if they do the contrary at their Perils, unless upon special Reasons by Ourselves, under Our Hand, to be allowed. We shall Dispense with any of their Services or Attendances.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the 16th Day of March 1688. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Venice, March 5. The Senate having on the 29 Instant received Advice by an Express, that the Doge Morosini lay under a great Indisposition at Napoli di Romania; and fearing he might not be able to Command in Person the Forces of this State the next Campaign, they dispatched Orders the next day to the Procurator

curator *Gerónimo Cornaro*, at present General of *Dalmatia*, to repair forthwith to the *Levant* in Quality of *Proveditore General* of the Sea; and at the same time appointed the Chevalier *Antonio Zeno*, to be *Proveditore General* of *Dalmatia*, who he now Commands as General of the Horse. We have the Confirmation, by a Vessel come from the *Levant*, of the arrival of the Captain *Bessa* at *Negrepont* with 800 Men, to reinforce that Garrison; and that the Turks laboured with the utmost diligence to repair the Fortifications, and to put the place into a posture of defence. Several Ships have been sent to *Dalmatia*, to transport from thence 3000 old Soldiers to the *Morea*; and in their stead 3000 new raised-Men will be sent to *Dalmatia*.

Vienna, March 3. On Monday last the Ambassador of *Venice* received by an Express a full Power to Treat and Conclude with the Turkish Embassadors, with whom he will now enter into Negotiation, the several Parties treating separately. We are assured, That the Garrison of *Camsa* hath sent an Officer to General *Thaan* at *Siget*, to treat about the Surrender of that important Fortress. The Emperor has named the Count *de Nigrelli* to go in the quality of his Ambassador to the Pope. The Preparations for the War go on with great Vigour and Success.

Ratisbonne, March 11. The Elector of *Bavaria*, who is very well recovered of the Small Pox, intends to be in a short time at the Head of an Army of above 30000 Men, composed of his own Troops, and those of the Circles of *Bavaria*, *Franconia*, and *Swabia*, with which he will act on the *Upper Rhine*. The Deputies of the City of *Strasbourg* presented yesterday a Memorial to the Diet, to desire that the Son of the Marquis *de Lusignan*, who is now here, may be stopt till the Hostages which the French Troops carried away with them at their abandoning that place, be released. The Letters from *Vienno* give great assurances of a speedy Peace with the Turks.

Francofort, March 17. It is impossible to give a particular Relation of the Barbarities the French commit in the *Palatinate*, and other Countries which they are no longer able to maintain. You have already heard in what manner they quitted *Helsberg*. They have since abandoned *Manheim*, having not only destroyed the Fortifications, but likewise burnt all the Publick Buildings and Principal Houses; and not content with reducing the Town to a heap of Ruines, and the Inhabitants to the greatest Misery, they carried away 12 Hostages for the payment of the Contributions they still pretend of them. They have left the Town of *Ladenburg* in no better condition. And having thus quitted all the places they were possessed of in that part of the *Palatinate* which lies on the East-side of the *Rhine*, they now threaten to burn all the Country on the West-side within the distance of four German Miles from that River. They make great Preparations at *Mentz*, which in all appearance are designed against *Coblenz*; but on the other side all imaginable care is taken to provide for the security and defence of that place; the Garrison whereof will in few days be reinforced by two Imperial Regiments. 500 Imperialists are entered into *Hydalberg*.

Hamburgh, March 15. We have an account from *Dresden*, that the States of *Saxony*, whom his Electoral Highness had called together, to consult with them in relation to the present Juncture of Affairs, had readily concurred with the Resolutions his Electoral Highness had taken for the security of the Empire, and had settled a Fond, not only for the payment of the old Troops, but also for the maintaining the new Levies, for which his Electoral Highness had given out Commissions. The Conferences are continued at *Altona* for the composing the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and Duke of *Holftein*, but with little appearance of bringing them to an Amicable Composition. They write from *Warsaw*, That the King of *Poland* had, with the Advice of the Diet, named one of the Senators to go in the Quality of Ambassador Extraordinary to *Vienno*, to assist at the Conferences with the Turkish Embassadors on the part of that Crown.

Brussels, March 22. This day the Regiment of Horse of *Don Martin de Cordoba*, and that of *Du-guonne* commanded by the Chevalier *d'Alsace*, passed

Muster; as that of *du Mont*, which is the last of the 13 Regiments that have been now raised, will do in two or three days. Commissions are likewise given out for divers new Companies which are to be added to the old Bodies. The French Troops move towards *Tour-naï*, near which place a Body of them is to Encamp; In the mean time we hear that their Boats laden with Cannon, Mortars, Bombes, Carcasses, &c. which came from *Duina* by the River *Scarpe*, and from *Cambray* by the *Schelde*, do still continue between *Conde* and *Valenciennes*. They write from *Cologne*, that the late defeat of the French near *Niun* had put their Affairs on that side into so ill a Condition, that the Cardinal of *Furstemberg*, not thinking himself safe at *Bon*, was preparing to retire to *Mez*.

Paris, March 26. The Guards *du Corps*, the *Gendarmes*, and the Light Horse, are ordered towards the *Rhine*; and the Musqueteers, and part of the Regiment of Guards, are to Encamp near *Versailles*, to be in a readiness to march, as there shall be occasion. This week was published an Ordonnance for the hindring the Meetings of the new Converts in the several Provinces in this Kingdom, and for the putting in Execution the Edicts of October 1685, against such as shall act contrary thereto. There are Orders given to raise the Ban and Arrierban of the Isle of *France*. It is confidently reported, that the Cardinal of *Furstemberg* is retired to *Mez*.
